BALL DIAMOND UNDER WAY


The Sanibel Sharks baseball team is hard at work on the new ball diamond and sports field at the Sanibel Captiva School, The men of the team are working in cooperation with the Lee County School Board and the Lee County Park Department. The actual construction is being done by the Park Department with some help from the Island men.

So far the field has been cleared and graded and stablized with shell fill from the Park Department. Next, Georgia clay will be spread on the infield and the outfield constructed by the South Seas Plantation crew. South Seas will also donate the Bermuda grass to be planted

in the outfield. Francis Saxinger has said that the ball team itself will pay for the clay and donations (tax deductable) are asked from individuals and businesses on both Islands. 




HOLE IN ONE AT SOUTH SEAS

BUREAU NEEDS VOLUNTEERS

The Volunteer Service Bureau, Inc., sponsored by the Junior Welfare League of Fort Myers, is looking for individuals with spare time to donate their services, in one of the recognized non-profit health, welfare, civic, educational or cultural agencies of Lee County. The work is varied, from secretarial to working with children and the aged. The amount of time given is up to the individual, an hour a week or an hour a month can help those in need.

Mrs. J. Tom Smoot, Jr., a spokesman for the Bureau, said she is looking for someone to do typing and clerical work for a few hours a week in the Mental Health Association office. The office is located in the Community Service Building in downtown Fort Myers. The Volunteer Service Bureau was organized on the recommendation of the Lee County Health and Welfare Council. Its function is to be a clearinghouse for groups and persons interested in community service and the agencies needing volunteers. Volunteers can be High School students, retired people, homemakers, newcomers, business men and women, clubs and social groups --- anyone with a sincere desire to help others, and a willingness to share some of their time.



Officials of the South West Florida Art Council and Sears Roebuck and Co. are congratulating themselves on being able to secure the services of one of the outstanding artists not only of America but Europe as well, to act as judge in the showing of Southern Contemporary Art during the 4th Annual Festival to be held from March 6-9 in the Edison Mall in Fort Myers.

Ralph Scarlott began his work and his studies which have continued to this day, back in the days of the Academic period. He first became attracted to the modern impulse when he saw the famous Armory Show in New York City in 1913.

"Then and there I was won over to the impact of the moderns," he says. In spite of the fact that he has been devoting his time and energy to the modern idiom ever since, he is still appreciative of the work and the tradition of the Academicians.

By the early twenties, Scarlott had moved into the abstract field which was strengthened by his further studies in Paris and Switzerland which focused his interest on the non-objective, an interest which has grown steadily as he observed the many phases through which nonobjective art has passed, with its many labels: hard edge; geometric hard edge; action painting; non-figurative; nonrepresentative; color painting; abstract impressionism. Scarlott now calls his own work neo-non-objective, a term he has used since the late thirties when he worked in London and Paris

From 1939 till '51, he was with the Guggenheim Museum in New York where he often lectured. During this period, the museum purchased sixty of his large canvasses which are now part of their permanent collection. Other museums in the U.S.A. have shown and bought his paintings and he has had his work shown in Paris, Switzerland, Italy, England, Germany and other countries including Canada and South America. The Montreal Museum of Art has a number of his pictures.

During the sixties, he has worked in Madeira, Portugal and Italy. However his home remains divided between Scarsdale, N.Y., where he spends at least part of the summer, and Englewood, Florida, during the winter months. His paintings have been displayed in the Sarasota Art District and last year, he held a notable show at the Hilton Leech Art Center there

Many local artists have expressed themselves as delighted that the coming Contemporary Art Show was able to secure such a wonderful judge as all who know him praise his wide appreciation of all art forms and not necessarily only those of the non-objective painter.

WORLD DAY OF PRAYER

The World Day of Prayer, observed each year on the first Friday in Lent, is sponsored by Church Women United. It has a meaningful history dating from 1887. Prayer and giving for the world-wide mission of the Church have been its primary purpose. world-wide in character. The same basic service is used by groups in 126 countries and territories of the world. This provides an extraordinary opportunity for fellowship at a deep level and the experience of Christian unity in prayer with Christians all over the world.

This year the service will be held at St. Isabel's Roman Catholic Mission on Sanibel Island, March 1, at 2 p.m. All the churches on the Island are participating. Mrs. Joseph Gault will welcome the women of the Islands, and Mrs. Albert Muench will read the benediction. Mrs. Ruth Ross will play the organ during the afternoon, ending the service with the hymn, "Come Let Us Worship," set to music from a Thailand melody.

The World Day of Prayer offering taken in the United States goes to strenghen the outreach and ministry of the Church to the world. The gifts are channeled through the Division of Overseas Ministries and the Division of Christian Life and Mission of the National Council of Churches, the two divisions that relate to the work for which the offering is designated.




FESTIVAL WEEKEND

NEW SANCTUARY PLANNED

SANIBEL-CAPTIVA CONSERVATION FOUNDATION

The possibility for adding some 250 acres of virgin land on Cayo Costa as another major island sanctuary is being explored by the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation. Arrangements have been made with the owners for a local group, including representatives of the Foundation, the Sanibel-Captiva Audubon Society, and the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service, to inspect the property in the near future.

Originally proposed at the Islands' conservation conference sponsored by the Conservation Foundation, the idea has been favored by officials from Florida Atlantic University and the National Audubon Society who attended the meeting, Florida Atlantic is desirous of using the area for its proposed faculty and student studies on the Island chain, as it includes an unusually large, almost land-locked salt-water lagoon.

The land in question also includes about 5,000 feet of gulf front in addition to all of Lake Paraiso, plus extensive frontage on Pine Island Sound. It has been offered to the State for a park and the Lee County Board of County Commissioners endorsed the idea. The local group is seeking ways to assure that the land will be acquired by some agency---public and/or private---for park and sanctuary purposes.
