These are also the symptoms of heart failure in human beings. There is speculation that some human beings display this "diving re-... flex" when the face gets wet and could account for some unexplained deaths among apparently healthy and perienced SCUBA divers. healthy and ex-

I taught survival swimming for awhile when I was in the Army and I've had a special interest in "problem" swimmers. The problem in the Army was to show a soldier that he could keep himself afloat combig, heavy Army shoes and wearing a full field pack. Soldiers who had a trooptransport bombed or torpedoed from under them wouldn't even try to save themselves without this training. They thought it was impossible to save themselves even though dry land might be only a few hundred feet away. So we had a tough psychological problem to solve even before training started.

I'd usually begin by jumping into the water fully clothed and equipped and show them that I could keep afloat without any swimming effort. They were then willing to pay attention when I showed them how to wrap the blanket in the field pack in the waterproof shelter half they had. This made the field pack buoyant and would act as a life preserver for several hours if the blanket was properly wrapped. Then it was fairly easy to show them other tricks such as inflating trousers with knots tied in the legs---the cloth will hold air as long as it stays wet.

But how to overcome fear in adult problem swimmers was always a tough one. I taught an experimental class in the Eau Gallie YMCA one year. Everyone in the class was a problem swimmer who had

never been able to learn to swim in 40 years or more. One woman in the beginning could not bear to splash water in her own face, but by the



SANIBEL-CAPTIVA CONSERVATION FOUNDATION, INC.


A grant of \$5,000.00 to the new Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation, Inc. by the Alice M. O'Brien Foundation, Inc. of Saint Paul, Minnesota, has been announced by Mrs. Herbert Lewis, Chairman of the Board of the local group. The local foundation is the successor to the Jay N. "Ding" Darling Memorial Committee.

The grant is for the purpose of financing a site and feasibility study for a Nature Center on Sanibel, and a comprehensive plan for its construction. The study will be conducted by a team from the Nature Centers Division, National Audubon Society, New York, led by Dr. Joseph J. Shomon, director. Dr. Shomon made a preliminary visit to the Islands in October to discuss possibilities for the project with the Jay N. "Ding" Darling Memorial Committee. The committee recently separated from the parent organization, the Jay N. "Ding" Darling Foundation of Des Moines, Iowa; then was reconstituted as the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation.

A Conservation Conference, scheduled for early February to coincide with the visit of the National AudubonNatureCenter representatives will also be financed by the grant. This conference will seek to establish broad goals for the conservation of Sanibel, Captiva and the other Islands in our off-shore chain, and coordinate efforts to achieve them. Organizations which have been concerned with the establishment of the Jay N. "Ding" Darling Memorial Sanctuary will participate, including representatives of the U.S. Fish & Wildlife from the D.C. and Atlanta offices, National and Florida Audubon Societies, Nature Conservancy, the Jay N. "Ding" Darling and the Alice M. O'Brien Foundations, Florida Atlantic University.

Members of the Board of Directors of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation, in addition to Mrs. Lewis, include Roy Bazire, vice chairman and treasurer; Hervey Roberts, secretary; and Mrs. Willis Combs, James Jack, Joe Gault, Tom Wood, Charles Le-Buff, Jr., Mrs. George Winterbotham, Griffing Bancroft and Tom Mitchell.



CHAMBER OF COMMERCE SEMI-ANNUAL MEETING

How to raise additional funds just to maintain Chamber of Commerce programs at present levels engaged the 30 members who attended the semi-annual meeting, Monday, Dec. 18, for almost two hours. Lacking a quorum, no definite actions were taken, and the problem was returned to the committee headed by Dave Holtzman for further study.

James Jack, treasurer, presented the financial picture in a summary of expenses for 1966-67. estimates for the current fiscal year, and proposals for the 1968-69 fiscal year, based upon maintaining existing programs only, with no provisions for any expansion. He emphasized that most expense items are fixed, and the Board has no control over them. These relate to the costs of operating and maintaining the Chamber's building, and other contractual obligations. Only major item subject to adjustment is newspaper advertising, and for this the Board has proposed only a minimal program of \$1,500 for the next fiscal year. Funds for contingencies, for regular maintenance of the office and grounds, for additional help for Bill Newman during the peak winter period, for special advertising purposes of use to the membership should be available, but are not without new income.

Dave Holtzman, named as chairman of a committee to review the dues structure and ways of raising additional regular income, gave his report to the meeting. Extensive discussion followed. President Mark McClintick then returned the problem to Dave Holtzman's committee, asking that he expand his group and give consideration to the suggestions made by the membership.

Any member wishing a copy of the Budget Information prepared by the treasurer may get it from Bill Newman at the Chamber's office. Any member who has suggestions for increasing the Chamber's income ---preferably on a regular annual basis---please put them in writing and send to Dave Holtzman.
