


CAPTIVA CIVIC ASSOCIATION

Suggestions were made that some sort of ceremony be held to celebrate clearing the mortgage, possibly in connection with a potluck supper.

Mrs. Hazel Roberts, librarian, reported that before he left the Island Paul Everett, former association president, had written and signed some etters to kick off a campaign to raise the necessary funds remaining o build an addition to the Community Center to hold the growing library. "GO AHEAD" IN FEW WEEKS

"Go ahead" on the golf course and country club project for Sanibel should be in hand within five weeks. This was reported to the Board of Directors of the Sanibel-Captiva Golf & Country Club at a meeting Thursday, January 18. Marvin Roberts, state director of FHA Com-munity Services Division, Gainesville, advised the Board that he feels there should be no difficulties with the local application. He pointed out that his office has not had an application rejected.

Several requirements yet to be met on the application were dis-cussed with Mr. Roberts and Clemmie Williams of the Fort Myers FHA office, All materials should be with Mr. Williams by early next week, according to John Kontinos. Mr. Roberts stated it would take his office only one day to check and forward to D.C.

The delay in getting the application in order---it was first filed in November --- was due to some major and minor revisions required FHA procedures, and some information that had to be added. It is hoped that with the final commitment for the loan okayed within bv

five weeks, construction may start on the course on or about April 1. As soon as the loan commitment is approved, the local Board will

proceed to issue membership certificates to those who have subscribed, and will reactivate a membership committee to continue to work on obtaining additional subscribers. It is also planned to set up an advisory committee with broad representation from the two island communities





head which generate an electric current strong enough to give a severe shock. Usually under 3 ft. long—occasionally much larger. A similar species lives in the Pacific, and one other small electric ray occurs off Florida.

TORPEDO RAY

My wife and I spent the month of October, 1967, at Segunda Apts. on Sanibel and while there I had an experience you may be interested in. We were shelling at Bowman's Beach on a very calm day, hardly any waves. I was standing in water about 8 inches deep when I got a severe electric shock to one of my ankles. I jumped, hollered and ran out of the water. I thought right away that it was a Sting Ray but could see no blood on the ankle or any teeth or barb marks. I could see something moving in the water so I went back in and saw this funny looking fish very leisurely making his way along the bottom toward deeper water. I followed him for several feet and got a good look at him.

I sketched it and described it to several people at Sanibel and I do believe they thought I was a little off my rocker. I was almost convinced they might be right until today. I was looking through an old book of marine life one of my kids was throwing away and found the enclosed picture. This was the rascal that shocked me. It was about 14 to 16 inches long. There is no doubt in my mind that it was a Torpedo Ray. I can't help but wonder if this has happened to any one else at Sanibel.


SEA HORSE FASHION SHOW











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WHAT HAPPENED TO TO SOME 80-YEAR-OLD WHISKY

Perhaps the oldest whiskey ever quaffed in America was lapped up by thirsty citizens of Florida on the courthouse lawn in Wewahitchka, more than 40 years ago.

The bibulous feast happened like this: The Legislature appropriated money to erect a monument to Florida's first constitutional convention, which convened in 1838 in the now extinct city of St. Joseph. This vanished city was situated near the present town of Port St. Joe, in Gulf



Hours before the appointed hour, a vast multitude of thirsty citizens gathered at the site of the alcoholic mutilation. A small ravine ran through the carpet grass that covered the courthouse lawn. As the "massacred" whiskey trickled through the gleaming blades of grass into the ravine, forming a fragrant rivulet of Old World whiskey, authen-


St. Joseph, named for the husband of Mary, the mother of Jesus, was destroyed in 1841 by a yellow fever epidemic and a monstrous tidal wave that rolled in with savage fury from the Gulf of Mexico.

St. Joseph was perhaps Florida's most affluent city in 1841. Some of its wealthy citizens had liquor cellars wellstocked with the finest whiskies imported from the Old World.

When fever and furious seas wiped out this celebrated city, the caches of whiskey in the cellars of its citizens were left intact.


When excavations began in the 1920s for a foundation on which to erect the monument authorized by the Legislature, the diggers dug into one of those old whiskey cellars that had been aging its spirituous inventory for more than 80 years - perhaps the longest period alcoholic beverages ever were aged or undrunk.


SANCTUARY PLANS TO BE CONSIDERED

Consideration of future plans for the Jay N. (Ding) Darling Wildlife Refuge will be the focus of the "Island Conservation" conference to be held on Sanibel February 6. The meeting is sponsored by the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation, Inc., formerly the J.N. (Ding) Darling Memorial Committee.

With Griffing Bancroft, Captiva, serving as moderator, the panel sessions will feature presentations by Lawrence S. Givens, regional supervisor of the Atlanta Regional Office, Division of Wildlife Refuges, U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service; Dr. Joseph J. Shomon, director of the Nature Centers Division, National Audubon Society, New York, N.Y.; and Dr. Manley Boss, chairman of the Department of Biological Sciences, Florida Atlantic University. Purpose of the session will be to outline goals for the sanctuary and future activities for the local foundation.

Sessions are limited to representatives of organizations which have been active in obtaining the dedication of the sanctuary lands and their transfer to the Department of Interior. Those participating in addition to the panelists above will include staff members from the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Ser-vice offices in D.C., Atlanta and Loxahatchee; staff members of the Nature Centers Division; Joel Kuperberg and Nelson Sanford of Naples who have been designated by Nature Conservancy of Washington, D. C., to represent Thomas Richards and George Cooley, who will be unable to attend; Mr. and Mrs. Richard Koss repre-senting the Jay N. (Ding) Darl-ing Foundation of Des Moines; Terence O'Brien, representing the Alice M. O'Brien Foundation of Saint Paul, Minn.; W. M. Partington, Assistant Director of the Florida Audubon Society, Maitland, Fla., and the 11 mem-bers of the local Foundation's Board of Directors.

Part of the afternoon session will be devoted to consideration of possible acquisi-tion of additional sanctuary lands on the offshore chain of islands. This will include consideration of many of the small islands scattered throughout the entire area, some of the inland fresh water Sanibel slough system, and the Cavo C tract offered to the State for a park by Lt. Col. Philip Rasmussen and Lt. Col. Michael Hansinger, the owners. To climax the day, an in-vitational dinner will be held at the Coconut Grove Restaurant. It will serve to formally announce the formation of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation, and its future plans including membership and development campaigns. Speakers will be Dr. John Gottschalk, Director, Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife, U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service, Washington, D.C.; Dr. Shomon and Dr. Boss. The conference and dinner are financed from a grant to the local foundation by the Alice M. O'Brien Foundation, which is also financing a feasibility study by the Nature Centers Division for a nature center on Sanibel.



NEW MINIMUM DRIVING AGE SET AT 15

The minimum driving age in Florida is now 15, but the new law enacted in 1967 does not invalidate restricted licenses which were issued to persons 14 years of age prior to September 1, 1967, the Florida Highway Patrol said today.

Patrol commander, Colonel H.N. Kirkman, said, "Parents should help their children get a good start with their driving and teach respect for the law by seeing that all restrictions are followed by the young driver."

A restricted operator must be accompanied by a licensed operator at least 21 years of age occupying the front seat at all times. It is unlawful to drive without a license, even as a be-



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
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
