

SANCTUARY IMPROVEMENTS

Improvements in the J.N. "Ding" Darling Sanctuary have been completed as follows: Clearing of the underbrush at the entrance to make it more attractive and to provide an open setting for the large sign marking the entrance. This sign is built to Department of Interior standards and in the style used for Federal parks and sanctuaries.

A large native stone marker has been placed at the Alice O'Brien Tower in the Sanctuary as a setting for the bronze plaque commemorating it to the memory of Miss O'Brien, a substantial donor to the Darling Foundation. A new bird watching platform in the tidal flats, accessible from the dike over a walkway through the mangrove is open, but not yet completed. Wire fencing is to go around the viewing platform which is not intended for use as a takeoff place to wade or shell on the tidal flats.

Finally, the posts marking the canoe trail have been brightly painted to help in identification and to provide recognition for the posts where police signs have been lost.

AUDUBON MEETING AND ELECTIONS

The Sanibel-Captiva Audubon Society will hold its closing meeting of the season at 8:30 p.m., Thursday (tonight) in the Sanibel Community House. The previously announced slate of candidates for officers and directors for 1967 will be voted upon by the membership.

The entertainment will consist of a program on "Sanibel Wildlife Highlights," conducted by Mario F. Hurton. He will present a comprehensive series of color slides depicting local birds in their natural habitats. The presentation will include three new photo-verse essays by Mr. Hurton titled "We, your Spoonbills . . ." "Blizzard over Ding Darling?" and "Granny's Field Trip." In answer to many requests, "Old Pete's First Person Dirge," "Sanibel" and "Caloosahatchee Canto" will also be heard and seen. As usual, the meeting is open to the public.

DEMOCRATS' DINNER TUESDAY

SHELL CLUB TO MEET



TO THE ISLANDER

Sanibel to me is the most wonderful place in the world. I'd like to see it every day.

1-Yes, we do need, I believe, some low rent housing. If it will get rid of the couple of shacks I have seen some of our islanders having to live in. We need these people here, and as to what I know of them, they are very nice people. And it is a crime to let people live in such a way on our island.

2-I believe these homes should be built where there is the shopping center, to make it easier for those who have no transportation, and in a circular setting, with a fair size lot.

3-That they should have aluminum siding, or asbestos shingles as wood rots out too fast, and if it is not painted when the places will look shabby.

4-They should have rules and regulations—keep the grounds planted and kept neat and clean at all times. They should have a small storage house built in the back of each home, and no old cars or junk to be stored on the grounds. Proper sewage, and in the grounds garbage and trash cans. They should be checked on every so often. If they aren't keeping the places up to par, then give them a citation. The third citation and out they go.

5-I believe we also need Periwinkle Way repaved, and as they are doing it a bike and walking path should be added.

6-That the beach should be cleaned up of all the litter the holiday crowd has dumped. A letter has been sent by the Association to the County Commissioners protesting the haphazard camping and parking of trailers in un-authorized areas on the island and causeway during the recent holiday. This sort of thing, said the Association, could create a health hazard due to lack of sanitary facilities. It was noted that, upon request, debris left behind was immediately removed under the supervision of Park Pilot, director of County Parks.
