



## GUEST PREACHER AT COMMUNITY CHURCH

Mr. Egger has worked at the Aqua Chem Company in Wisconsin, where the process for converting salt water into fresh has been developed. The company, in addition to making large water converters, has also developed a small one which would be suitable for household use.

The Navy has installed four of the units on the "U.S.S. Enterprise," one of our new carriers. The United States has already used the water converters profitably in two dramatic instances. The first was when Castro cut off the water supply to our base at Guantanamo and all water had to be shipped in by boat. The units were quickly installed and now Guantanamo has all the fresh water it needs - - - converted from the

The second instance took place during the tragic earthquake in Alaska, which, besides destroying lives, homes, and property broke the water supply pipes to Point Barrow, our military base nearest Russia. During the winter it would have been impossible to ship in the water needed, so the water converter units were installed and are now producing 300,000 gallons a day.







ISLANDERS URGED TO JOIN WATER ASSOCIATION

Now that the greater Pine Island Water Association has reached (and, in fact, passed) its required 800 membership quota assuring the Pine Island residents of the construction of their water project, the commissioners of the Island Water Association, Inc., of Sanibel and Captiva Islands are confident that the Islands too car secure the necessary 600 subscribers enabling the Islands to also have a fresh water supply.

Since the holidays are now over and everyone has relaxed a little, residents, home owners and developers will be contacted by teams of unpaid solicitors, who will explain the advantages to be gained by participation in the proposed water system.

Good water is becoming a major problem in the fast-expanding community of Sanibel and Captiva, and all residents are urged to give this problem careful consideration. The community's present water supply cannot improve, and a new supply must be found somewhere.

The association, believing that the proposed water system is the best answer, has opened a temporary office in the Sanible Community House. The office is manned by Pat Murphy from 8:30 to 4:30 five days a week, who will be delighted to give you any information you wish and will also process your application for membership. If you are not contacted by the solicitors and, for one reason or another, can't come into the Community House, or if you do not at this time wish to apply for membership, you are urged to call GR 2-4981. Act quickly --- March 1 is the deadline.

> TEEN CLUB CORNER


