WATER HOOK-UP ON ISLANDS BEGUN

Thirty-seven of 414 Island Water Association subscribers (the first of whom was John Kontinos at the Coconut Grove Restaurant) were en-

joying potable water by Monday.

"We're hooked up from Coconut Grove to the Lighthouse now," said Pat Murphy Monday afternoon, "and they'll be checking for water purity tomorrow and Wednesday along Gulf Drive and the Rabbit Road section. With luck, Sanibel should be completely hooked up by Thursday or Friday, and with even more luck, we might be in operation up to the water station on Captiva Island by the weekend."

The Island Water Association, which is a non-profit organization, has spent nearly \$600,000 on the water system so far. This money, which came from a government loan, will be paid back by the subscribers' monthly payments. "At least it had better be," said Pat, "or we'll

all be in hot water."

Pat also added a note of warning to Islanders who have washing machines in their homes—either switch to a sudsless detergent (which is

really better for septic tanks anyway) or else cut down drastically on the amount of detergent used in the washing.

"You see," Pat said, "this water is a lot softer than the water we have been used to—one woman on Pine Island put a wash in her machine with the amount of detergent she had been used to using; then she went off to the store. When she returned, she had about a foot of suds all over the floor."

UNITED FUND OVER GOAL

The Sanibel-Captiva United Fund Drive reached \$3,100---25% over the goal for this year and 20% more than last year. This year, the contributions went to all the regular organizations in Lee County plus two new ones---the Children's Home Society and the YMCA.

Mrs. Ralph Woodring (Ann not only collected from Islanders——she got checks from temporary guests, too) and Mrs. Mary Purdy were the

first workers to complete their fund-raising.

Glen Rhodes and Marty Holtz of the Rescue Unit were called, but attempts at artificial respiration by the six men were useless. Deputies Ralph Smith, Dave Yeomans and Ken Carper were also unable to revive him.

· It is thought that the shock passed through him as he held the battery charger and leaned against a steel rail on the boat. He had burns on his left arm and on the palm and ring finger of his right hand.

Head coach Mike Lienhardt introduced his coaching staff and boys on the varsity team. They, in turn, introduced their parents.


A lively question and answer session was conducted by Lienhardt. The next Booster Club meeting will be Nov. 1.
