ISLAND ARTISTS RECEIVE AWARDS

Awards were announced at the close of the Sears 1st Annual Festival of Contemporary Florida Art Exhibit. The exhibit was held at the new Sears Store in Fort Myers, the 1st of a series of annual shows to be held by this organization, as part of a nationwide program to bring original art to general attention.

Approximately 500 paintings in all media were submitted for judging, of which 120 were hung in the store's exhibit.

Sanibel and Captiva artists were well-represented in the prizes and citations.

Evalina Green, of Fort Myers Beach, received the Best-in Show award d a cash prize of \$150, for her abstract oil entitled "Odett Joy." Mrs. Green is presently conducting an art class for beginners and advanced students at the Sanibel Community House every Monday morning at 9:00.

The other prize-winners in the three classes, were: Oils: Pat Eng, Fort Myer, Blue ribbon 1st and silver bowl for "Woodscape," Verda Keen, Fort Myers, 2nd place for "Saunders' Boat Yard," and Hugo Asbach, Captive, 3rd place for "Nadir."

Mrs. Mary Aleck and one will be provided.




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LIBRARY NEWS SANIBEL

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




