







Anyway you look at it, however, Sebring is a nice place to be Saturday, March 26, (Thursday and Friday, too, if you can get the time.)

All media will be accepted, but the picture must be mounted on mat board cut to exactly 11 x 14 inches. Pictures should be signed on the back, with the title and the artist's age.







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

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
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#### WHO'S WHO ON CAPTIVA



A postcard by Gladys Childs

"My life started afresh when I came to the Island!" exclaim-ed Sarasota artist GLADYS CHILDS, with characteristic exuberance. It was a romantic turning point in her life. She was then a successful musician and writer with an unquietable urge for yet some other creative outlet. She came in distress over the death of her husband and was inspired by drfitwood, palms and old Sanibel landmarks to try her hand at drawing.

Several of these subjects are Aready gone, including the Coast Guard Tower, mailboat, and the old Captiva Postoffice. She

has preserved them for us. however, with her inimitable charcoal sketches.

Encouraged by her friend HELEN DENNY, to believe in this new talent even before she herself realized she had it, she continued doing Sanibel scenes, and at Helen's instigation, had them put on postcards.

They have appeared in shops all along the East coast, but distribution became a problem and they are now out of print (though some are still available at Edie Mugridge's Glory of the Sea.) They were an excellent springboard from which Gladys has gone on to bigger things. She is a member of the Bradenton Art League and her sketches of homes and familiar Fla. scenes have met with wide a-

Gladys is here on the Island she loves for less than a week this time. But when she found it in 1960, she stayed on and on for more than two years --- and became a real islander. Faces brighten in all quarters as word gets about that she is here again.

She can be seen with sketch pad, at work, when light and shadows are just right, doing her favorite scenes lighthouse, the "troubled" trees at Villa Capri and always the irresistible grasses and drift-wood on the beach. She is assembling her next one-man show which will be held early this summer at the art gallery in the Spartansburg-Greenville. S.C., airport. Between exhibits,

she keeps busy with commissions for painting and sketching, and she has not dropped her writing.

In her period of turmoil in 1960, Gladys wrote an article for Trailer Topics, called Second Time Around (her second home in a trailer.) She is still to be found in the second trailer, when at home, in Southwinds Trailer Park in Sarasota. She has just completed an autobiographical novei that is a record of her own period of adjustment when she moved to Florida as a young widow, with special emphasis on the influences that shaped her. Like Gladys, the heroine of her novel couldn't stay down --- she is a living bundle of creative urges and talents, and her joie de vivre just had to recover and assert itself.

Gladys has been staying at John Wright's Caribe Adventure. Some of her sketches can be seen on display there in the lounge.


She had been critically ill for several months. Dr. Edeards served the Chapel By the Sea for four seasons during the mid-50s and both he and his wife were greatly beloved by the islanders.

During Dr. Edward's pastoral here, the Chapel was purchased from the Methodist Church, It was repaired, enlarged and refloored, and a robing room and chairs were added. It is now owned by The Chapel By the Sea of Captiva Island.

Dr. and Mrs. Edwards bought the house of Mr. John Semmes of Baltimore, here on the gulf in 1952 where they lived until Mrs. Edwards' health made it necessary to live nearer to medical aid. They had lived many years in Pittsburg, Pa., until Dr. Edwards' retirement from active work in the Episcopal Church, and later moved to Asheville, N.C. Their son and grandchildren live in New Jersey.




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


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
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




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
