





THE EGOIST by ethel snyder

Everyone has a favorite novel, for one reason or another. "THE EGOIST" written by Geo-rge Meredith, a British novelist of Queen Victoria era has been mine from the very first time I read it. And it has remained my favorite even though that is a long time ago and a procession of good novels has marched in between that first reading and the last reading of the same novel!

Robert Louis Stevenson has stated somewhere in his writ-ings that he had read "The Egoist" five times already. And he gave the impression that there might be another time! My first copy was bound in soft red leather with heavy gilt edge on the pages on top of the book. If I liked a book I bought a copy for my very own! (And always liked to get the best edition.) This red leather was very pleasing to handle, soft and pliant, clear excellent type, and the more times it got read by me and by several others who borrowed it, the nicer it was to handle! But alas---alak! It got stuck in some gooey fly paper in the kitchen of an Ohio farm when I was up there one summer! What that fly paper could do was amazing. It spread! It multiplied its location, it oozed! The sheets of the book stuck together, the gold topping melted. It was unbelievable that fly paper could do all this product did. There wasn't a book store in the village so it meant no "Egoist" until I got back to Columbus.

The new copy was soft dark green leather with gilt edge top to pages. The printing was good but the book as a whole did not have the elite the first one had had.

But several book-hound friends were delighted with The Egoist and I read this one through twice, That is, almost twice! Once and a half was more accurate. It had the misfortune to fall into a trout stream in northern Michigan! Now any. one will agree that to be immersed entirely and completely in running water is destructive beyond repair to a paper book The third volume is the least attractive but it has the distinction of coming through in

perfect form!

Then Smokey presented certificates to 34 youngsters who had each read ten books during the summer reading program and to 14 pre-school children whose mothers had read ten books to each of them.


Refreshments were served by the Library Committee and mothers.

CANADA CALLING by enid p. donahue

July 1, Dominion Day, marked the beginning of the long weekend which includes Independence Day and also the day Joseph and yours truly opened the Ka Kah Wa Park --and also the day Joseph nearly got himself killed. If it had not been for a visitor from Florida, he might have lost an arm. As it was, he did lose his voice over the week-end. It was like this:

Joseph had a 5' blade rotary mower attached to the tractor when he picked up a piece of wire. He stopped the blade and lifted the mower with the tractor hoist and was struggling to remove the wire when the hoist let go. The mower guard dropped across Joseph's upper arm and pinned him to the ground on the off side and out of sight from passing traffic. Being Dominion Day, cars were passing at the rate of one per second with a continuous roar. He lay there and yelled for an hour and a unable to free himself. half.

Bob and Connie Hurd, old Muskokoans who now live in St. Petersburg, Fla., came up for the summer and dropped in to see us. I was away and the door locked. They nearly left when Bob thought he heard a cry of help. He couldn't see anything but wandered over to the Park under the pines to see how the work was progressing and discovered poor Joseph on the point of collapse. It took fifteen minutes of prying with a 2 x 4 to release him. Although not broken, the arm is still 'hors de combat' from nerve and

tissue damage. It still looks rather like a storm coming up over the Gulf!

Joseph has fallen in the river in a log jam, gone through ice on a horse at 25 degrees below zero and fought many adangerous fire but he said he was never so scared in his life as being trapped with hundreds of people passing and unable to hear him!

As for the Park, despite the unfinished building and not a man for the hiring, and a lack of picnic tables that have to be assembled --- Ever see a one armed carpenter? --- the season got off to a flying start. Our first campers came for one night and stayed 17. Another party is still with us. With 40 days or more without a drop of rain and temperatures well into the 90s, every Government park is stuffed to overflowing and all the well known places have been turning people away. Even the Provincial Police are directing people to us. They can't park along the road without toilet facilities and water.

The four-lane highway has reached beyond the Severn River now on Highway 11, about to 4 miles south of us. At the rate the work is progressing ... they were still hard at it when I wiggled through the jam last night about 7:00 p.m. and maybe they work around the clock. At any rate they will be up to our place in a week or two. When they hit the Beaver Creek Hill, any trailerites with sense will get their trailers off the bottle-neck and do their running around unencumbered. Traffic HAS to go through but it will tie up at times.

short of the 45th parallel (half way between the Equator and the North Pole); half way between the dance pavilion of Bala and the Champlain Park of Orillia. In a radius of 25 miles there are 29 lakes, unless I missed a few. Seven or eight rivers, the Trent Canal System (often see boats from as far away as Oregon and B.C., Texas and Nantucket) and just 4 miles south of Gravenhurst, the Gateway to the Muskoka Lakes. 

Handy, huh? By the way, Ka Kah Wa is the Indian word for Rooster (or cockerel) and of course the park is named for the Cockerills, your old Sanibelites. Our big white rooster (on the sign) has shoulder pips for the Captain and a blue collar with a fleurde-lys on it. Joseph is from Quebec and Capt. Cockerill was of Norman origin if you go back 900 years, to General Cocquerille, William the Conqueror's 'Little Banty Cock, 'I don't know whether he was a small man or just a young fire-eater, but the rooster became his coat of arms.

So, if any of you are head-ing our way, "Come up and see us sometime."

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
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
