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
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



# "FIRST OF FIRST"

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The Sears Roebuck Traveling Show of Leading Contemporary Southern Artists has awarded a first prize to Maybelle Stamper of Captiva for her lithograph called "Girl With Bird." The award carried additional honors in the form of a check for \$2,000 and the sale of the lithograph to the Wutherspoon Museum at the University of North Carolina.

Her picture, along with two other ones by area artists were placed on a tour of forty cities in the Southeastern states, where they were shown as part of the Traveling Show. At the end of the year, Sears collected the 120 winning paintings at the Museum for the Winner of Winners to be judged.

The judge, Mr. Allan Frumpkin, who has art galleries in New York and Chicago, awarded the Grand Prize to Miss Stamper. Sears has invited Maybelle to attend the presentation ceremonies at the University on January 4 as their guest. She has accepted the invitation and will be accompanied on her trip by Mrs. Ray Booth. Vincent Price, who is in charge of Sears Art Development Program, will also attend the presentation.

## LOW-COST HOUSING DISCUSSED

The meeting of the Sanibel-Captiva group interested in the provision of low-cost housing for present and future needs of islanders, met on Friday evening at the Chamber of Commerce building to hear Mr. Robert E. Bates, executive director of the Fort Myers Housing Authority, outline the necessary procedures to follow in a request for a Federal subsidy to underwrite the acquisition of land and the construction of the buildings, as well as details of administration of the rental housing.

Mr. Bates spoke at some length to an eager and interested audience of over fifty people, most of whom were Island residents, the others being visitors who felt the project deserved outside support.

It was decided, after a question-and-answer period during which many searching questions were asked by a large number of the listeners, to request that the Chamber of Commerce assume the sponsorship of the project, and to this end, Adm. E. G. Konrad, who served as temporary chairman of the meeting, was appointed chairman of a steering committee, by Mr. Norman Chambers, president of the Chamber. This committee, consisting of Adm. Konrad, Dr. Guthrie Speers, Father Thomas Madden, Mr. Ralph Bixby, Mr. Herbert Lewis and Mr. Leon R. Levy, was instructed to call on County Commissioner Geraci to ask the cooperation of the Board of Commissioners in forming a County Housing Authority, to take the preliminary steps outlined.

Mr. Geraci was called and agreed to meet with the Committee, which will, when pertinent information has been obtained, formulate a report to be presented to the group at a future meeting. It is hoped that an even larger turnout of Captiva and Sanibel residents will be present at this meeting, notice of which will be given in the near future.

Mr. Bates said that, although in the absence of the approval of the Fort Myers Housing Authority's decision, he could make no committments as to their willingness to participate in our efforts, he felt reasonably certain that they would regard the idea with favor. Those present applauded this possibility, as it would insure expert and experienced guidance.



#### THE STORM THE GOLD WATCH AND EVERYTHING

ONE hot day last summer, we stopped in at South Seas Plantation on Captiva for a breathing spell away from it all, and struck up a conversation with Andy Rosse of Andy's Marina on Captiva. He told a fascinating story, and since he it better than we ever could, were hastily transcribed for your pleasure.

"Did I ever tell you about the hurricane of '26?" he started off. "Well, I was just a kid then (thought I knew an awful lot, too) and was working around the Islands off a big fishing

"One day, not paying attention to anything much, we got back and the Captain said 'Get those boats up the creek.' Well, I argued with him -- I couldn't figure why I had to put the boats up right that minute, rather than later. And I had to go get supplies anyhow, couldn't see why I had to put the boats up before I left. As I aid, I was young.

Well, the Captain being the Captain, I put the boats up and then took off for the Port to get supplies. Quite a way that was -- we didn't have the big motors on boats as we do today and it took awhile, 'bout six hours, or more, each way.

"Coming back, the wind started picking up, and here I had been up for about a day and a half straight, but I fought that boat in, hit the deck, stumbled to my bunk and fell, with all my clothes, face down. They later said I didn't even turn

over for hours. "Pretty soon, or so it felt like, though they told me it was about 16 hours later, somebody shook my shoulder and said 'How'd you like the hurricane?' Well, I'm telling you, I was so tired I didn't even know there was a hurricane! "And you have to admire

that Captain, too. He didn't have the barometers, or instruments or anything to tell him it was coming, but he kept us, the scow and everything safe. He was a smart man.

"Well, anyhow, by the time I woke up, the storm was just about over. We only lost one boat -- we could see it, and I thought I could get it, but they wouldn't let me. After a couple of days we started needing some more supplies, so me and this other kid, he was only about 16, took off in an open boat to get some.

We got them alright, and started back. About an hour off shore I realized we hadn't brought any water to drink on the boat, and you can get pretty thirsty in as long as it took to get back to where we were going, so I decided to pull in at a fishing camp I knew of to see if we could borrow some water.

"We did, and that place was wrecked! I mean, there were clothes and furniture and pieces of houses and everything just scattered all over, Couldn't find any people, and this kid started nosing through a man's coat he found on the ground. He found a big gold watch, the kind on a heavy gold chain, and the kid, well, he said he was going to take it with him.

"I said he wasn't, 'Look,' I said, 'that poor guy's had

But the owner, Della's uncle, came back to get it from the fishing camp, gave it to his son and his son gave it to my nephew. I sure didn't know when I stopped that kid from taking it that I was saving that gold watch for my own family.


#### ST. ISABEL'S CHRISTMAS SCHEDULE
