We can give you the figures of the Fort Myers Weather Bureau, but it doesn't necessarily rain in town every time it rains here,

The last few days of the last week were comparitively dry, but if the pattern remains constant, one may expect the showers to begin in mid-afternoon and clear up by evening (and sometimes sooner).

The Oil Fuel Institute of Florida forecast that the rainfall for the rest of June would be 150% above normal, with July a little dryer and a wet August in the offing. (If you're wondering why they forecast the weather, it's because the amount of oil they will be able to sell varies with the temperature and rainfall.)

Although the greater part of the HELEN TAYLOR RAINES' private museum of specimen shells goes to the Beal Maltbie Museum at Rollins College in Winter Park, an exceptionally fine collection of Mrs. Raines' Florida shells was willed by her to the Sanibel Community Association.


sacks. They would even work by flashlight or turn the lights of their trucks on the beach. But they were wanting the large brown cockle or tray shells as they called them. There was a big demand for them in making shell novelties.


Past sleeping cottages we drove to the end of the beach road, where it jutted into a narrow trail almost concealed by a thicket of sea grape. This trail wound round and past hammocks of cabbage palms, sea grape, and giant century plants which had shot up their flower stalks into the air, then a final turn towards the Gulf where there was space for a dozen cars to park above the beach. As we made this turn the headlights of a car just leaving flashed into our eyes. We passed Mr. and Mrs. Manda, the South Pacific couple, with the loot already in the bag as Miss Emma expressed it later, All she said then was "Humph!" But no one could find all the good ones at a time like this. So with eager anticipation we unloaded the shell baskets. The cocker had already rushed down to the beach about affairs of her own.

By this time it was light enough to really see the great quantities of shells piled up in heaps by the waves, some good and some beach washed, some perfect and more broken. It was overwhelming! Almost unbelievable! I started filling my baskets.

Later at the cottage they would be dumped one basket at a time on the shell porch floor, sorted, cleaned, and the treasures segregated. The rare ones were compared with those found by others. One basket after another was filled and loaded into the back of the car. Small special shells were put in my pockets. Soon all pockets were so full they


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WHO'S WHO ON CAPTIVA


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The DANIEL BURNER, Jrs., are back on their favorite Island again enjoying its serenity.


