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

Ladies and Gentlemen:

"The Darling Foundation is pleased to report that considerable progress is being achieved in connection with the "Ding" Darling Sanctuary on Sanibel.


"The Bureau of Land Management has now completed its field work in the boundary survey of the sanctuary tract. The necessary computations and plans for review by the central office of BLM should be accomplished soon,

'In the important matter of the trade of the State of Florida owned land with the Federal Government, we are advised that joint field appraisals have been completed and arrangements to effect a negotiation with the State of Florida is imminent, All are hopeful that a consolidation of the refuge ownership within definitely established boundary lines and such delineation posted can be a reality soon.

"The impoundment dike should be completed to its full width of approximately sixty feet within the next month. Control structures are being installed and should be in operation soon, if not by the time you receive this report. These structures, as you all know, will permit a gradual freshening of the water within the impoundment and will be a giant step forward in establishing favorable conditions for aquatics to come in, thus helping to improve the refuge.

'All state and federal government officials are very pleased with the continued interest in behalf of the sanctuary on Sanibel, not only for each of us as individuals, but also the Darling Memorial Committee on Sanibel-Captiva and, of course, the Darling Foundation itself. I am sure we may look forward to a continuing close cooperation with all concerned in the progress and planning of the Darling Sanctuary.

"We shall keep you advised of additional important developments. Your continued interest and support is appreciated and needed."


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ON SANIBEL

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
KEEP CONSERVATION IN MIND


Excerpts from an article appearing in the Louisville Ky., Courier-Journal about Sanibel and her fabulous shelling points up one of the important reasons Islanders view with lack of enthusiasm, a second bridge which might bring in the thoughtless type tourist. In her article Betty Lou Amster says:

Since the Gulf is so free with sea gifts, why all the concern? Dr. Harvey Meyer, founder of the shell club, explains: "Shellers are taking the immature sea animals. We say take as many of the dead shells as you please but select only the few live ones you need for your collection; leave the rest to marry."

It is difficult to remember conservation rules when vacationing in the area; it is also difficult to believe that the "good old days" could have been one bit better than the here and now. After a few sun-blessed days on the white sand, it is difficult, in fact to remember anything—except the announced times for high and low tides. The scowliest sceptic is soon caught up in the search for sand dollars, conch and starfish—and in his enthusiasm he often beats the shore birds to the tide line.

That's why it is all too true that species Scaphella Junonia---marked by spiral rows of brown or orange spots---becomes rarer indirect proportion to the influx of species Homo sapiens---marked by sneakers, Bermuda shorts and shell-collecting aprons.


In Washington they stayed with SALLY TOUGHILL, a frequent Island visitor, then on home by way of the Ruby Mines of Franklin, North Carolina.

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

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
CONTRACTOR OF THE STATE OF THE


all hob nob and feel well acquainted right off!
