

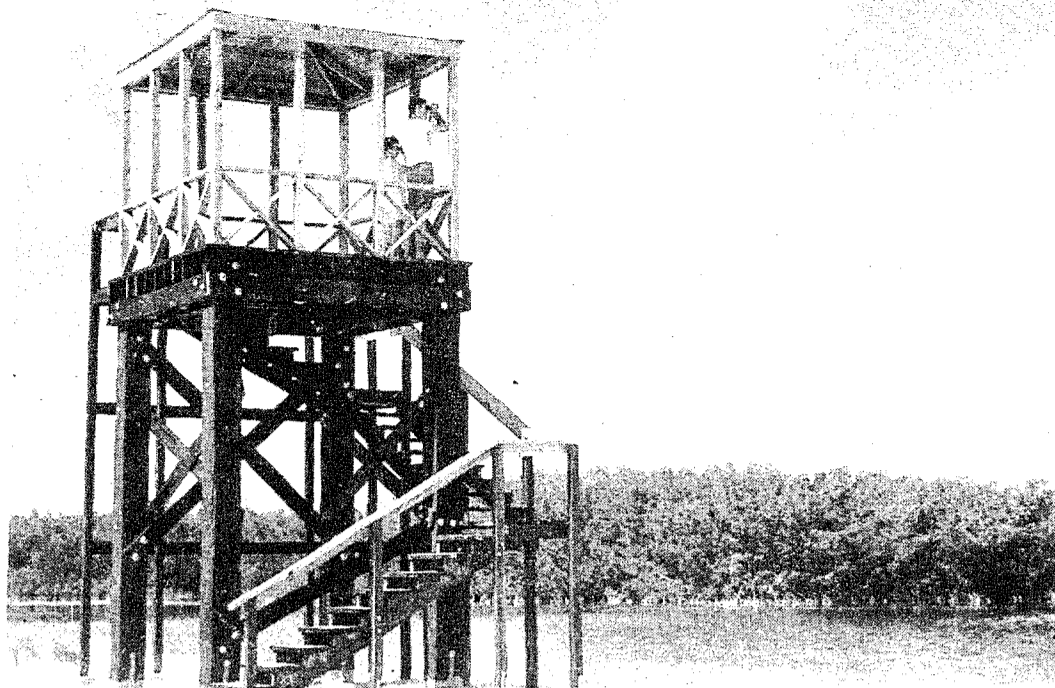

## FISHING PIER CLOSED FOR REPAIR

Officials of the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife, J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge, announced recently the temporary closing of the fishing pier at the Sanibel Lighthouse. Extensive erosion and other natural corrosive action has rendered this popular facility in a most unsafe condition. Steps are now underway to make necessary repairs to the structure and it will be reopened for public use and enjoyment. Until such time as reconstruction is complete, use of the pier will be prohibited. Other activities such as shelling and surf fishing in the area will remain unhampered. Work is scheduled to be completed in the near future.

## CONVENTION TO BE HELD ON SANIBEL

At the Fall Conference and Workshop of the Florida Audubon Society on Grand Bahama Island, over 85% of the leaders attending voted to hold next year's Conference on Sanibel. Although the recommendation of the 110 delegates present is subject to acceptance of the Society's Executive Committee, there is little doubt that it will be endorsed, thus assuring that next October Sanibel will play host to most personalities prominent in the field of conservation of Florida's natural resources.

Mario F. Hutton, President of the Sanibel - Captiva Audubon Chapter, made the announcement following his return, after participating in the Board meeting held at Pine Jog Nature Center in West Palm Beach on October 18, and attending the gathering of Florida Audubon leaders at West End, Grand Bahama, from October 19 to 23. Also representing Sanibel, and participating in the activities of the workshop, were George S. Winterbotham, a Director of the Sanibel Chapter, and Mrs. Ann L. Winterbotham.

Mr. Hutton reported that the four day Conference was very constructive, and effectively came to grips with basic problems relating to conservation of our State's natural resources, wildlife protection and many allied subjects. He readily admitted that he was highly elated because Sanibel had been chosen almost unanimously for next year's Conference, although several other leading Florida resorts were in the running.

Mr. Hutton further expressed great satisfaction because the hour-long showing of his "Photo-Verse" program on October 21 met with such success, that he was requested to offer a second showing of his slides the following evening. As an aftermath of the two shows, he was engaged by several Audubon Chapters for programs to be held this winter in various Florida cities, among them Naples, Orlando, Lake Wales, Stuart and Cocoa Beach.

