## OVER 30,000 VISIT CHAMBER

Over 30,000 people visited the Chamber office (31,062 to be exact) during the past fiscal year, it was reported at last Wednesday's Chamber of Commerce meeting. Hard-working Bill Newman also answered 4,013 letters of inquiry, handed out over 35,000 brochures, sent out another 19,220 brochures to Welcome Stations and the like, and is still able to smile politely at our many visitors. High month for visitors, if you happen to dig statistics, was March, with 8,798---low month was September, with 312.

The results of the election of officers were announced. Al Muench is the new president, Floyd Snook, vice president, Jim Jack, treasurer, Roy Bazire, recording secretary, and Mary Cunningham, Norm Chambers and John Kontinos, Board of Directors members.

M.W. Manns of Inter-County Telephone reported to the Chamber, and said while the Islands had shown a 127% growth in telephone subscribers since the microwave was installed in 1963, the growth was not fast enough to support the present exchange financially. He said the company's investment on the Islands was as great as its investment

in Cape Coral, where there are 5,000 telephone subscribers as opposed to 450 on the Islands. He said a minimum of 1,200 to 1,500 subscribers would have to be on the Islands before a man could be assigned here.

Chamber members were reminded that the Board of Directors is bringing the white maps up to date; to assure the members's name and location on the new maps. the 66-67 dues should be in by May 14.

They had been attending another meeting on the mainland and rushed to Sanibel, arriving just in time. Included were L. H. "Bob" Whan, for county commissioner, District 2; two candidates for the school board, F. Edwin Rodgers and Dr. J. The meeting then broke up, chairs were folded and most of the voters departed. As the last handful of people were about to leave, two candidates for the Group 2 seat in the State

House arrived. As Will Rogers said (according to Grif Bancroft), "I belong to no political organization; I am a member of the Democratic Party." Roy Bazire, president of the Sanibel-Captiva Democratic Club, which sponsored the meeting, presided.

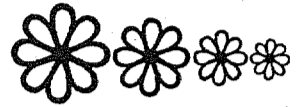

You know, Mr. Magician, that there will have to be another show. We're waiting!

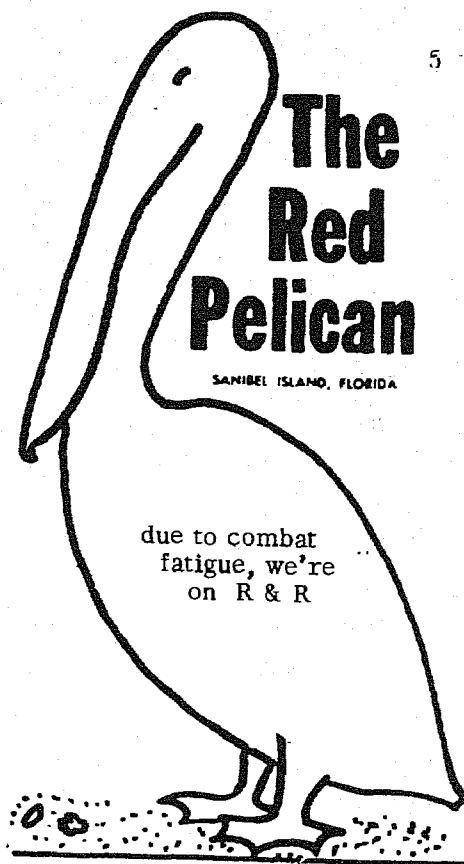
ARTHUR and MOLLY ORLOFF of the swingin' B-Hive just returned, relaxed and rosy, from a four day excursion to Bimini.

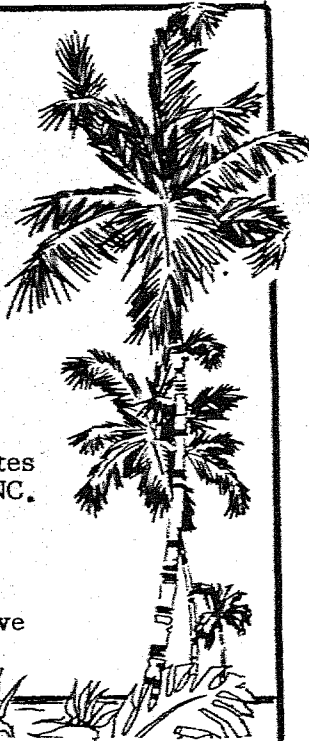
