MONSTER ???

Captiva now possesses a genuine monster---or maybe monsters. Last Friday morning a mysterious set of tracks was found in the sand running from the Chapel by the Sea through the Mills, Bailey and Henrickson yards, and across the road into a vacant lot. There seemed be two sets, one ranging from four to five inches in width, and the ther from six to eight inches. But, they meandered and criss-crossed so much that they might be just one.

With the tourist season about to start one might whiff a slight odor of the Loch Ness Monster (which usually appears just before the Loch Ness 'tourist' season), except for three things: the tracks were on private property nowhere near a resort; they were traced and measured and they're unquestionably genuine; and anybody laying out a trail would go around, not through, a large patch of cactus. (That last indicates that the Captiva Monster, like most monsters, isn't very bright.) Anyway, the tracks gave the Islanders a chance to be sightseers themselves for a change, and they took advantage of it.



MORTGAGE BURNED

Sanibel Community Church Building was started in 1917 with land, building material and labor donated by the members of the community and was designated a Methodist Church, which made it a property of the District Methodist Church. Since until a few short years ago it was the only church on Sanibel, Members of all the different af-filiations on the Island attended worship there, even when it was not possible to have a minister in attendance. Sunday School was held for the children of all faiths. This is a little church with no affiliation with any other and it is possible for members to retain their membership in other churches while also being a member of the Sanibel Community Church, if they so desire.

In 1960 the people who attended decided to buy the church and designate it non-denominational. The church was purchased from the Sarasota District Methodist Church and today, thanks to its dedicated

members and friends, its mortgage is paid off.

Sunday evening, November 7, at 6:30 at the Sanibel Community House those members and friends will gather for a victory dinner in celebration and to burn the mortgage. The men of the church will broil chickens over buttonwood and the ladies will bring a variety of good dishes to go with the chicken. Any member or friend of the church is invited to attend. The Rev. Tad Allen is the present pastor, Tom Nix is the Chairman of the Board of Directors; Floyd Pflough is Chairman of the Board of Trustees; Mary Nix is the President of the Ladies Guild.

CAPTIVA LIBRARY


Starting this week the Captiva Library will be open from 1 to 3 o'clock on Saturday afternoons, in addition to the regular Tuesday and Friday mornings from 10 o'clock to noon. Librarian Hazel Roberts points out that the Saturday afternoon opening will permit the library to be used by school children and people who are unable to get away from work on week-day mornings. The additional hours are on more or less of a trial basis, and their continuance will depend upon how much use is made of the library on Saturdays.


In addition to Hazel, the staff this winter will consist of Kathleen

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
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THRIFT SHOP MOVED


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
