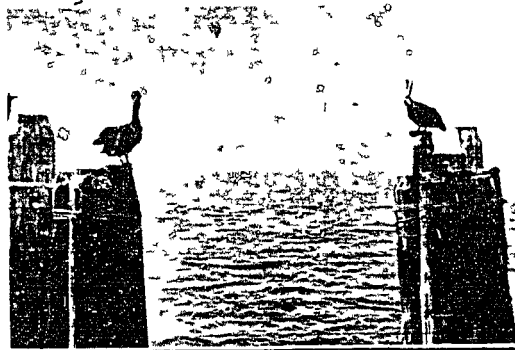

RECORD REAL ESTATE YEAR

More than 2 1/4 million dollars worth of property exchanged hands on Sanibel and Captiva Islands during 1966, for a record year of property sales. Not only is the amount significant, but the variety of property moved—gulf front, bay front, residential lots, business lots, acreage, motels, homes and duplexes. Two of the biggest sales were of motels, The Reef and Sanibel Cottages, which also totaled more than 1,000 feet of Gulf frontage. The Reef was also the largest motel sale during 1966 in Lee County. This major indicator of real estate activity on the island—Gulf frontage—hit a booming mile of sales. Of this,

LOCAL ARTISTS WIN HIGH HONORS

The Sanibel-Captiva Art League of the South West Florida Art Council scored heavily in the National Art Show of Cape Coral which opened on Sunday, January 21, which may be viewed by the public through January 28, in the Patriots Pavillion of the Cape Coral rose garden.

Hugo Asbach's "Topkapi" oil painting in tones of blues and golds won the top prize of \$200 dollars plus a week's vacation for two at Cape Coral. Dodi Booth's "God Is" won the blue ribbon first in oils with a cash prize of \$150. Helene Sparkes' "After The Storm" won an honorable mention in the watercolor class as did Onetta McCulloch's "Celeste". In the mixed-media category Jane Bancroft's "In The Sanctuary" was accepted for showing by the jurors. As was a local artist's work in various types of presentation is a representative one and includes a high quality of imaginative works. The fact that the show attracted a large number of entries from all parts of Florida and from other states indicates a growing interest on the part of artists in the competition and points up an excellence in the offerings of local island painters in the number of prizes awarded to them.

FLOOD DISASTER BENEFIT TO BE HELD

A Casa Benefit will be held at 8 15 p.m. Tuesday, February 14, in the new auditorium of Casa Ybel on Sanibel. The entire proceeds will go to the Florentine Relief Fund, Inc. of New York, established to accept and forward to Italy contributions to alleviate the suffering of thousands of families affected by the disastrous floods that hit Florence and many other Italian cities and villages last November. A substantial percentage of all funds collected are earmarked for the salvage and urgent restoration of many priceless art masterpieces, some almost beyond repair, when the river Arno suddenly inundated the center of Florence, its galleries and churches on the night of November 4.

The initiative of holding the benefit was taken by Mario F. Hutton, of Commerce of New York, and now a Sanibel resident. He contacted the President of the Chamber, Emilio Mayer, just returned after visiting the devastated regions of Italy, who granted that the benefit be held under the sponsorship of the Chamber. more than 4,000 feet were on Sanibel, the balance on Captiva. Home activity reached new and impressive highs—at least 26 homes were sold. The bulk of activity in this area was on Captiva, where 16 homes were sold.

Lot sales covered the Islands. A total of more than 50 unimproved lots were sold, other than gulf frontage. These were located on bay, canals, bayous, and inland, and included the following subdivisions: The Rocks, Palm Lake, Sanibel Estates, Anchors Away, Sanibel Shores, Tradewinds, Captiva Beach, Chateaux-sur-Mer, South Winds and La Costa Isles.

About 55% of gulf frontage sold was zoned for motel or multiple dwelling use, all on Sanibel. Of the balance zoned for single family dwelling, the division was almost 50/50 between Sanibel and Captiva.

