CONSERVATION FOUNDATION NEWS

"Island Conservation" will be the theme of a conference February 6, sponsored by the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation, Inc., Mrs. Herbert Lewis, Chairman of the Board, announced this week. The Foundation is the successor to the Jay N. "Ding" Darling Memorial Committee which succeeded in getting the tidal and mangrove areas on the North side of Sanibel set aside as a sanctuary and transferred to Federal ownership under supervision of the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service to form the "Ding" Darling Wildlife Refuge.

Details of the conference, set up under a grant to the local Foundation from the Alice M. O'Brien Foundation of Saint Paul, Minnesota, will be announced later. It is being held to coincide with the visit to the Islands of a team from the Nature Centers Division of the National Audubon Society, led by Dr. Joseph J. Shomon, director of the Division. These representatives will be here for three days to conduct a feasibility study for the possibility of a Nature Center for Sanibel. This, too, is being financed with funds from the O'Brien Foundation grant.

Board members of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation include in addition to Mrs. Lewis, Opal Combs, Ann Winterbotham, Joe Gault, James Jack, Tom Mitchell, Griffing Bancroft, Tom Wood, Charles LeBuff, Hervey Roberts (secretary) and Roy Bazire (vice chairman and treasurer).

AUDUBON SOCIETY ACTIVITIES

The Sanibel-Captiva Audubon has established an Alligator Protection Award, consisting of amounts pledged by its members, to be given out for information leading to the arrest and conviction of alligator poachers. Already 260 dollars have been subscribed, and it is hoped that a total of at least 500 dollars will be pledged within the near future. This action is in keeping with the need of establishing effective safeguards against the destruction of one of Florida's most interesting and typical species. The initiative has been highly praised by the Florida Audubon Society, and is being recommended to other Chapters as very timely and appropriate.

All members and interested persons are cordially invited to take part in the first Nature Walk of the local Audubon season, to be held today, Thursday, January 11, starting at 2 p.m. Meeting point will be the entrance to the "Ding" Darling Sanctuary on Sanibel. Leader of the walk will be Hervey Roberts, who will point out and illustrate many aspects of Sanibel's native flora and natural beauty.

One of the season's most interesting programs will be held the following week, when the famed wildlife photographer, Robert C. Hermes, of the Audubon Screen Tour team, will present in person his program "Everglades, Sea of Grass!" Members and all interested in attending should note that because of the speaker's engagements, this program will take place ON WEDNESDAY, instead of on Thursday evening, as customary. The show will start at 8 p.m. at the Sanibel Community House, and all will be welcome.

The Venice Audubon conducted a Field Trip on Sanibel on January 8, and today about 60 members of the Sarasota Audubon are visiting the Islands, and particularly the "Ding" Darling Sanctuary. These groups were encouraged to come here by the local Audubon, and Mario Hutton, president, greeted the participants on both occasions.

CONCERT AT SOUTH SEAS

The Ohio State University Faculty Woodwind Quintet will present a concert Tuesday evening, January 16 at 8:30 p.m. at South Seas Plantation on Captiva Island. The concert is open and free to the public.

The Quintet is sponsored in their week of school and public concerts in the area by the Fort Myers Symphony Orchestra. (Donations will be accepted to assist in expenses.)

The members of the Quintet with their various backgrounds are: DONALD E. MCGINNIS is professor of music in Ohio State's School of Music, director of the Concert Band, and head of the school's instrumental department. He received the bachelor of music and bachelor of music education degrees from Oberlin College and master of arts and doctor of philosophy degrees from the State University of Iowa. Dr. McGinnis has held both first clarinet and first flute positions

TALENT NIGHT FOR TOURISTS

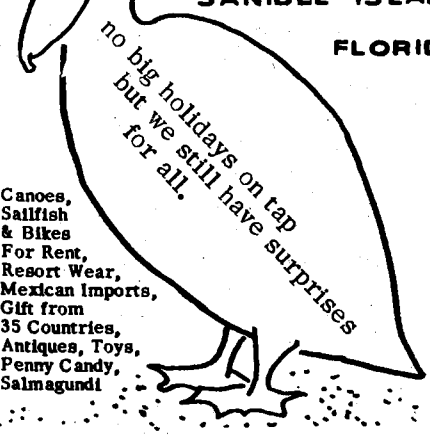

"TOO LATE TO CLASSIFY"

Nobody knows how many zany laws we have in the fifty states, dealing with just about every subject under the sun, but there are thousands of them, never repealed and still on the books.

