


#### FISH FRY NOTES

To The Islander:

On Saturday evening, August 14, I had the opportunity to find out first hand what I get for the part of my tax dollar that is allotted to the Sheriff's Department of Lee County.

I have been a taxpaying, freeholding, registered voter in Lee County for the past eleven years, living on Captiva and Sanibel Islands.

Last Saturday a friend drove me into Fort Myers where I made my usual deposit of the receipts from my own business in the bank on Cleveland Ave. Shortly afterward, while proceeding into the city on Cleveland, we were warned to the curb by the flashing red light of a sheriff's deputy's car.

Two Barneys (do you watch the Andy Griffith TV Show?) immediately appeared, one on either side of the car, and the first question put to my driver was, "Where you comin' from?" And with the answer, "Sanibel Island," the law went into action. Without any further attempt to establish our identification by asking for our names, or driver's licenses, we were ordered out of the car, leaned up against it and patted all over, presumably I guess for dangerous weapons, Then we were ordered into the caged back seat of the deputy's car where a young, blond civilian boy had been riding and the Barney who seemed to be giving the orders told the other one to drive our car to the County Jail while he chauffeured us. I might add that they both seemed very keyed up and in such a nervous state that probably if we had so much as opened our mouths they would have drawn their guns.


Arriving at the jail we were rushed into a barred room furnished with two hard wooden benches and bolted, barred and locked like the vault at Fort Knox. While we were held there for forty-five minutes incommunicado, again no effort was ever made to establish our identification! Also while we sat there, innumerable other deputies on some pretext or other managed to peep at us. One came for a drink of water. while most of theothers merely rearranged papers on a desk which was conveniently set by the barred door.

At last the ordeal was ended by the arrival of Deputy Ralph Smith from the Islands who couldn't have been more surprised to discover that it was I who was being held on suspicion of doing the desperate crime on Sanibel. (We were never told formally what the crime was; later, by hearsay, we found out that two men, one with bushy hair, driving a dark car, had hit Micky Powell over the head.) And Sanibel has been having its biggest laugh in years over the incident.

I called my attorney to see if such things could be done and he told me that persons could be held for four hours in that way but usually it wasn't done with such utter stupidity and ineptness. But he also added that the Sheriff had no choice in the men he could hire because the pay is so low. (I have deleted part of my original intended letter here as I may need my attorney if this letter is published. J.V.B.)

It is obvious that the reasoning behind our detainment was the fact that the crime had been perpetrated on Sanibel by two men in a dark car and when the Barney asked us where we came from and Sanibel was the answer, in his elementary fashion he managed to add two and two. This would lead one to believe that these deputies

I have come to the conclusion from this incident that the County Commissioners would do a better service for Lee County if they would forget about raising their own salaries and give the Sheriff's Department enough money so that he could hire the proper kind of man that is needed and give him adequate training. After all, these men may be the only contact our much needed tourist trade may have in Lee County and I wonder what kind of treatment tourists

will be given if such highhanded tactics such as I experienced are given to Lee County residents.


