
P.E.O. FOUNDERSDAY LUNCHEON

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
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SHELL CLUB MEETS MONDAY

On Sanibel there's no end to meeting interesting people. You've read ADVISE AND CON-SENT. of course? Alan Drury, who wrote it, is on the Island again. We can call him a Floridian, really, for he lives at least part of the time in Maitland. Alan is at the Island Inn. which he looks on as a second Florida home. The Islander can have the pleasure of announcing two of his forthcoming books, the third in his current political series, entitled CAPABLE OF HONOR, and THAT SUMMER, a non-political novel, which is expected to be in stock at MacIntosh's Book Shop about March 1. This summer Alan will be off for South Africa to observe the social, economic and political climate in preparation for a non-fiction work on that country. In his early writing career he was a newspaper correspondent; however, he much prefers his present 4to 6-hour a day schedule as an independent writer and he finds that fiction allows him more freedom to probe into motivation and to interpret broadly. He has been coming to Sanibel for 12 years.

This would seem to be Literary Week on the Island. Your reporter leaves one literary light and promptly bumps into two more: STEPHEN and JANET GREENE. He is a former London war correspondent for the Paris News (and other leading papers) and she is a former crack reporter for the UP. They are now leading a less strenuous life as editors on the staff of Vermont Life Magazine and as book publishers (The Stephen Greene Press, Brattleboro, Vt.), but still strenuous enough to put out some 20 non-fiction books a year, mostly concentrated Americana, By choosing works within a limited subject area, a publishing house builds its own special identity.

Sometimes the Greenes recognize there would be interest in a book that hasn't yet been written, so they ask someone to author it: this is how VERSE BY THE SIDE OF THE ROAD (the story of the Burma-Shave jingles) came into being. In some cases the publisher may need to help the author shape his book -- that is, help him to stay within the limits of what he has to say and say it in a way that is easy to grasp -possibly he may even take part in the writing. This is Janet's specialty in the partnership.

On the subject of "creative writing" the Greenes had this to say, "It's a much misused term — there is no such thing. A laundry list is creative. Good writing should create in the reader's mind a clear picture of what it intends to convey."

Stephen has long been an admirer of Max Beerbohm and a collector of his works. The Greenes' own literacy and wit must be a rare inspiration, even among publishers, to many aspiring writers.

About Sanibel (discovered through their friend, MURRAY HOYT) Stephen and Janet had some thoughts worth sharing. With a characteristic facility for finding the right word, Janet had it, after a moment's reflection: integrity. Sanibel has it; she must keep it. The world has its big cities -- Florida already has its Miami -- but there is no other Sanibel. There

should be more of it! More of its lovely trees arching overhead; more of its almost rural, unhurried life. Even more, if needed, of the restrained and tasteful shop signs. Where else can you walk on a beach and say good morning to a stranger? You share the day here with other people. When you walk the beach it's not the same pathway again and again; it's a different beach every moment because of the people who share it, the anticipation of adventure and the pleasure of shelling. People who come to this island can get the most out of it by fitting themselves to Sanibel, not trying to fit Sanibel to their accustomed ways of life.



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


Miss MAYBELLE STAMPER of Captiva Island, was presented a \$2000 cash award at the Weatherspoon Gallery on the campus of the University of North Carolina in Greensboro, N.C. on Wednesday, Jan. 8, for her "Girl and Bird" which won first of first prizes in the Sears. Robuck competition.

The final judging of the 130 winning paintings selected during the past year from forty art festivals conducted throughout the South was made by Mr. Allen Frumpkin, an art judge of national and international repute, who maintains his own galleries in New York and Chi-

cago. Miss Stamper was born in Dublin, New Hampshire, and studied portraiture under George de Forest Brush, sculpture with vm. Zorach, and lithography with Will Barnett. She received her formal art training at the Museum of Fine Arts in Boston, the Art Students League of New York, and the Art Academy in Cincinnati, where she later taught for seven years. In her studio on Captiva, she pulls all of her own lithograph proofs on a hand-operated press. Many are printed in color, and to some the color is added by hand.

