ADULT EDUCATION CLASSES ALMOST FULL

Four classes in the new Adult Education Program on Sanibel got under way on Monday, November 7, and Wednesday, November 9. Both sessions were the usual opening-day classes, during which the courses were outlined, required text-books and other supplies and equipment suggested for subsequent meetings.

Since the inception of the idea during the summer by an Island group, a great amount of interest and enthusiasm for the project has been indicated by both summer residents and those who were away for the hot months, but who were apprised of developments by articles in the Islander. Many letters were received as a result of these notices, expressing approval of the idea and asking to be registered for the various courses.

The courses now being offered, which may be augmented by others if interest is shown in their inclusion in the schedule, are Conversational French and Spanish, Current Events and Drawing-painting, as well as Basic Adult Education which takes in primary subjects.

The basic course is held twice weekly, and the others once a week. Current Events and French are held on Monday nights at 7:30 and Drawing-Painting and Spanish on Wednesday nights at that same hour. The classes last for approximately two hours.


The registration for the classes exceeded all expectations, and, in some instances, taxed the capacity of the classrooms. Entries will still be accepted at next week's classes for whatever openings remain, after which, if the necessity arises, additional classes may be formed.

Mr. Cecil Waldron of the Lee County Board of Public Instruction, who has guided this program for the Island committee, has stated that other subjects may be included if there is a demand for them and if a minimum group of twelve persons can be formed as students. School nights have been purposely staggered so that more than one subject may be taken by the same student, Many Monday night "repeaters" were present for each of the Wednesday classes.

more advanced levels, are now being offered.



BANCROFT TO RUN BIRD TOURS

Griffing Bancroft, an Island resident for the past eight years and member of the Audubon Society, has agreed to conduct Island bird tours for visitors and residents.

Bill McIntosh of the bookshop, who will handle the reservations for the tours, said that he'd been trying to lure Griff away from his full-time job of writing and bird observation to share his knowledge of local birds with others, and finally won out.

Mr. Bancroft started working with birds with his father, Griffing Bancroft, Sr., a noted ornathologist in California. With his father, he made field trips for the San Diego Museum and San Diego Zoo, They did extensive work together in Lower California, where they discovered several new subspecies, two of which are named after them——Bancroft's Yellow Crowned Night Heron and Bancroft's Screech Owl.

Over the years, they built up one of the largest private collections of birds' eggs, which they later gave to the San Diego Museum.

Since coming to Florida eight years ago, Griff has concentrated on studying birds of Sanibel and Captiva Islands. A graduate of the University of Chicago, he took post-graduate work in Zoology at the University of Southern California.

He and his wife, Jane, live on Captiva Island, where he keeps busy writing Voice of American scripts and doing free-lance work. This past summer he revised and updated a book on the meaning of Communism for the Silver Burdette Publishing House in New Jersey, which is quite well known in the educational field for text books and other educational literature. Before moving to Captiva, he was a Washington commentator for

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
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

Thick silence. Then an outburst of laughter in which he heartily joined. There was never any doubt thereafter about Albert Spalding's sense of