S. P. GUEST
RETIREES FROM CONGRESS

Dr. George Wehnes Calver, attending physician for Congress for 38 years and a long-time guest of South Seas Plantation on Captiva Island, finally took some of his own advice (for health, he recommended "relax completely") and "sleep sufficiently") and retired. He and his wife said they hoped to get to Florida and the Plantation in the spring "to see all the new things you have been doing."

Dr. Calver, who was recently promoted to Vice-admiral, was named to serve as the first Capitol physician in 1928, shortly after three Congressmen collapsed in one month with no doctor to attend them.

Three years later, Dr. Calver, who was a Navy Lieutenant Commander when he was assigned to the Capitol, was the object of a special law preventing the Navy from reassigning Calver to another post without the consent of Congress. Congress never gave that consent, and Dr. Calver served the legislators continually until his retirement.

A heart specialist, and knowing that Congressmen suffer from overwork and "banquet" food, he strongly recommended a lean diet and daily exercise. A freshman senator from Missouri took his advice very seriously a number of years ago and embarked upon a program which included a daily early morning walk—a program he did not vary during his term as President or after. (Frankly, we're not too sure members of the press appreciated Harry S. Truman's strict observance of this rule—it was sort of hard to keep up with Mr. Truman early in the morning when one was asking questions and writing the answers in a note book.)

SCIENTISTS' LECTURE

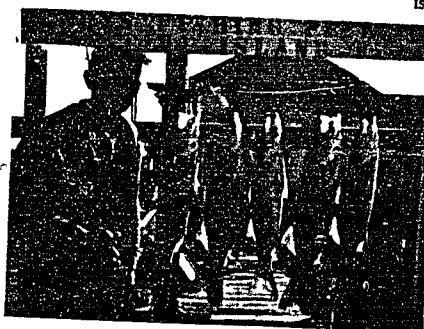
Millions of planets in the Milky Way Galaxy of which Earth is a tiny part may have some form of life on them, declared Professor Per Olov Lowdin in a lecture entitled "Some Aspects of Science" given by him for the public at Casa Ybel Hotel on Sanibel on Saturday evening, January 14. Professor Lowdin, who teaches the courses in Chemistry and Physics at the University of Florida at Gainesville and at Uppsala University in Sweden, is the director of the Winter Science Institute which has convened here for three weeks for the seventh consecutive year. The Institute has enrolled scientists from many areas for this year's session and this week there will be in attendance approximately 250 scientists accompanied by their families for a total of 600 Sanibel guests. This week the symposium will be in honor of Professor John C. Slater of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and also Professor Lowdin described as "one of the outstanding men in science." Sanibel was chosen for the Winter Institute's session because of its great beauty and climate and because it is an ideal place to work away from the distractions of city life, said Professor Lowdin as he expressed his thanks to Islanders for their friendship and hospitality.

In his lecture Professor Lowdin discussed man and the universe and pointed out how small a part of the total universe man is when one considers that in the Milky Way Galaxy alone there are estimated to be one trillion stars or suns and there are believed to be about ten million galaxies in the area of man and life, he discussed in a most interesting fashion heredity and the molecules which carry the genetic code, and Professor Lowdin asserted that as a multi-cellular organism so far as can now be determined there is a definite limit to the life span which can be achieved, somewhere between one hundred and five hundred years. Strangely enough, he went on to say in respect to many medicines widely used today such as aspirin and penicillin no one knows exactly how they work. Never before have scientists been so acutely aware of how meager their total knowledge really is, he went on to say.

As to the relationship between science and society, the professor took the position that science by itself is not good or evil, that the results of scientific research may be used in a good or evil manner by society. Most scientists are religious people, he informed the audience in part because man is so very small compared to the universe that scientists wonder about the forces at work. Science cannot tell in advance and science's discovery will be used for good or evil and can only trust that society will make constructive use of their findings.

Professor Lowdin's remarks also covered the range of man and microcosmos, man and science, a brief definition of the quantum theory, virus and bacteria diseases, and the age and span of the universe.

The Winter Science Institute is sponsored annually by the National Science Foundation with headquarters in Washington, D.C., and the proceedings are published in the International Journal of Quantum Chemistry.