Her lighograph "Girl and Bird" was drawn on stone, and only ten proofs made. Each print has been carried out with casein water colors by hand, Miss Stamper describes it as a poem about the possible closeness of relationship between a human being and a song-bird.

Captiva for the last twenty eight years.



The Dunn Construction Co. will soon start to resurface that road and the Water Association hopes to get the pipe down through all crossovers before re-surfacing begins.

The road repair work that you may have noticed in progress on various stretches of main road on Sanibel has been the County's effort to add fill and tar for better safety and longer wear.


HUNGRY? DON'T MISS AUDUBON MEETING

An illustrated talk on the native edible plants of the Islands will be given at the next meeting of the Sanibel-Captiva Audubon Society at the Sanibel Community House at 8:20 Friday evening (tomorrow). The talk, by the society's Plant Conservation Chairman, Hervey Roberts of Captiva, will include both colored slides and actual specimens of the plants discussed.

Among the curiosities will be flowers which can be fried and weeds that make good pickles. But most of the talk will be devoted to wild plants that can either be used for survival or are good to eat any time. Visitors will be welcome.

Next Sunday morning, January 16, the society will conduct the first of a series of field nature trips that will also be open to the public. The group will meet at the Bird Observation Tower on Tarpon Bay Road at 9 a.m., and, under the leadership of Mr. Roberts, will visit Sanibel spots where birds and interesting plants can be found. The trip has been made one of the events of the Florida State Audubon Society's annual convention being held in Fort Myers this week.

Charles LeBuff, society program chairman, will lead the second field trip the following Saturday, January 22. This tour, to the famous Corkscrew Sanctuary near Immokalee, will start from the Sanibel Lighthouse at 7 a.m.



The Rev. TAD ALLEN had the excellent idea of asking Prof. LOWDIN to give an informal talk at Casa Ybel next Sunday (Jan. 16) on the meaning of Quantum Theory and its research applications. Islanders who would like to know more about the subject our visiting scientists are pursuing are invited to attend.

We do have a definition of the word quantum, which we are printing in the hope it might be of some help to our non-scientific readers. The word itself pertains to the concept (discovered at the turn of the century) of measuring energy as it is now thought to exist -in little bits (quanta) or, discrete amounts, Formerly energy was measured as though it was continuous. The continuous measurement, we're told, is exemplified by turning on the stove and find the flame high or low. This new way of looking at things makes exact measurements possible instead of approximations.

Very frankly, we still don't know what it means, so we are continuously (non-quantum?) glad that there are brilliant men who can understand such things, and that we run newspapers for a living!

Mrs. Per-Olov Lowdin, formerly a surgical operating room nurse. is now simply a wife and mother accompanying her husband, who has been directing a variety of scientific gatherings throughout the world (Nice, Geneva, and the summer counterpart of this institute, which is held each year in Lappland). NUT SQUARES (recipe from Haifa, Israel by Mrs. Pauncz) Make a dough of 2 c, flour and 1/4 lb, margar-

ine: and a touch of baking powder if flour is not self-rising.

Add 4 egg yolks 3 tbls sugar

grated peel of 1 lemon. Smooth this into bottom of a baking pan approximately 12 x 18 x 1/2'

Spread thinly with a piquant jam. Beat 6 egg whites, add 1 c. sugar, 7 1/2 oz. ground nuts, juice and peel of I lemon.

Use mixer briefly at low speed. Spread this as a top layer, bake 40 min. @ 250

JANSON'S TEMPTATION (a favorite Smorgasboard recipe from Mrs. Lowdin) In a baking dish place a layer of sliced raw potatoes, dots of butter, a layer of sliced onlons,

another layer of potatoes.


Add anchovies (Try to get the less salry Swedish type), butter, cream. Bake till potatoes are done. Serve with Aqua Vite or beer.





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
