On Saturday morning, November 20, a Memorial Service was held in the Chapel-bythe-Sea for Mr. Harold M. Bixby, who died at his home on Captiva on November 18.

Mr. Bixby was born in St. Louis and educated at Amherst College, graduating in the class of 1913. He was a chief backer of Lindbergh's flight in 1927, and is credited with naming the plane "The Spirit of St. Louis." He made the statement at the time that "in my opinion, Lindbergh's feat is the greatest in the annals of human experience. It required careful, thorough planning, the high-est order of courage, almost superhuman endurance and the utmost in flying skill.

After the flight, Mr. Bixby participated in "Welcome Home" celebrations in New York and Washington, including a reception at the White House.

In 1928 he helped organize the original Transcontinental Air Transport Corporation, and became one of its directors, as well as a director of Detroit Aircraft, and other con-cerns. In 1932 he became Far Eastern representative for Pan American, and until 1946 served as the system's administrative Vice President.

Mrs. Elizabeth Case Bixby, four daughters, and seventeen grandchildren survive.

THE ELECTRIC POLE by ethel snyder

In the spring of 1951 the Electric Corporation of Fort Myers had decided that they would extend electric service to Sanibel and Captiva islands) This news was almost too good to be true to the Islanders who had weathered through many years with kerosene lamps, kerosene stoves, candles and other inconvenient contraptions. Even so we still preferred life on the Islands, but we rejoiced at the prospect of actually having electricity.

One of the first steps in the spring of 1951 was a survey. Young men in hip boots were seen sloshing around with instruments on tripods back in the jungles. Every now and then they got close enough for conversations, if shouting back and forth could be called conversations. They were unanimous in their opinion that of all the places they had surveyed Sanibel was the worst! Waist-deep mire, swamps, alligators, (who resented intrusions into their privacy) and ubiquitous mosquitoes! But we beamed on them with such radiancy and approval at the very thought of having electricity that they forgave us and went right on with the

The Mullers spent a week with the Krafts in Sarasota before they headed back to the chill north last Friday.



Carolina mountains, the survey had long been completed and now the poles and equipment were being brought over on barges. The island was still a South Pacific sort of place. My beach cottage could easily have been mistaken for a Tahiti affair, and I still had kerosene lamps and candles. But electric bulbs were imminent!

One morning a good looking young man, tripod, cameras and charming young wife appeared at my door! He represented the popular Colliers publication and had come to do an article on sea shells and to get photographs in color to accompany said article. That early in the fall I seemed to be the only one who had returned for the season and the management at Island Inn had sent him down to see me. Of course I was quite overcome with the commission, but was willing to do any and everything I could to assist. I do not recall just how long they did stay. Several days at

least and a fine article and two pages of color photographs appeared in the February 9, 1952, issue.

One very amusing incident did happen and just recently it came to thought and even the memory is good for a laugh.

The young representative from Collier's was Carroll Seghers II and he was efficient, indefatigable, charming and right to the point. He and Mrs. Seghers felt at home in my cot-tage and most welcome so I did see them often.

One morning when the sun out front was just right, he had spread out a good collection of local shells on the clean sand for a close up picture. He had worked with his tripod, looked from this angle and looked from that angle, stepped backward, came forward, changed the position of the junonia, retired under a large black cover to look through the lens.

In the meantime, a group of men from the electric company had come from the main-

land with a lot of tall poies. There were eight or ten husky men and a lot of poles, and they had dragged one of them into my yard. When they had dragged it out front they discovered the photographer about his business for Colliers and who had no interest at all in their business --- POLES. The electric men however did have an interest in his business. They dropped the pole they were carrying and all of them came over to see what he was doing! They found it more interesting than their own business, and all of them made an audience about him. Never have I seen anyone as utterly oblivious as Mr. Seghers in that group of

men; He went right on adjusting his lenses, placing this and that just so, submerging under the black blanket as if they weren't even there. Not a remark was made.

Finally they picked up their pole, (they had brought tools like ice tongs with which they dragged it) and drag it they did within a couple of feet of the tripod! They dragged it across the yard; I don't know where they took it. Neither did Mr. Seghers. Nor did he care. Maybe he didn't see it! Even though a telegraph pole is a large object. Even when prone! He certainly had not by the slightest token taken any notice of it!


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


LIBRARY NIGHT AT COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION
