Leon Levy, Chairman of the Sanibel-Captiva Art League, won one of the two top prizes, the \$100 Marguerite S. Dorey Award for his enamelcaustic "Red Planet." Third place in oils went to Island artist Margaret Tepler, and Captiva painter Jané Bancroft brought home an Honorable Mention.

WATER ASSOCIATION MEETING

Several days ago the Island Water Association mailed notices of their Annual Meeting to all members. This meeting is being held at 10:00 o'clock on the morning of April 10, 1967, at the Island Community House on Sanibel. All members are urged to attend.

Accompanying the notice of the meeting was a Proxy and Proposed Changes to the Articles of Incorporation and the By-Laws. The purpose of these suggested changes is to establish a system whereby continuity will be maintained on the Board of Directors of the Association. If for any reason a member of the Association can not attend the meeting it is requested that his Proxy be returned, in order to give the Board of Directors adequate support to make the very worth while change in the Articles of Incorporation and the By-Laws.

SHELLER REAPS AWARDS

The coveted Smithsonian Award was added to the list of laurels Mimi Schriener has collected with her display of a "Comparative Study of Recent and Fossil Mollusks"—along with another Blue Ribbon.

The display took a first in the Educational Division at Jacksonville, Florida, last July. The Philadelphia Academy of Natural Sciences Award for the Outstanding Educational Exhibit, and another first, were garnered at the Naples Show in February of this year. At Sanibel's own Shell Fair last month, it took another first in the Educational Division, and last week, it won still another first in Education, at the St. Petersburg Shell Show, along with the Smithsonian Award for the Most Outstanding Exhibit at that show.

VETERAN NEWS

M.T. Dixon, of the F.M. Dept.
of Veterans Affairs, has an-
nounced that headstone or grave
markers are available to all
veterans through the Depart-
ment of the Army. This head-
stone or grave marker is avail-
able for any deceased veteran
of wartime or peacetime ser-
vice whose last period of ser-
vice was terminated honorably
by death or otherwise. Memor-
ial headstones and markers are
also authorized to commemorate
any member of the Army of
Forces of the United States,
dying in the service, whose
remains have not been dis-
covered and identified or buried
at sea, for placement in a Na-
tional or private cemetery.

This headstone or grave
marker, Dixon said, is pro-
vided without charge. Dixon said
that all Veteran County Service
Officers have applications for
these headstone markers, and
they must be sent to the Chief
of the Support Services of the
Army, who will furnish the
headstone marker.

The big step has been hurdled and now we expect to show some concrete results. The members will soon be canvassing the Islanders to determine the needs and desires of our area. The Authority recognizes that there is a great need for housing but not sure of the extent nor the form which will be attempted. You can be sure that the Authority will be ready to hear all suggestions and will do their utmost to provide the best for Sanibel and Captiva. Get your ideas together and be ready to tell the members when they come around to see you.

TO RECLAIM DIVERTED TAXES

The AAA is calling on the Florida Legislature to restore a percentage of diverted funds to highway construction.

The Conference suggests earmarking 20 per cent of the revenues from motor vehicle tag collections for highway construction. The 25 per cent now pledged for school building bonds would be protected, the remainder would continue to go into the general fund.

The AAA, representing over 325,000 members in Florida, also asks the Legislature to take action on a large number of other matters.

Placing an embargo on the construction of any further toll roads in the state, and removing tolls as fast as toll bonds are paid off.

Revising the antiquated secondary gasoline tax formula, replacing it "with a progressive, equitable system of tax fund distribution".

Central issuance of drivers' licenses by mail, thus eliminating phoney addresses of persons seeking illegal restoration of driving privileges.

Alteration of the driver's license point system which "is not doing the job it was designed to do".

Establishing standards of traffic courts throughout the state to require regular sessions (weekly, at least) for the benefit of motorists and law enforcement officials, under a salaried judge.

Re-examination of all drivers for visual and physical fitness every four years.

Strict and effective enforcement against driving under the influence of any intoxicating, narcotic or hypnotic drug.

Safeguarding motor vehicle inspection to make sure the objective is safety, not revenue. Wearing of protective helmets by operators and passengers on two-wheeled motor vehicles.

