



Reader R. 

## FORT MYERS-LEE COUNTY CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

General Maxwell D. Taylor, former chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff and U.S. Ambassador to South Vietnam, 1964-65, will come to Fort Myers January 25, 1968 to address the 47th annual meeting of the Fort Myers-Lee County Chamber of Commerce, Inc.

The announcement was made yesterday by President Lewis B. Barber, who said that 2,000 reservation order forms for the meeting will be mailed next week to Chamber members.

Currently president of the Institute for Defense Analysis, General Taylor toured Southeast Asia capitals on a Presidential mission in connection with the Vietnam war earlier this year. A news special on his findings there, entitled "The Cause in Vietnam is Being Won" appeared in the New York Times Magazine Section on October 15 of this year. The General's subject in Fort Myers will be "The Realities of a Vietnam Settlement."

Having served as a special advisor to Presidents Kennedy and Johnson, the General has authored a number of books, his latest being "Responsibility and Response." Famous as an erudite general yet known for his appreciation of practical politics, it was because of his advocacy of a so-called "limited war strategy" that the General resigned as chief of staff of the Army during the Eisenhower administration, which had based its defense policies on "massive re-taliation,"

The General's inclination toward scholarly rhetoric was reflected in the choice of a title for his book criticizing the Eisenhower defense policies. He called it "The Uncer-tain Trumpet." It was because of his "limited war strategy," as outlined in this book, that President Kennedy recalled the General to government service and later made him chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff in



1961. From that time on, either as an advisor at the White House, in uniform at the Pentagon or as an Ambassador in Vietnam, he has been a major contributor to the United




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

## CANOEING ON THE ISLANDS

## (contd. from last week)

On a calm day, you may even want to venture out into the bay. One of our favorite spots is one of the Wulfert Keys, a roost for hundreds of pelicans. But it's not the pelicans that attract us---rather the company that searches them out---the frigate birds, one of the most graceful species aloft. For its body weight the frigate bird has the widest wing span of any bird. It sails like a glider through the air, waiting to dive onto a pelican to rob it of its catch. (For the frigate bird disdains doing its own fishing. Because of its wing span it can't take off from the water.) During the breeding season in November, the male bird has a bright patch on its throat which shows from the distance like the aillight of a car.

The mudflats between the Wulfert Keys and stretching all the way into the now blind pass that used to separate Sanibel from Captiva, as well as those in the Roosevelt Channel separating Captiva from Buck Key, are ideal for shelling. Most people get discouraged after having once stalked through the gooky mud with little to show for their efforts but some barnacled whelks. The ideal time to shell is when the flats are still covered with a few inces of water. The shells are still active and visible, and when you know the spots, you won't have much trouble picking up live tulips, horse conches, lightning conches, king's crowns, and---if you have the patience and knowledge to dig for them---angel wings.

Except for a kayak there is really no other boat with which you could do all this as well. You couldn't glide in three-inch deep water with any other boat, or pull it off a mudflat as easily if you get stuck; there is nothing that can be propelled so noiselessly through water to watch birds or surprise alligators; its the only craft you can push



SANIBEL-CAPTIVA CONSERVATION FOUNDATION, INC.

Formal organization of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation, Inc., of Sanibel and Captiva Islands, was announced by the directors following a meeting of the organization last week. The purpose of the Foundation is to further conservation efforts in their broadest scope on Sanibel, Captiva, and other islands of the offshore chain.

The Foundation is the successor to the Jay N. "Ding" Darling Sanctuary Committee, which for the last six years has worked to have the area of the present "Ding" Darling Sanctuary on Sanibel set aside as a memorial to the late cartoonist and conservationist. The committee was an arm of the J.N. "Ding" Darling Foundation of Des Moines, Iowa.


Separation from the Darling Foundation, and reorganization as an independent foundation, was mutually agreed upon by the members of the former Darling Committee and the Board of Trustees of the Darling Foundation. Both organizations will continue to work together, but it was recognized that the local group has broader interests in the offshore islands than the Des Moines Foundation, and that distance created administrative problems that could best be handled by separate incorporation of the local group.

In announcing the separation, Sherry R. Fisher, chairman of the executive committee of the Darling Foundation, and Mrs. Herbert Lewis of Sanibel, chairman of the board of the Sanibel-Captiva Foundation, stressed the intent of both organizations to cooperate closely in the future as they have in the past. Arrangements are being made to transfer all funds donated for use in the Sanibel Sanctuary deposited with the Des Moines Foundation.
