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
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
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WHO'S WHO ON CAPTIVA

Dr. and Mrs. Lynn Beals first arrived on Sanibel Island. where they spent the night. After a visit with Miss Snyder, they drove the next day to Captiva Island and stopped to visit with Mrs. Stella Mitchell.

At the time Mrs. Mitchell just had the Coconut Cottage (now Castaways Restaurant) and the Hibiscus Cottage. The Beals must have fallen in love with the Island at once, as the fol-lowing day, after motoring to Key West, they telephoned Mrs. Mitchell, asking if they could rent Coconut Cottage. During this time the Hayfords were in the Hibiscus Cottage, so it wasn't until the next year the Beals took over this cottage for a three year period.

Dr. Beals had a little red gon which he used to pull ng on the beach to cart the many shells he found. He sold them to Mr. Hiers. The land on which their present house stands was purchased, for the most part, with the moneys received from his shelling.

A contractor from up near their Georgia Bay summer cottage came down and started the house near the Captiva Island Bridge on Sanibel, but it was finished by Mr. Bracken, Mae Shannon's father.

They were in the house only one year when Dr. Beals passed away at their Georgian Bay

Through the years, Mrs. Elizabeth Beals endeared herself to everyone on the Islands. She was constantly looking after someone and giving them a helping hand. Mrs. Beals and Mrs. Mitchell became fast friends and they were seen most every place together.

During the war years, Betsy, the daughter of the late Mr. Max Hayford and Jean Hayford, spent one year here caring for Jimmie, the four year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Beals. Jimmie has been a constant visitor all these years.

Mrs. Beals became interested in the church and it was largely through her effort that Captiva started having a regular ster. All through the years, . Beals took charge of the Communion service and was most faithful in her duties. Her recent passing is mourned by all who knew her; she will live in their memories for years to come.




SCOUTS LEARN BOAT SAFETY



Granny had asked all of the families to bring their bedclothes and come into the

Inn kitchen for the duration. They all came except for one woman who said she would much rather stay in her own cabin. She did, while the others all made themselves comfortable in the Inn kitchen.

The storm hit! There's nothing like a hurricane, fortunately. Once it hits, there is nothing anyone can do but stay inside and batten down!

Along towards the inky-black and howling morning, the lone hold-out, dripping wet and without her bedclothes, came in the back door of the kitchen. They all gathered around her. She said she just had "a jolt" and thought she had better come inside the Inn. Everyone was happy and relieved to see her.

After the storm the next day, they discovered that the hurricane had blown her cabin of its base and fully fifty feet across a field and crashed it down with a blow which broke it up. And so "a jolt" had brought her inside the Inn!



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
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
