DON'T GIVE UP HOPE

Our Chamber of Commerce President, Norman Chambers, had the well-known experience recently of several days without phone service and he made repeated pleas to the company for repair. There was the usual ensuing period of no action and helpless frustration which too many of us have known.

It occurred to Norm that in this issue the Chamber could be of general service to the community. By working as a liaison between islanders --- that is, all residents of Sanibel and Captiva, whether members or not --- and the phone company, the Chamber will give strong backing to our individual complaints and give us a far better chance of getting prompt attention when phones are out of order. The following is an excerpt from a letter to the Chamber from D.T. Shearer, General Manager of the Inter-County Telephone & Telegraph Company:

Capt. Ernie Hall of Fort Myers, Fla, is the author of a book called, "Flotsam Jetsam and Lagan," published the week before Christmas, 1965, by the Cornell Maritime Press, Cambridge, Maryland, It took him nearly five years to write it. To quote a paragraph on the jacket cover---"Here is the evolution of sailing craft types, articles on famous ships, and work chanteys arranged for five-string banjo accompaniment---all packed tight into this 416-page, handsomely illustrated sea volumn. Here are sailors' superstitions, marine geography and maritime history all told in a style smacking full of the true flavor of the sea and waterfront."

Capt. Hall is most adept in his writing at using the right word and fresh phrase. His wife was a great inspiration and help in the preparation and com-piling of this sizable work.

It will be of much interest to the people of Sanibel and Captiva who know Eleanor Douglas Clapp (Mrs. Clapphas spent many seasons on Sanibel) that she is the artist who drew many of the pen and ink illustrations in this fine book. Most of them appear in the Evolution of Sail section.

Capt. Hall is now hard at work writing another book for the Cornell Maritime Press called "SPUN YARN, SCUT-TLEBUTT and VERACITY."

Eleanor Clapp will also be the illustrator for this book.

Timothy Charles Jordan, the infant son of Carl and Mozella Jordan, received the Sacrament of Holy Baptism.

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
