Sanibel, on the contrary, is beginning to report good shelling in isolated spots, although many normally good shelling beaches are still shell-less in spite of the abnormally low tides.


To our un-trained eye, it also appears that most cottages and motels on Sanibel have a fairly good number of visitors for this time of year.

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



"We were looking 'orward to shelling on Padre Island (which is 100 miles long and almost directly across the Gulf from here off the Texas coast) and drove 25 miles down it---the only thing we saw was a beach covered with knee-deep seaweed! We figured the other 75 miles wouldn't be any better, so we just turned around. We did see a fine collection of local shells there, but it was in somebody's home, not on the beach!"

The Nixes spent their Texas vacation with Mary's sister, Mrs. W. FRED THOMPSON of Portland, Texas, and had left the Islands the weekend before Hurricane Alma.

"It was funny," Mary said... "We pulled into a service station about 50 miles from my sister's home, and when the service station attendant looked at our tag, he said 'Oh, I see you're getting away from the hurricane.' Tom then said, 'We never have hurricanes in June,' and I chimed right in with 'It's much too early.'

much too early.' "'It may be too early,' said he, 'but you've got one---right off some place called Naples.' "We hadn't looked at a paper

or listened to a radio for three days, and the news took us by surprise. As soon as we got to my sister's house, we tried to call Sanibel, but the lines were't open. Then I called my brother in Winter Haven, who had been staying in our cottages while we were gone, and found out they left early Wednesday and would go back Thursday to see the damage, if any, and call us. "We were very relieved to hear the damage was slight, except to one cottage which lost some shingles in the front. We

will have to replace the whole front, because they were all torn off from the middle, but it could have been much worse.

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





A VIEW OF THE ISLANDS

Our first trip to Sanibel and Captiva was in the washboard road era, some 22 years ago. At that time we spent our Christmas holidays learwater Beach, limited to three weeks because of childrens' at (ons. We had heard of the fabulous shelling at Sanibel and Captiva, va we took a day to drive down and back to Clearwater. Not being 200 shellers, the memory of that is rather dim, but the memory of the beautiful beach remained. The next year we spent two days, staying at the delightful 'Tween Waters Inn. Our cottage was on the road, directly across from the Gulf. Everything about our stay was perfect, weather cool so we had a log fire in the fireplace at night; excellent meals, delightful hostess and other guests, and a never to be forgotten sunset. In our travels all around Florida in the years since, we have found the sunset on these islands to be the most perfect. There have been disappointing years since, when the weather was not as perfect--far from it---cold and dull, sunsets absent. Some years passed hefore our return, as we bought a winter home on the east coast, in Fort Lauderdale. My husband is a Naval Academy graduate with a real love of the bounding deep, and a died-in-the-wool deep sea fisherman. Only sailfish and marlin interest him at all, and the higher the waves crest the better he likes it. I am a landlubber. . . as is my younger daughter, who lives at home. She is the sheller, and the instigator of our trips to your islands.

For the past eight years we have spent the Shell Fair week on either Sanibel or Captiva, and look forward to it---not my husband, Heaven Kefend! He is happy to have us go, because we come home with enthusiastic comments, along with live shells which he decrees we must throw in our canal, so we hide them whenever and as long as possible.

Years have changed since our first trip, as you know better than I. No more washboard roads, many places to stay, the road on Captiva almost washed away, and last but far from least---no ferry! We miss it---but agree that Progress must be accepted. Some of us wish this didn't have to be. The bridge is fine, a delightful ride---and we do like the road from Fort Myers.

I remember when we---my daughters and I---spent a week on Captiva. In order to telephone my lonesome husband in Fort Lauderdale we had to drive 17 miles to the end of Sanibel to make the call, wait and wait and wait, and if we were fortunate, talk to him, then drive 17 miles back.

Another time, and this only about eight years ago, my younger daughter Sandra, and I, had planned to drive to the islands after spending Christmas with our older daughter, Vylma, and her family, in Washington, D.C. After Christmas dinner, everyone satiated with food. contented, the talk veered toward our trip. My husband, who was flying back to work in the morning, said "Vyl, why don't you go along?" yl, who had two children at the time, but who is an inveterate