A recent issue of Ford Times carried an article by Dick Hyman entitled "It's Still The Law" revealing numerous outmoded laws which have never been removed from the books.

For example, a law student in Miami discovered that it is illegal to proceed down Flagler Street at night in a motor vehicle unless proceeded by a lighted lantern, at least eight feet in front of the vehicle. The motorist apparently had a choice of either hiring someone to walk ahead with a lighted lantern or attach a 10 foot pole to his car with a lighted lantern attached.

In Lakeland it is against the law for a motor vehicle to be left standing on the highway unless it is substantially fastened.

In Eureka, Kansas an old law stipulates that before anyone can enter the city limits in an automobile, he must telephone the sheriff and warn him so that people's horses may be properly restrained.

In Pennsylvania the Farmer's Anti-Automobile Society high pressured the legislature into passing the following regulations: 1. Automobiles traveling on country roads at night must send up a rocket every mile, then wait 10 minutes for the road to clear. 2. If a driver sees a team of horses, he is to pull over to the side of the road and cover his machine with a blanket or dust cover that has been painted to blend with the scenery. 3. In the event a horse refuses to pass a car, the owner must remove his car and conceal it in the bushes.

New Hampshire produced the most hilarious regulation of all with a ruling that read, "When two motor vehicles meet at an intersection, each one shall come to a full stop and neither shall proceed until the other has gone."

There are plenty of others, not only concerning traffic but many other subjects. Wouldn't it be a good idea to review all laws and eliminate those that are outmoded and not enforceable?