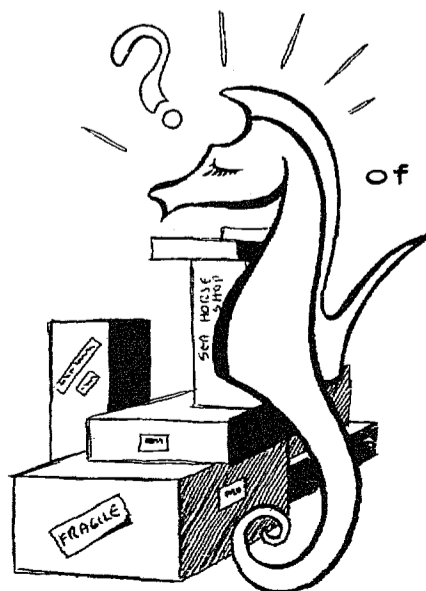

Seas.

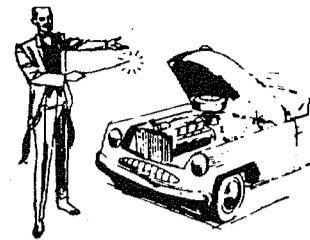
Mr. Bob Hughes of Fort

LIBRARY NEWS

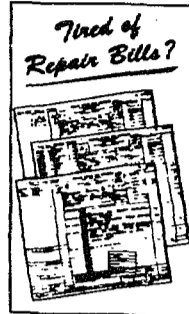
The Sanibel Public Library

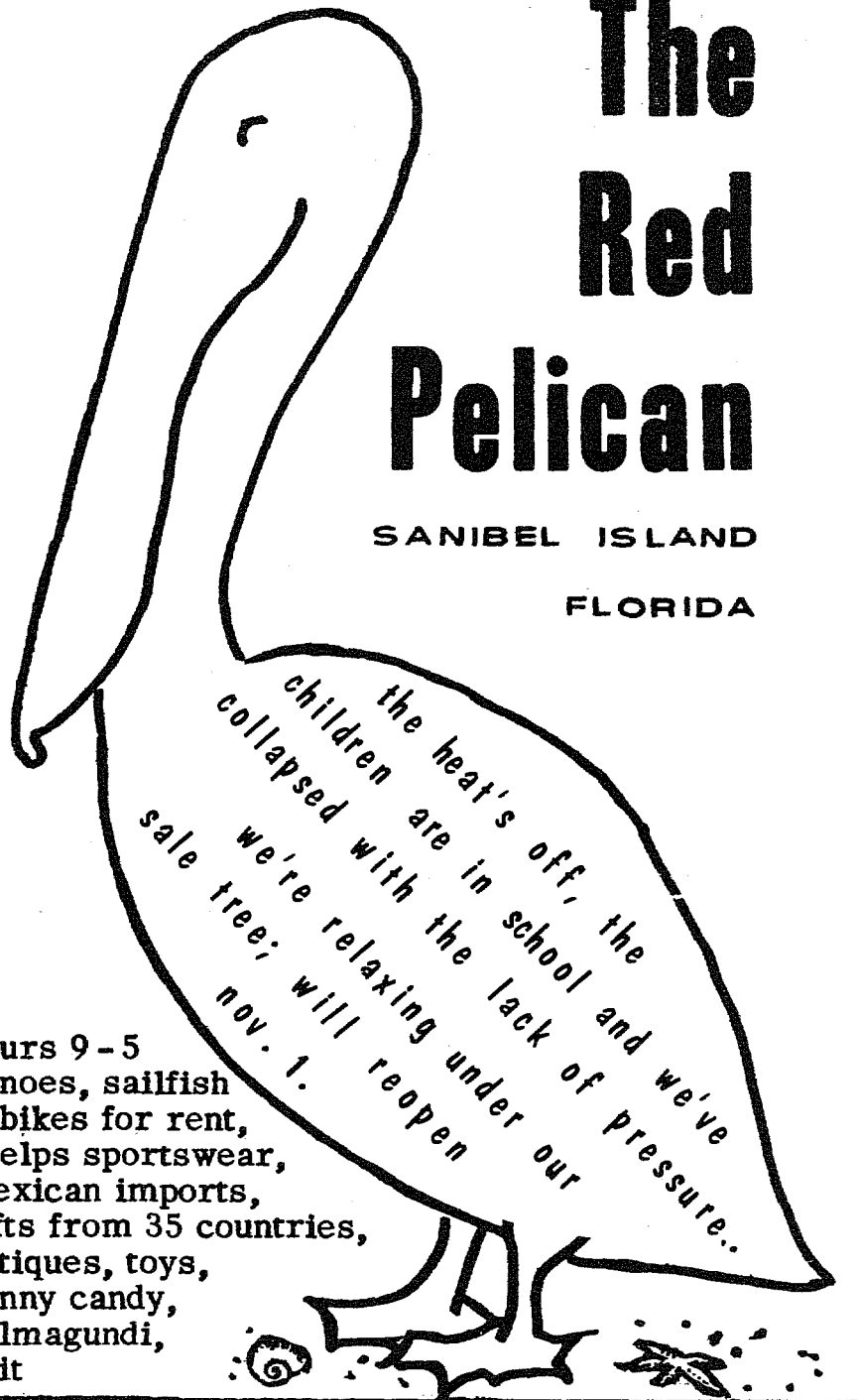

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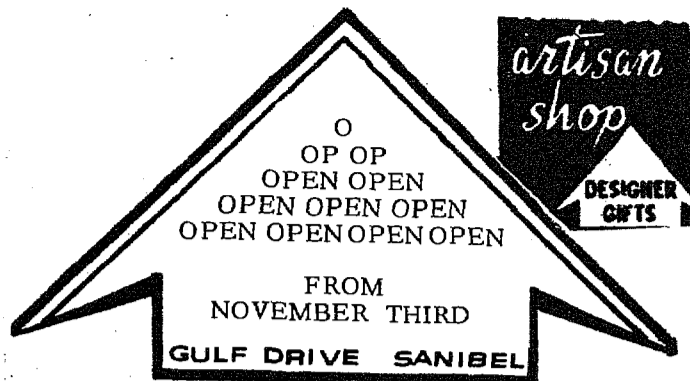

## MORE ABOUT EUROPE

his is the continuation of the onrads bus tour through Europe.

Arriving back in Copenhagen, we picked up our Volkswagen bus and began a two month trek throughout Europe. We had read about the new 'American type' motels now available in most parts, but were soon disillusioned. The first ones in Odense, Denmark, one in Spessart, Germany, and another near Munich were the only ones resembling those we are accustomed to in America. We did stay in others which turned out to be nothing but renovated inns. The small hotels, inns and hostals found in the smaller cities were charming, clean and reasonably priced.

Traveling along the main highways was much like home, the cross roads near the larger cities were loaded with hitchhikers. It was difficult to distinguish them as all wore their hair long and dirty. They were also clothed in tight dirty jeans and loose fitting shirts. We did pick up several groups but soon learned to avoid them as most were rude, demanding and bore-some. We soon began taking the smaller roads and enjoying the villages not on the standard tour lists. One such town was Lienza in the southern part of Austria. This little old town is steeped with medieval history and many of their customs and buildings haven't been changed. This area is also well known for their excellent wines and when accompanied with local breads, cheese and wurst you have the best for picnic lunches.

On our way to Florence we passed through Munich and Innsbruck staying long enough to enjoy the sights and food. Florence amazed us in the speed that they recovered from the floods of last year. Most of the museums, churches and buildings are returned to pre-flood condition. You can see the high water line (almost twenty feet in some places) but in the main, the ravages of the waters have been erased. The volunteer workers must be credited with saving and rehabilitating many of the art works. We had a pleasant and unusual stay at the St. Michele Inn in Fiesole, which is on the north hill overlooking Florence. The Inn was originally designed by Michael Angelo as a monastery, and served as such for many years. The Italian Government restored it several years ago and it now serves as an inn and restaurant.

We moved on from Florence, through France to Spain to Portugal, stopping at Barcelona, Granada and Seville. We met the Sanibel Group on their arrival. It was old home time. The bull fight is often considered a Spanish monopoly but the Portuguese also love the sport. Here the bull is not killed in the ring, instead they seem to prefer to pit the strength of the tired bull against the 'intestinal Fortitude' of the affectianados. The bull is considered vanquished when a line of eight young men (volunteers) stop the bulls charge by letting it hit, head on, the lead man in the stomach. Then the other seven pile on to out weigh the bull and stop him. Fun! If you have a strong stomach. The Portuguese have several State sponsored "Pousados" around their Country in their attempt to promote tourism. These are small hotels, clean and reasonable, and many times, converted old Inns or castles. Spain has

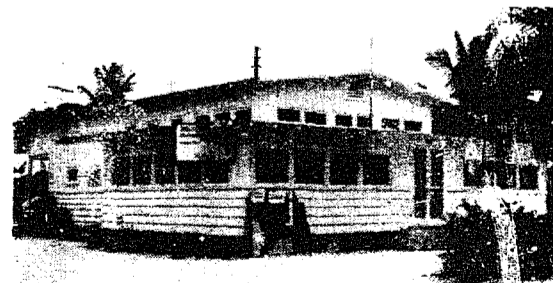

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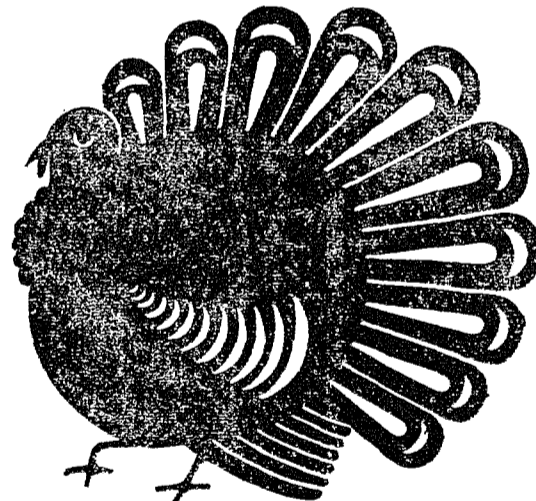
a similar program, and they
