
ISLAND WATER ASSOCIATION A REALITY

So you keep right on walking,


or diving or dragging,

THE SANIBEL SHELL FAIR WAY BACK WHEN by ethel snyder

Those first shell fairs were a far cry from the finished sophisticated, scientific fairs of today! There was no electricity, no running water, no phones, no gas, but there were the truly lovely shells, the know-how, and the desire to produce a bang up Fair!

One year when I was chairman, it seemed most difficult to even get a start. A big blow in early winter had blown both of the outside johnnies over on their sides and there they lay-prone! Nobody would do anything about it. If even the front of the Community House got a coat of fresh paint it would help.

Till, one day, the tide turned! I discovered precious Danny Dever (who bellered at you so most people were afraid of him) out in the Community House yard with Edmund and Oscar Gavin, setting the outhouses up from their prone situations. Fresh shell paths and proper plantings were placed about. The next day, Walter and a can of fresh paint put a good front on the House. It inspired me to make a trip to town and buy three or four large beach umbrellas which were gay and festive in the yard. It seemed a terrific extravagance but they lasted for years to brighten the shell fairs.

Casa Ybel donated a large roast turkey, Island Inn donated a dozen plump roast chickens, Jake Stokes went out to sea in his boat and came back with a boat load of fish which Clarence Rutland fried in shiny new garbage cans of boiling oil of fat out in the yard. He also made delicious hush puppies for that crowd. I never knew who cleaned the fish, or did all the work behind the scenes. The fish fry was on the second






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Who's Who on Sanibel

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


sun immensely.