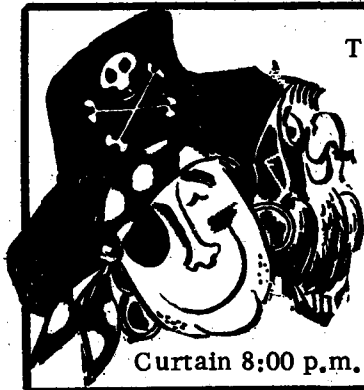

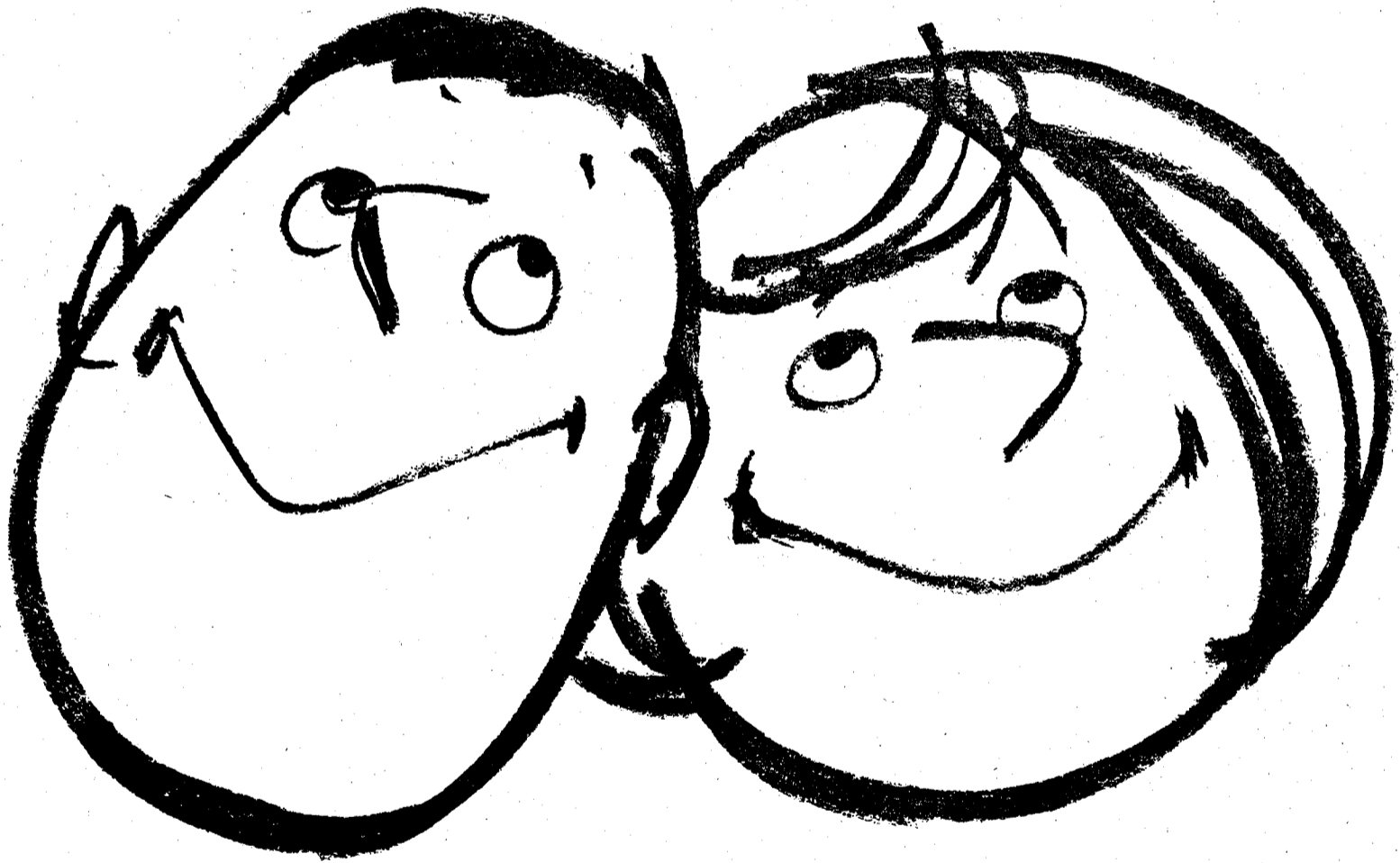

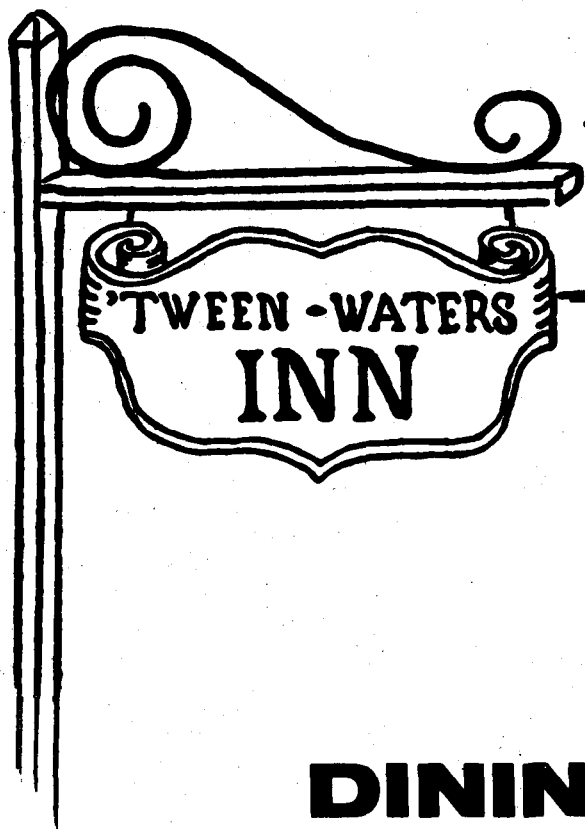
