


EXHIBIT OF PAINTINGS AT PIRATE PLAYHOUSE

SANCTUARY EXCHANGED

Exchange of lands between the State and Federal Governments to assure that the Ding Darling Sanctuary will become an operation of the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service will be carried out under the Endangered Species Act of October 15, 1966, Dick Koss of Des Moines, Iowa, reported to the Ding Darling Sanctuary Committee at its meeting in the Koss home in the Colony last week.


Present at the meeting were Dick and Mary Koss, Opal Combs, Hervey Roberts, Joe Gault, James Jack, Charles LeBuff and Roy Bazire.

Subsequent word from the Atlanta office of the Service advises that steps have already been taken to complete the exchange. Final exchange, however, will have to await completion of further survey work.

Arrangements were also completed this week to repair the dikeaccess through the Sanctuary. County Commissioners gave the go-ahead to the County Engineer to do the work, after Island Chamber of Commerce and the Ding Darling Committee urged that action. The question of future maintenance has yet to be settled until Fish & Wildlife takes responsibility for the area.

Installation of canoe launches and replacement of the canoe trail signs is under way. A memorial plaque and an information sign will be placed at the Alice O'Brien Bird Tower, with formal dedication ceremony to be held during the winter season.

These improvements are projects of the local Ding Darling Committee, using funds contributed to the Foundation in Des Moines, Iowa, for use in the Sanctuary.

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



Gifts-Driftwood-Specimen Shells

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Three members of the Florida State Legislature, along with other high ranking state officials, toured local beaches this weekend, basing their tour at South Seas Plantation on Captiva. The three, Sen. A.J. Ryan of Broward County, Rep. Ted Randall of Lee County and Rep. Bernie Papy of Monroe County, are sponsoring new bills in Tallahassee aimed to give the State more control over beaches and public owned bay areas.

The highlight of the two day meeting was a Monday morning two and a half hour helicopter flight from South Seas to Anna Maria Island at the foot of Tampa Bay and then back to the Naples area. Lee County Engineer James DeLozier pointed out problem areas in Lee County to the group. Beach erosion on Captiva and Fort Myers Beach were the two most important local items pointed out by DeLosier.

At a "workshop" later Monday DeLosier urged that the State should purchase "at least four, possibley more," helicopters to patrol beaches and bays for violators of fish and game laws and to spot people who are dredging prior to obtaining state approval for their fill operations.


Ney Landrum, Director of the Florida Outdoor Recreational Planning Committee stated that while beach erosion was a problem on the Islands, areas on the Atlantic side of the state had it much worse. "It is true that Captiva has been hit fairly hard by loss of beachfront but over there, there are \$125,000 houses tipped into the ocean. That's a little worse than the loss of some road and a few picnic tables down in the park." Landrum also stated that the main object of his committee at the present time was obtaining land for future recreational use. "We have six million dollars funded now, but four of those are already spent in Dade County for one tract of land, Cape Florida. The remaining two million must be parceled out over the rest of the state."

During the discussion, Rep. Randall (well known in this area as an ardent conservationist) mentioned that the new bill would require the State Internal Improvement Fund to follow the recomendations of the State Board of Conservation on bulkhead lines. If the Board said that fish breeding and spawning grounds were important, the Fund could not sell the bay bottoms to a private individual. Rep. Papy objected, saying that, "Sometimes people are more important than fish." That part of

the proposed bill was passed over until a later date.

CHIT CHAT ON PALMS

Brazil helps to keep American city streets clean! The coarse stiff fibres of the Bahia Piassame palm tree supplies the bristles for the stiff brooms used by the street departments of the city!

The Afican Oil Palm (Elaeis guineensis) and the coconut palm are best known sources of the palm

oils used in the manufacture of soap.

Of course the fruit of the coconut palm are the chief for something else. How many however, when eating a slice of fresh coconut cake or some delicious coconut candy ever think of it as the

fruit of a palm tree?

In the Far East palm trees produce one billion pounds of sugar annually. There are more than a dozen sugar producing palms in south Asia. The coconut is best known. The black sugar palm and the Fish tail palm also produce. They need no harvesting as do cane or beets. But only hand labor can be used. The flower stalks give out the flow of sap and are tapped. Not the trunks of the trees. The African Wind Palm and the Chilean Honey Palm are also producers of sugary sap.

The powdery protective wax that covers the younger leaves of the Brazilian Carnanba Palm is the basic constituent of the finest floor, furniture and automobile wax. Also used in making carbon

There is a palm grown in Malaya and the East Indies and the Philippines from which is derived rattan. Furniture is made from the canes while the outer rind is split to make the woven seats of chairs. This is from the genera Calamus.




