CHAMBER OF COMMERCE PAST, PRESENT, FUTURE

What was first known as the "Sanibel-Captiva Business Association" consisted of a few hard working, hardy folks (men and women) who got together and laid the foundation of what was later to become the "Sanibel-Captiva Islands Chamber of Commerce."

A great deal of credit goes to the founders of the "Business Association." They had all kinds of obstacles to overcome over the years. They donated a tremendous amount of time, energy and their own money to create and build up this infant organization.

For years the office was located in the "Community House" on Sanibel Island, (The Community Association donated office space, etc., to the Chamber of Commerce free of charge.)

The officers and members (being a determined lot) worked hard over the years to build its membership from just a few to approximately one hundred five (today).

The problems from the beginning have been many and varied; but have been met and solved each in its turn,

Arguments were many; and sometimes a meeting would last late into the night.

New and better ideas were the offsprings of each meeting. These ideas had to be put to the test and groomed in a trial and error manner, (Lack of funds prevented the hiring of expert help from the outside.)

The Chamber of Commerce and its members have always worked along with all other organizations (mainland and Islands) towards improved conditions at State, County and local

The increase of guests to the Islands has risen gradually over the years. From a few dozen a day (registered at the office) up to 300 (on some busy days). The amount of registered visitors from April 1, 1965 to April 1, 1966 was 31,062,

Letters of inquiry for the same period -- 4,013; brochures and maps given out in the office--35,000; and brochures and maps sent thru the mail to Welcome Stations, Chamber of Commerce offices (U.S.), Organizations (U.S., Canada, S.A., England, Mexico. Germany, etc.) -- 23,233,



THE ISLAND WATER ASSOCIATION, INC.

The Island Water Association's dedication ceremony inaugurating the new water system for the Islands of Sanibel and Captiva was held at 10:00 o'clock on the morning of 15th December 1966. The full support of the residents of both Islands and the hard work of their representatives, who were the Water Board, made the dream of this fine system a reality. The funds for construction were advanced by The Farm Home Administration, and are repayable over a period

This modern system has forty-five miles of pipe that wind throughout the area carrying water to homes and business establishments. The wells that furnish this water are located on the mainland some twenty-five miles from Sanibel or Captiva. It is then routed to Pine Island where it is treated, softened and pumped through a subacquious line that traverses San Carlos Bay and terminates at the Dixie Beach Pumping Station on Sanibel. From this location the water is then distributed to the users on both Islands. There are two more stations that perform the vital job of boosting to maintain a normal pressure of about fifty pounds throughout. One of these stations is located on State Highway 867 near the junction of Rabbit Road on Sanibel, the administrative office for the Association is also housed at this location. The other station is on Captiva a short distance from the Al-Gordon Bridge.

The Island Water Association completed its first full month of operation at the end of November. During this period 354 customers used 3,090,000 gallons of water for an average of 103,000 gallons per day. The most water used for one day was 158,000 and the least amount was 29,000. The largest user was the Casa Ybel Resort (about 250,000 gallons for the month). However, the majority of users, about 85%, did not even use the 7,000 gallons allowed for the minimum billing of \$0.00

Technical difficulties are being overcome as the system is perfected and its operators gain experience. To date there have been only minor delays in service and as time goes on these problems will become rare indeed. Some local interruptions of very short duration will occur when new members are added, and when a main line must be cut and drained users beyond the cut will notice a small amount of air in their lines for a few hours.

One might pause a moment to vision what the system will be forty years from now when the loan is completely repaid to the Farm Home Administration. How many users will there be, how many miles of line will be involved, and how many of todays members will be there to celebrate the occasion? These questions are not too important now; what really counts is that the residents of Sanibel and Captiva, present and future, have a new water system as modern as any, to use and enjoy.


TEENS IN ACTION





Just the conventional mower being pushed by a mower could not do it. A harvesting looking contraption with a cutting machine and the driver sitting high in the driver's seat does the job! The tall grass piles up behind the blades and here is where the fun begins!

A flock of large white egrets with very long necks and very long yellow legs have been circling about up above in the crystal clear blue sky watching to see when the mower has made enough progress and enough grass is lying prone. Then they flutter down over the cleared place like a snow storm and stalk choice bits. Bugs, I fancy. What kind I wouldn't know, but they must be choice and succulent and not to be over-looked.


These may not be the variety which grow the long feathers so fashionable and expensive for years. But their relatives grew them and how thankful I was they—the feathers—have gone out of style.

Parade of the feathered soldiers more than rivals any Thanksgiving Day parades you might have seen --- and these are within an hour's drive --- at Caribbean Gardens in Naples. In spite of their beauty, 'tis possible they're closely related to geese; there are six species of flamingoes, distributed in four widely spaced areas of the world --- the swamps of France, the Great Rann Kutch of India, the salt lake Ab-istadeh in Afghanistant and the Salar del Huasco, which is 14,000 feet up in the Andes. Normally very shy, they do adapt to public adulation as evidenced by the two types found in the Gardens (West Indian and Chilean) who feed and nest within 20 feet of the main trail.