Raising minimum age of licensed driver riding with a learner to 21.

Altogether, the AAA makes 26 recommendations.

AUDUBON SOCIETY ACTIVITIES

At the meeting of March 23, Mario F. Hutton, acting president, read the following telegram addressed to Senators Spessard Holland and George Smeathers, Congressman Paul Rogers, and Governor Claude Kirk:

"Deadly phosphate contamination of Peace River constitutes latest tragic example of irreparable damage to Florida natural resources due to indifference, incompetence or unilateral approach on the part of some public agencies, among them beyond possible doubt the US Corps of Army Engineers. We urgently solicit full use of your invaluable influence toward immediate adoption of measures needed to avoid further destruction of irreplaceable State resources, rapidly dwindling in our day. In particular we urge you to favor prompt passage of strong H.R.

23, known as Estuarine Areas Bill. With thanks for your cooperation, Respectfully yours,--Mario F. Hutton, Acting President."

A motion voting full approval of the telegram, introduced by Willis Combs, and seconded by John Raczek, was carried unanimously. Assurances of cooperation and pertinent suggestions for further action have been received in a telegram from Senator Holland.

He and Marshall Tabacchi, also announced were the acceptances of Hervey Roberts, to serve as chairman of the Program Committee, and of Griffing Bancroft as chairman of the Field Trip Committee.

Mr. Hutton reported on a recent meeting at which the conservation and promotion of island plants were discussed. He also reported on an exchange of letters with Mr. Fritz, president of the Florida Audubon Society, regarding the proposed grouping of the State Chapters into districts with problems of common interest, for speedier and more efficient coordination. The entertainment of the March 23 meeting included the preview of Mario Hutton's impressive new photo-essay "Caloosahatchee Canto," several of his popular "deadpan ditties," and the showing of the CBS film, "Bulldozed America."

FIRES NEED PERMITS

All property owners on Sanibel are requested by the Sanibel Fire Control District to be extremely cautious in burning household trash or yard debris at this time of extreme dryness. The District reminds all residents, also, that it is required by law that a burning permit be obtained from Fire Chief Allen Nave. To obtain the permit, go to Nave's and be sure to know the general description of the area in which your property is located as no general burning permits are issued.

The panel deferred on executive centralization called for in the revision, and on its right to work provision, but agreed on the need for greater local option in changing local government, executive reorganization and streamlining of the more than 600 state agencies now in existence, provision for constitutional revision in the future by direct action of the electorate, and other features. Blue ribbons are exciting, but the special awards are a "real thrill." Mim says, The Philadelphia Academy award cannot be won by the same person for five years after once having been obtained. Mim explained, even though a different display is entered. Also, the Smithsonian Award is eligible for award by only one other club in the world besides the St. Petersburg Shell Club, where it originated in 1948. Previous winners are ineligible to win it for two years following an award.

It's almost like a Cinderella story. Until 14 months ago, when Priscilla Murphy took Mim to La Belle for a fossil-shelling trip, she didn't know beans about fossils. After a few trips, though, she and Howard got so enthused they almost, but not quite, gave up hunting for contemporary shells.

The very idea of shelling fifty miles from the ocean sounds fantastic. But the fossil shells are so very much like the ones found on the beaches of Sanibel, and yet are millions of years old, that Mim discovered she couldn't help make comparisons. Some were identical while others showed a definite pattern of evolution. Matching the fossil finds with recent specimens got to be an exciting game, and when an unknown or extinct shell turned up it was an "event." Even in the midst of building their house and moving down from Atlanta, Mim found time to set up and identify the nucleus of the display that one judge said was "staggeringly complete--I don't see how you could possibly add more to it."

Mim declares that it has been a lot of work to prepare the exhibit, but this is the first year they have had the courage to exhibit. With such outstanding results, it's understandable why they feel like a "dream come true."

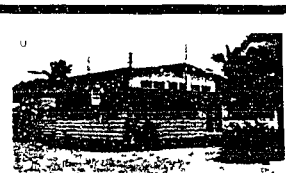
