All residents and friends of Sanibel and Captiva Islands are urged to write AGAIN to each County Commissioner asking that, in all fairness, their consideration of the proposed re-zoning for a trailer park adjoining Sanibel Isles be delayed at least to late November. Hearing before the Commissioners is now scheduled for October 4. The Executive Committee of the Interested Citizens Committee at its meeting August 29 urged the writing of additional letters to delay this hearing until late November to give tax-paying winter residents an opportunity to appear and be heard. 
He promises you'll hear more about these items later --or stop in the store; he's not a bit reluctant to talk about them.



#### PATROL SAYS 'GIVE THE KIDS THE BRAKES'

"Give The Kids The Brakes" is the advice given to motorists by the Florida Highway Patrol, calling attention to the opening of schools throughout the State this month and the need for drivers to keep a sharp lookout for youngsters around busy school zones.

Colonel H.N. Kirkman, Director of the Department of Public Saftey, speaking of the State's thousands of school children returning to classes said, "Drivers are reminded to be alert for the increase of pedestrian, bicycle, and vehicular traffic before and after school hours, especially in school neighborhoods. Watch for school zone signs and obey the speed limits strictly."

While emphasizing the need for careful and watchfuldriving on the part of the motorists, the Patrol Commander stressed the need for parents to instruct their children in safe walking and riding habits. Good attitudes and habits about traffic safety may be the most important lesson a parent can give to a child, according to Kirkman.

"Don't take safety for granted in your children," Colonel Kirkman concluded, "their safety depends upon your example and your instructions."





Matt Eckel will be an outstanding marine biologist some day. He will, that is, if I can convince him that he should go on to college after he finishes high school.

Matt's a Junior now in Seacrest High School in Boynton h. His hobby is collecting B . Ical fish. I said COLLECTtı ING tropical fish, not raising them. He's gotten so good at It that it was becoming quite profitable collecting them for others. . . until he ruptured an ear drum.

The doctor says the eardrum will heal and he'll probably be able to dive after fish again. But it was something he told me about decompressing fish that made me realize that he'd make a good marine biologist.

Except for the shark family. most fishes have a gas filled bag inside of them called a swim bladder. This swim bladder helps them to maintain nr tral buoyancy so they won't when they stop swimming. If you try to bring such a fish to the surface from depths greater than about 30 feet, the gas in the swim bladder expands and forces the fish to the surface where it usually dies.

Decompressing the fish the way a diver does is a long tedious process. You have to stop for five minutes or so every few feet. But Matt has found a shrewd way to decompress the fish quickly .... and from much greater depths than 30 feet.

He brings a hypodermic sy-


has a light chain sewn into it for a weight.

After he has chased a fish into a hole in the reef, Matt drops the net over the place where the fish is hiding and then using a long rod, he pokes into the other holes and tries to urge the fish out of its refuge. When it comes out, it runs into the net and Matt can wrap the net around the fish until he can get it into his collecting can.

His collecting can is a bait can which has been weighted so that it no longer floats. It keeps the fish in good condition until it is time to surface.

Matt says some reef fishes can be tricked into being captured. Many of these fishes hang around a small area in the reef and if you watch them closely, you find that they swim along certain well defined "paths." You can place an open wide mouth jar with a capacity of about one quart in one of these paths and then chase the fish until it runs into the jar. It takes the fish a few seconds to find the way out and you must use this opportunity to put the cover on the jar.

Matt's had a few scares, Once while swimming in murky water in the Keys, a barracuda that must have been close to six feet long brushed past him. Another time a small barracuda (fortunately) struck at the chrome plated brass valve on his air tank and tried to wrench it off. Matt thought one of his buddies was horsing around until he felt behind him and encountered the fish's head . . . and then watched it swim

ringe down with him, when he starts for the surface with a collection of fishes, he watches them carefully for signs of the inflated swim bladder. The

elling is easily visible and en he finds a fish in distress, he inserts the needle of the hypodermic syringe into the bladder through the side of the fish and draws off the excess gas with the plunger. Matt says the fish survival rate is nearly 100 per cent with this method.

Matt would make a good marine biologist because of this kind of approach to biological problems. Matt has learned a few other tricks.

When he's collecting deep (70 feet or deeper) and the fish are quick he uses a drop net. This is a circular net something like a cast net. It is about four feet in diameter and has a cork float in the middle. The rim of the net