ONLY 2,000,000 LESS
BIRD WATCHERS

To the enormous satisfaction of about 100 members of the Sanibel-Captiva Audubon Society gathered for the January meeting at the Sanibel Community House last Thursday evening, Vice-president Mario F. Hutton read a statement from the current Audubon Leaders Conservation Guide which said "a freshly completed United States Census Bureau survey shows that the people who carry binoculars or cameras—instead of guns—into the fields and woods now number only 2,000,000 fewer than hunters." The Census Bureau, he went on to inform members, has discovered that there are 11,200,000 bird watchers compared to 13,500,000 hunters, that since 1960 the number of hunters has decreased by about one million and that bird watchers number 8,196,000 and bird and wildlife photographers total 3,113,000. The article from which Mr. Hutton read made the observation that it was fortunate that all of the bird watchers and photographers and hunters were not in the woods and fields at the same time.

In the absence of President Bob Sabatino, Mr. Hutton announced that a nominating committee consisting of Mr. Willie Coombs, Mrs. Albert Muench and Mr. Parker Mills had been appointed to submit a slate of officers for the April 13 election of club officers.

In a most interesting slide report, Mr. Le Buff told the members that during the nine years he has been on the Islands tagging, observing and protecting alligators, he had never encountered an alligator not until this year while on the bird count. He informed the members that he had taken many photographs of the nest and that at the next meeting he hoped to show them.

In an interview following the meeting Mr. Le Buff said that the nest was about two feet high, six feet in diameter and constructed of Spartina grass. It contained two infertile eggs left over from last year and he estimated that the nest probably contained about eight eggs originally.

After the bird count, Mr. Le Buff flew over the nest area in a helicopter, about ten feet long lying about twenty feet from the nest. There are only two known species of alligators, he said, the Chinese and American types. Only the American type is found in this region of the United States.

The last part of the meeting was devoted to a color film, "The Bald Eagle." At the next meeting scheduled for February 19 at the Sanibel Community House a film entitled "Birding Down Under" will be shown and narrated by Mrs. Whitney Eastman, Sanibel winter resident, world traveler and ornithologist on birding in Australia.

JEANNE HAYES, SANIBEL NATURE TOUR GUIDE "I can't think of a thing the island needs less. Why don't we concentrate on building more outdoor facilities and developing more entertainment opportunities for our tourists? I wish them every success. The island needs a recreational area to include a golf course, swim pool and tennis court and Sanibel will be more wonderful for it."

MARY E. NIX, SANIBEL MOTEL OWNER "I think it would be superfluous baggage. I don't think the kind of people who come to Sanibel come for that. If they wanted the sort of thing they'd go to a different type resort."

H.C. ALLAN, JR. (Ret. Adm.) ORANGE PARK, FLA. and SANIBEL WINTER RESIDENT "I think the country club would be a splendid addition to the recreational facilities of Sanibel. For those who love golf, tennis and pool swimming the club will be a joy and for the others they can simply ignore it. I'm for it. We have been visiting Sanibel since 1957. VERA HARRIS, PLANT MICH. and SANIBEL WINTER RESIDENT "I think a country club with a swimming pool would be very nice. I do hope it would

allow tourists staying here to use its facilities for a few other-wise I don't think it would be good for the island." IRENE ADAMS, SEVEN SEAS SHOP, SANIBEL "I think a country club would help stimulate business and the growth of Sanibel."

CHARLOTTA CARPER, SANIBEL SCHOOL BUS DRIVER "If it includes a beautiful alley for it, otherwise I wouldn't be interested in it. But generally I think it would be a good thing for Sanibel for recreational purposes for visitors and Islanders. I've been on Sanibel for 31 years and I do not think the club would hurt our beautiful island atmosphere."

BILL HOSTETLER, SANIBEL CLERK "I think it's a good idea, those are the worst of it. We need something like that out here so that Islanders won't have to run out to the mainland to play golf. I'll change the island, but it won't hurt any." ANTHONY JAMES, SANIBEL RESTAURANT WORKER "It's okay. For people on Sanibel who go to and like country clubs and golf and tennis we should have one. It won't hurt anybody. I think a lot of winter residents would like it."

