





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
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#### WATER ASSOCIATION MOVING TO NEW LOCATION

At the meeting of the board of directors of the Island Water Association held Tuesday 13, Paul Stahlin suggested that the Association badly needed new quarters in which to carry on its business, Mr. Stahlin then donated such space, without any payment or liability to the Association, for a period up to one year or until the Association has acquired and built its own space.

The new office of the Association will be in Town Square. This is the office formerly used by J.P. Carter Trucking Company and is well equipped with storage space for the Association's records. It also will allow permanent display of maps and progress reports.

The Association is now in the process of assigning coded numbers to each user. This code has been worked out to show the area, type of service and consecutive account numbers.

Office hours will not change---9:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. The telephone number will also be the same---GReen-lear 2-4081

It is now believed that water will be brought to the Islands by late April or early May 1966. Construction of the system may be started this November. However, much of this depends on the progress of the Greater Pine Island Water Association in the construction of its system and its ability to deliver water to the Island Water Association.


#### AN EDITORIAL

To bridge or not to bridge is NOT the question --- 'Tis definately must we and our many visitors continually suffer the outrageous lack of facilities which have not been provided for the public, or for our long-suffering business people?

Our promised comfort station for Turner Park---which was under "serious consideration" by the County Commissioners late last summer---is still just a promise. We cannot see how any sane, logical person (and we're sure our commissioners must be, for who would elect someone who was not sane and logical?) could even consider an attempt to bring more people to the Islands without first providing at least a modicum of convenience, (if not downright necessity) for these already here.

As for the question of the bridge in itself, a bridge which would open our beaches to the residents and visitors of Pine Island as well as those just passing through, we are not persuaded. Will all these extra people be content with Turner Park, Bowman's Beach and the twelve or so other access points? Or will they tromp through private property, as has happened all too frequently already?

It is possible to see the financial advantages of more people moving to the Islands --- but can we expect everyone who crosses the bridge to respect the rights of individual property owners and to enjoy our Islands as we do? While our new causeway has brought

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

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

Hear ye! Hear ye!

The Glory of the Sea or to be more specific the shop "Glory of the Sea" on Sanibel Island now has a Conus Gloria -maris (chemnitz) commonly known as The Glory of the Sea. Our good friend Ede Mugridge, owner of the shop, is now the owner of one of the rarest known shells in the World. She was able to obtain this through the auspices of Dr. R. Tucker Abbott.

The purchase was consummated while Dr. Abbott was on the Island to once more judge the entries at the 28th Annual Shell Fair, and letters and telegrams have been whizzing between Philadelphia, Sanibel, and New Guinea. There is no commission involved in the sale of this specimen, so the native finder well get whatever amount Ede has paid for the shell.

The shell is a rare and beautiful specimen. The 30th ever found, I believe. It was found in October 1964 by a native diver from Pentegom Village, Djaul I.D. New Ireland I.D. in the Bismarks..

During our many years of vacationing on Sanibel we have come to be very friendly with Ede and were allowed to preview this gem which was not yet on display, before reluctantly leaving for the cool North. Since we've been home, we just want to tell the "Islanders" (we feel as if we were one of you and hope to be in the near future) how proud we are-as you must also beto be able to say "We have a Glory of the Sea on our Island." It is a beauty to behold - a perfect tip with 15 whorls, perfect lip, all marling well defined and has a high lustre both inside and out. 
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#### HIGH FLYERS

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

LIFE SAVING SQUAD

There is a life saving squad on the beaches at Sanibel, both on the Gulf side and the Bay side. It's a voluntary squad and the members have much in common and are delighted to meet up with each other and compare notes when they do meet. I met Col. Jim Snyder on the beach Friday afternoon. Efforts that day were the saving of numerous live olives. Many were large and shining. The only mission of the squad is to save the live mollusks from the tourist who doesn't really want live shells but just hasn't thought about conserving wild life. We had both thrown back about fify that had heen left stranded on the sandy flat beach exposed by a very low tide. Olives make a curvy mound in the sand and it is so easy to pick live shells up at one end or the other. We just pick them up and toss them out in deeper water where they are not seen.

Live cockles, live conchs, and tulips are often left stranded by low tides and then the squads get busy. It's just one of those things. Some folks do and some folks don't. Of course, a rare specimen such as a golden olive, an albino conch or an especially lovely red tulip would be added to one's collection, but it is the wanton waste of quantities of shells which we deplore. So without any fuss or feathers we serve as active workers in the life saving squad. It costs nothing to join and it is fun. Try and
