

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COUNTRY CLUB FINANCES EXPLAINED

AT MEETING

About seventy persons turned out to attend a meeting held on Tuesday, January 10, at the Sanibel Community House, to hear John Kontinos, chairman of the committee planning the proposed Sanibel-Captiva Golf and Country Club, explain the architectural, financial and membership aspects of the venture.


Mr. Kontinos explained that the committee has obtained an option

> The tentative total costs involved are \$60,000 for the land, \$222,000 for a completed and ready-to-play 18 hole golf course which includes a \$10,000 contingency fund, \$25,000 for a water system, \$45,000 for a club house and furnishings, \$24,000 for a swimming pool, tennis courts and bowling greens for a total of \$376,000. A 40 year F.H.A. loan with interest at 5% payable at the rate of \$20,000 per year can be arranged. Mr. Kontinos said. Additionally \$30,000 to \$40,000 which cannot be borrowed will be needed to purchase equipment for the course. This cost will be met by a one-time initiation fee of \$100 to be charged to each of the 376 members needed to begin the project.

> Thus, said Mr. Kontinos, the 376 members will pay an initiation fee of \$100, payable \$50 on signing up and the balance before the club opens. The annual membership fee will be \$250 payable in monthly installments. A family membership entitles the head of the family and members of his immediate family to use all club facilities. Non-members of the club will be allowed golf privileges for a greens fee of \$7.50. Motels may buy multiple memberships at the rate of one membership for each five units and this will entitle their guests to golf for a greens fee of \$3. The motels will each have only one vote in club elections even though they hold multiple memberships. Non-members will not be allowed pool or tennis privileges according to present plans. No restaurant or liquor sales are contemplated. A luncheonette will serve light refreshments and soft drinks. Golf carts will be available for rental.

> Several persons inquired as to membership costs for only one person and Mr. Kontinos stated the committee would probably approve these at one-half the regular membership charge. Others asked why as members their guests would pay a \$7.50 greens fee while motel member guests would pay only \$3. After discussion it was concluded that the committee would study this aspect of fees and probably reduce the fee for guests of members to \$3 when they actually played golf with the individual member.

many more workers to fill them.

It was not until the middle of the summer of 1966, however, that the nominees were notified of their appointment as members of the Lee County Housing Authority. They were: Adm. E.G. Konrad, chairman; Donald Simonds, Joseph Green, Elizabeth Adler and Leon R. Levy. Subsequently, Elizabeth Adler resigned, as a result of moving to another community, and Robert C. Haynie's name was suggested as her replacement. His appointment is now in the process of being confirmed.

We have now been assured by the County Attorney, Mr. Pavese, that all matters pertaining to the preliminary moves have been settled by his office, and that we can shortly proceed with the necessary initial applications to the proper agencies. This does not mean, necessarily, that favorable action is assured, since many criteria and standards for obtaining funds must still be met, but we will at least have the opportunity to present our case and to determine whether or not further procedure will be possible,

We had hoped, at the time of the first meeting, that, in the intervening elapsed period up to this date, we might have seen concrete evidence of accomplishment. Instead, we are at the same point as when we started the discussions. We continue to be hopeful that the situation may change for the better.

This report is directed to those island residents who have wondered why, after the great show of interest in the project, no progress has been made, and it is the sincere wish of the members of the Authority that its next report may be more encouraging.



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

Unusual birds spotted included the Roseate Spoonbill, which is usually rare but is more common in December, the Orange-crowned Warbler, which is new for the Sanibel-Captiva count, the Northern Waterthrush, also new for the count, and the Solitary Vireo, which was not only new for the contd, on p. 5

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

It is impossible to list all of the birds spotted, but in case you store statistics to amaze your friends, more Lesser Scaups (3,130) were sighted than any other species. The Redbreasted Merganser (984), the Royal Tern (480), the Snowy Egret (316), the White Ibis (393), the Laughing Gull (304) and the Red Ringed Blackbird (302), were the only other birds seen in numbers above 300.

Six Eagles were seen (five adult and one unknown) and, at

the other end of the scale. singletons spotted were one each of the Least Bittern, Ringnecked, Red-tailed, Pigeon and Marsh Hawks, common Snipe, Morning Dove, Screech Owl, common Grache, Carolina Wren and the Northern Waterthrush.

And, in the interests of conversation-stopping facts, the Islands' population includes 92 Mockingbirds, five Loggerhead Shrikes, four Ruby-crowned Kinglets, five Great Crested Flycatchers, 129 Sanderlings, 175 American Widgeons, and 49 White Pelicans.



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