MARTY HOLTZ, SANIBEL OWNER OF SNACK SHACK "No comment." BOB DORMER, SANIBEL "Capital idea, if we can swing it financially. It takes people, you know. With money, that is." IRENE GAL, SANIBEL SALESLADY "As far as I'm concerned it will add lots of activity to the island and it's needed. A lot of the people who come here would like to play golf."

BETTY O. PARKE, THE BLACK PEARL, SANIBEL "I believe that a country club on the island will encourage visitors to come to Sanibel who want what a country club offers."

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PHOTO SHOW ENJOYED

Sixty-five exquisitely beautiful color photographs of Sanibel-Captiva islands birds, landscapes and beach views were on exhibit on Tuesday, January 17, by Mr. Mario Hutton at his one man show held at the Sea Horse Shops and viewed by hundreds of appreciative guests. Ninety-five per cent of the photographs were of island birds and the remainder of landscapes and beaches.

Drawing great interest and comment, especially by visitors who fish at the lighthouse fishing pier, was a color photograph of the white-headed pelican that lives at the pier, known variously as "Pelican Pete" or "Joe the Pelican." Pete—or Joe—injured his wing some time ago and being unable to catch fish for himself is constantly begging fish from fishermen and sometimes take the fish from lines immediately after they are caught without waiting for an invitation to dine.

Mr. Hutton has had quite an extraordinary career before retiring to Sanibel. His program director of station WOV in New York, in the Criminal Investigative Division of the U. S. Army for three years during World War Two, Executive Secretary of the Italy-America Chamber of Commerce in New York from 1945 to 1964. For his efforts in promoting trade between Italy and the United States he was awarded the Star of Solidarity and appointed Knight Commander by the President of the Republic of Italy.

Hutton, though a serious photographer for many years, began his wildlife photography work only two years ago. Last April he reached an agreement with two of the leading photographic agencies for the worldwide distribution of his color and black and white photographs.

One of the youngest of his invited guests in attendance was John Sparks, age six, son of Helene and Jack Sparks, of New Jersey (Bodnon) and Captiva Island. Mrs. Sparks, a painter herself, said that John is beginning to paint and already has developed into quite a critic of other people's painting efforts.

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NEW LIBRARY BOOKS
COVER WIDE RANGE

Eight new books covering a range from children's stories to sex and murder have been received at the Sanibel Public Library. Two imposing volumes, generously illustrated in color, cover art and design from 1850 to 1945.

"Structures of the Modern World" by Nello Ponente deals with the history of art ideas from 1850 to 1900. It describes and illustrates the foundations on which Twentieth Century art is based, "Dimensions of the 20th Century" by Robert L. Deloyoy examines art development up to 1945.

One of the most unusual children's books is "Flowers of Delight" compiled by Leonard De Vries from children's prose and poetry from 1765 to 1830. Some 700 illustrations, some of them in color, reproduce the original woodcuts and engravings.

For children from nine to ninety is "The Complete Nonsense Book" published by Edward Lear in 1862 and brought up to date in the present volume. Nonsense songs and stories range from "The Owl and the Pussy Cat" through Limericks to "Nonsense Cookery."

The Major English Romantic Poets" is a volume edited by William H. Marshall covering the best known works of Coleridge, Wordsworth, Byron, Shelley and Keats' introductions to each of the poets shed new light on the life and works of these writers.

Education is represented by two new books "Your College Education, How to Pay for It" by Dr. Sarah Splaver, and by "Sex and the College Student" by the Committee on the College Student, Group for the Advancement of Psychiatry. Dr. Splaver explains why every qualified young person can go to college, regardless of family income, and is specific on methods of increasing a student's financial resources, decreasing his college costs, and securing financial aid when needed.

Nine psychiatrists and three consultants have pooled more than twenty years of experience with students and their problems. Issues on the campus are illustrated through case histories which also raise questions of administrative policy.

"In Cold Blood" by Truman Capote is the story of the lives of six people in Holcomb, Kansas, and their deaths on November 15, 1959. The book has been much discussed during the last year for its handling of a murder story in the manner of a news report.

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
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R. Levy, Chairman of the Sanibel-Captiva Art League, endorsed the idea, and the League will co-sponsor the event.
