


AND A-MAILING WE DO GO...

YOUR WATER SYSTEM

PROGRESS! This is what is being made by the Island Water Association, Inc., in their efforts to secure the required six hundred subscribers to the proposed system.

Each day's mail includes letters from both home owners and those who own vacant property, but hope to build and become residents of our Islands. Their comments indicate that they are in favor of the project and wish us every success in our efforts. We cannot help but believe them, as they return signed Users Agreements and a check to cover their membership.


However, there are a few residents who have decided not to support the project. Their reasons for this decision are many. The most common is that they now have a source to supply their needs, or that their investment is such that it is not economically possible to support a secondary system. In a very few isolated cases, they believe that someone or some group of individuals will profit, should the proposed system become a reality.

It's quite true that some of us have a greater need than our more fortunate neighbors. It is also not true that any one individual or group of individuals will profit directly.


This is a civic project. It is sponsored by the Captiva Civic Association, the Sanibel-Captiva Chamber of Commerce and the Sanibel Community Association. These organizations have made funds available for the promotion of the Island Water Association and from their membership have supplied the present board of directors. The directors serve without pay. The project engineer, the legal advisor, the accounting firm and the administrator are all working on a contingency agreement. They will not be paid for their services unless the required number of subscribers are secured.

CONTRACT LET

The Sanibel Community Association voted to give the contract for rebuilding the Community Hall to Ralph Woodring and Ralph Cimato of the R. & R. Construction Co. of Sanibel. The rebuilding will start Feb. 1 and will be completed Feb. 25, in time for the Shell Fair. Two small buildings will be built to house the food facilities and the Driftwood Shop. Placing driftwood outside the main building will make more room available for the shell displays. The entire building will be repainted and refurbished. The Sanibel Community Association hopes to be able to expand the facilities of the building in the near future but work now being done will give greater capacity and convenience and will fit into the overall expansion plan.





The cups and trophies donated by the Sanibel Community Assoc. may be seen at the Community House.





Menninger, the Flowering Tree Man of Stuart. It will be illustrated with more than one hundred kodachrome slides from all parts of the world, Because the tropics have so much more to give of beautiful flowers than are ever seen in the Temperate Zones, the outstanding flowering trees presented in this lecture suggest a hundred ways in which the Florida landscape can be made more beautiful.

"We are stimulated constantly in Florida to make our communities more attractive," says Mr. Menninger, "and flow-ering trees plan an important part in any planting program. Too much energy has been wasted in the past in planting Australian pines and seedling mangos. Let's learn about the more beautiful trees and plant them instead. It is no more difficult to grow a magnificent, gigantic bouquet in your yard than it is to be responsible for an ugly tree. Chinese Wilson suggested once that to devote 20 years to growing the wrong trees was a high price to pay for ignorance. So while we are planting, let's plant beauty."






TEEN CLUB CORNER
