
CHARLIE by ethel snyder





You're never too young to learn that a library offers many things -- books, puzzles, fun, learning, adventure -- and just downright enjoyment!


LIBRARY NEWS

The final session of the Smokey Bear Reading Club will be held on Wednesday, July 27, starting at 10 a.m. The children will meet Smokey Bear himself at a party at the Sanibel Community House.

The Smokey Bear Vacation Reading Club, sponsored by the Sanibel Public Library, has been very well attended. Sixty children have been meeting each Wednesday under the supervision of Mrs. Harry Romine and her assistants, Miss Pauline Wilson, Mrs Walter Strong, Mrs. George Winterbotham and Mrs. Richard Fuller.

Smokey Bear, from the State Forestry Department, will present a certificate to each child who has read ten books during the summer program. In case of the pre-school child, each child who has had ten books read to him will get the certificate. There has been quite a group of these younger children, as Mrs. Romine believes the time to teach a child to love and respect books is when he is of nursery school age.





While most of the spraying for mosquitos on the Islands is done by plane, the Lee County Mosquito Control District would like to emphisize that it is very dangerous for children to play near a "land" fogger while it is in operation.

T.W. Miller, Jr., District Director, said it was "imperative that parents absolutely forbid their youngsters to go near a fogger while it is in operation."

He went on to say that the danger was three-fold. One, motorists are severely restricted from seeing any distance in the fog, so the child may be hit by a car; two, the ejection nozzel, which is hard to see, gets as hot as 1,200 F., and could cause severe burns; and third, the insecticide is toxic. While normal contact is not harmful, over-exposure is hazardous and may cause poisioning.

Funeral services and interment took place in Indiana.





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
