CAPTIVA FILL IS SUCCESSFUL

The County Commission, informed last week that the groins and fill on the Captiva gulf front were apparently doing their job of preventing further erosion and that the county planned to rebuild the road soon, approved spending an additional \$8,500 for an additional 25,000 cubic yards of fill.

The groins and fill so far installed have been paid for by the Captiva Erosion District with help from the County, which has contributed \$13,365 so far. The erosion district is planning to build a third groin, but will wait until full evaluation of the success of the work already done has been made. Commissioner P.A. Geraci, who had earlier advocated that the Federally financed county-wide erosion study planned by the Corps of Engineers be directed first at Captiva because of the emergency situation there, said he believes the district is wise to await final evaluation of the program and that the commissioners ought to go along with them. He then made a motion, which was accepted, to extend the work contract with the A-C Dredging Co. (which is doing the present dredging) to fill the additional 25,000 cubic yards on the beach.





BAILEY'S STORE by ethel snyder

Everyone who comes over to Sanibel knows Bailey's store. Last week the store moved into its new home in the new shopping center. The new location is ultra modern. The last word in luxury, beauty, and convenlence and located in exactly the right place. It is in the center of the island on the main road just before the turn to Captiva and with ample parking space.

But there will be some never-to-be-forgotten experiences in the old store which forever endear Bailey's store to the thoughts and hearts of the old timers!

There was Mrs. Whitney Mc-Gee, the cat, She lived on a top shelf inside where she sat on her neatly curled tail and looked down her nose at the customers beneath! She was haughty! Detached! But interested in what was going on in the store about her. You didn't pet Mrs. Mc-Gee. Althought well fed, she was averse to rats and they were no problem at the store!

Another thing about the store was that we always voted there. For all county, state and national elections we always went to Bailey's store to vote. Two booths were fixed up in the rear back store room. There were only three Republicans on Sanibel in those days. Mrs. Verona Morey of St. Louis, myself from Ohio, and most amazing, the postmaster, Capt Read.

Capt Read was postmaster for some fifty years and he had inherited the title and the post office from his father who was a Captain in the Union Army, And he also inherited his politics, and was the only Republican before Verona and I arrived.

We all came in for a lot of ribbing but it was all in good nature and for fun and we took it that way and loved voting at the store. Anyone felt free to open the curtains when we were marking our ballots, look in and make remarks. We replied in kind. It was such a hilarious experience it is remarkable some of those Democrats didn't make a mistake and vote the wrong ballot.

Ernest Bailey, the elder brother, used to stick his head

out of the store's front door when Mrs. Morey and I arrived and shout "Here come the red Republicans." "And that was before there were any REDS or Communists, We loved it!

On the Saturday when the mail boat arrived it brought over from town large slabs of ice. in hundred pound pieces, and a good supply of meat and fresh vegetables. The two younger Bailey boys. John and Sam, delivered the ice to the cottagers in the store truck when they got around to it. The slabs sat in the sun after being unloaded and grew beautifully less as time went on. Mine was nugget sized often when finally delivered but it was a chance you took!

Mr. Frank Bailey presided at the meat counter on Saturdays. Mr. Bailey always kept on his Fedora hat and tied on a capacious apron over his suit, and took a firm grip on the large meat knife! It didn't seem funny at the time, but now it does. Mr. Bailey knew exactly how many there were in every family and you didn't buy the amount of meat you wanted, but how much Mr. Bailey thought you ought to get. I never got much as you couldn't buy meat for a cocker and I lived alone. I have heard heated arguments over pork chops!

And then there were the doughnuts! It seemed odd that the store only got one dozen doughnuts. We took turns buying that dozen, passed them around to the bunch and they only lasted a few minutes. We asked Mr. Bailey why he only got one dozen doughnuts. Why he didn't get more? He replied "We eat too many ourselves!"

The mail boat and supplies for the store arrived from across San Carlos Bay promptly each day (except Sunday) atten, It landed at Bailey's dock, The passengers all rushed into the store to buy what they could while the freight was being unloaded by the Singleton Brothers and Joe Goddard from the store and anyone else around always gave a hand! This was quite an event each day. Capt Singleton made sure he had all his passengers aboard before the boat pulled out!

These are just some of the precious memories of Bailey's



Sunday was the lady's 70th birthday, and as a birthday surprise, her niece arranged the call to Jack.




LIBRARY FOOTNOTES
