# PHOTO EXHIBIT AT "SEA HORSE" ART GALLERY

An exhibit of Wildlife Color Photos by Mario F. Hutton will take place at the Art Gallery of the Sea Horse Shop, Sanibel, from Jan. 17 to the 31st. The exhibit will include over sixty framed enlargements from slides, never before shown, most of them taken in the Ding Darling Willife Sanctuary, with others featuring birds photographed in their natural habitats on Captiva, Kitchell Key and several other Southwest Florida localities. Mr. Hutton's pictures are distributed world-wide by Photo Researchers, Inc. of New York and Hillingdon, England.

A receptic for the preview of the exhibit will be held on Tuesday, January 17, from 5 to 8 p.m.


# MEETINGS HELD ON COUNTRY CLUB



New Island residents: If you were in your home on December 31, 1966, don't forget to apply for your homestead exemption on property tax. This is not automatic. Everyone must apply, every year. Those who have had homestead exemption receive a form each year from the County tax office. But, if you are a new home owner, you must make the first application yourself by going into the County Tax Assessor's office, Lee County Building, Fort Myers. All you need bring is your last recorded deed.

She's interested in practically all sports, as well as travel, languages and the theater.






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### SHELL CLUB CLINIC


on down.
