
FIRST PLAY IN NEW THEATER OPENS

"The Reluctant Debutante" played to packed houses last weekend when the Pirate Playhouse opened its doors for the first time. Both performances had been sold out for weeks, but tickets are on sale for a performance April 10 and another during Easter week on Saturday, April 24.

The Hunters came to the Islands from their Towndock Theater in Port Washington, New York, where, during the last ten years, they produced ninety plays in a unique arena theater. Before their many years of broadcasting their own show, "Let's Go" on WOR Radio for the Port of New York Authority, they appeared in stock, vaudeville and on broadway. Ruth Hunter is the original Ellie May of "Tobacco Road" and played the part 2,013 times in New York. She tells about her experience in a new book being published this May by Exposition press, N.Y., titled "Barefoot Girl on Broadway" with a foreward by Carl Sandburg. Scribners published some of her earlier books, "Come Back on Tuesday," and "It Fell Upon a Day."

The Hunters are very proud of their Reluctant Debutante cast, who are all Island residents ---Jerry Muench, Roy Bazire, Priscilla Murphy, Bob Dormer, and Jane Hines. They're also delighted with the enthusiasm expressed for their Pirate Playhouse and look forward to many seasons of good theater here.

And, in turn, Island residents and visitors seem elated over the decor, lighting, stage setting, seating arrangement and acoustics--- and are proud that the historic old school house is being used for such a fine cause and is in such good hands.

THE ROCKS

by ethel snyder Recently a newly arrived couple to the Island were spending an evening with me. They enthusiastically informed me that they had just bought a site at "The Rocks" where they were planning on building a home. Just lately some others had told me they were going to build at The Rocks. Then afterwards I wondered if these precious folks who love our Island really knew what The Rocks were and why that section got that name. It didn't just happen!

When I first arrived on the Island there were less than fifty registered voters, no motels, only Casa Ybel, Island Inn, a few cottages and Bailey's of course. But the gorgeous beach has changed not at all, and shelling was always our best outdoor sport. We shelled from the light house beach on the Gulf side to The Rocks. Not all the same day however! That's a long stretch, The latter was quite a way west of Island Inn. The only way you could get there was a trail along the beach winding and twisting through a tropical jungle, deep sand and it was narrow. There were two or three places where you could pass another car by pulling over and waiting until it had passed. More than a mile up the beach there was a wide road which made a left turn to the top of the beach. It was ve: y high here, more than 20 feet above the water line and at low tide great slabs and mounds of coral rocks were exposed. No loose rocks only a solid mass. It was extensive, reddish brown in color and slippery with sea moss. It was full of indentations and a fas-



cinating place to study live sea life. All sorts of tiny sea creatures alive and swimming were trapped in these pockets of sea water.


This was on top of The Rocks! Tiny crabs, tiny star fish, odd little lacey bits with fins, small pectens which opened and shut their valves with a delicate snap. It was amazing and fascinating and no doubt all that is still going on at The Rocks, I suspect it is. For some years now the trail and the turn have been closed to me, but I have vivid memories! So that is the reason why this section is called "The Rocks!"

TO THE ISLANDER:

The Sanibel Shell Fair (and it is a fair not just a shell show) is held every year for one very practical reason -which is belied by its humble beginning. The Community Association which runs the fair, needs money for the maintenance, up keep, repair, additions, etc. of the Community House and grounds.

The Community House is used by the Audubon Society, The Shell Club, the Water Association, the Chamber of Commerce, the library, all public functions, and most social activities.

In the beginning there was no competition to our Fair-People showed what shells they found here. There were complaints then too-for the same shells began to show up year after year (so we are told.)

Today, in Florida alone, there exist some 25-30 shell clubs, most of which put on the very best shell show possible for them. In a 2 week period Dr. Abbott judged 3 shows (Naples, San Padre Island, Texas, and Sanibel.) He deemed all shows excellent, but by our very history we should have been best!

This week the St. Petersburg Club is holding "The World's Largest Shell Show." They are using the new Bayfront Center and are featuring \$250,000 worth of beautiful and rare shells. Against competition like this Sanibel must do one of two things-get "bigger and better" or find another way to raise money (Have all other organizations pay rent, raise membership dues, etc.)

Many people work hard for the better part of the year to make the 3-day fair a success both esthetically and financially.

Shellers and lovers of shells are immune to geographical boundaries. The Shell Club labors long and puts much thought into the categories which will draw the best possible exhibits. Infallibility, however, is not one of cur virtues, and every year, AFTER the Shell Fair, we find ourselves swamped with suggestions. MOST are good and are incorporated into next year's Fair Some are not.

ALWAYS special emphasis is placed on Sanibel-Captiva shells (7 categories this year) Beginners - Oldtimers - Childrens-Miniatures-All trophies were awarded to local exhibits, except one.

Good as these exhibits were, how much of a "Fair" would we have had with only the local shells showing?

Local shells-do not and NEVER HAVE competed against foreign shells for prize consideration. Exhibits compete with others in the same category only. In the "good old days" cash prizes (substantial ones at that) were awarded. It was through the efforts of the Shell Club that ribbons and trophies were substituted, for believe it or not, people still like incentives. Trophies and ribbons can do no harm and do effectively stimulate interest.

We should, all of us, take pride in having so many world travelers on the islands - people who take the time and have the willingness to show what they have brought in from other parts of the world. What utter nonsense to think this detracts from the show.

Does one cut down the oak tree because he liked the acorn better? The Shell Fair must and shall go on - "Bigger and Better."

Mr. Brumbach's letter of Islander last, however, had much merit. It could and should be a Shell Club project to have a yearly showing of shells found here-I shall propose at our March 29 meeting that a committee be formed to organize just such a showing in the future. (Island shells for Is-
