

FLORIDA GARDENING

Is there a bare corner in your home, your business building or your industrial plant that needs "something"? Nothing is more attractive than a low planter filled with colorful tropical foliage plants arranged in pyramidal fashion to form an interesting pattern against the wall, says President Richard Johnson of Florida Nurserymen and Growers Association.

In selection of plants for such a planter you will want an accent plant. This might be a tall palm, a bold-leafed seagrape, or a fiddle-leafed Ficus Pandurata---or even an orange tree! This is your "piece de resistance" or accent plant. In selecting other plants you will want to select plants for contrast in foliage shape, size, and color---and it may range from the bold-leafed Philodendron to the fern-like pilea!

Color harmony and color contrast are important. You will need some glossy green foliage, some variegated foliage, some gaily colored foliage. Since this plant is to add life and vibrancy to the room you will want to try several plants to make sure the arrangement is working out well.

When selecting plants for planters, compatibility has to be considered. Most people have an idea that compatibility is a term used in divorce courts, but plants, to be as beautiful as they should be, must also be compatible. It is not wise to plant plants that need lots of water in a planter where there are plants that should be kept on the dry side. If you are not sure as to what plants are compatible in sun and moisture requirements, then you should consult with your FNGA nurseryman. He can help you select those that will give the proper effect to your planting, and yet thrive under the same care.

Many people do not remove the plants from the pots, but plunge the pots into the peat moss or fill soil and feed and water each plant individually. This takes a bit more time. If you are careful to get compatible plants, you can plant them into the planter and care for them all at the same time --- and usually these plants will maintain loveliness longer, since they have root space to expand. Sometimes you find a need for pruning to keep your planter material from getting out of bounds in size. When this is necessary, it is far easier to remove the tips of the taller plants and hold them at a height that is pleasing. This should be done from the time the planting is installed, and thus omit the need for heavy pruning.

It is with real regret that I learned that the Rev. and Mrs. H.E. Sheely, now serving Community Church, will soon be returning to Pennsylvania. Their going will leave a deep rift, for we have all learned to love the good Reverend and his wife, and how we have enjoyed his pithy sermons and beautiful choice of poetry recitations. 

DRIVER LAW EXPLAINED

Colonel H.N. Kirkman, Director of the Department of Public Safety, today corrected some misunderstanding about Florida's new driver re-examination law by saying that no driving test, traffic law test or medical examination will be required.

In response to many inquiries about the law which was passed in the 1967 session of the legislature but does not become effective until 1971 Kirkman said, "Drivers must pass tests on eyesight, hearing and the ability to read and understand highway signs only,"

"Even with these limited tests valuable results are expected from discovering and placing under corrective restrictions the drivers with vision and hearing defects," Kirkman said,

NEW LIBRARY BOOKS ON ARTS AND CRAFTS

Four new books on art and one for beginners in weaving are available at the Sanibel Public Library. These books supply everything but imagination, and the talent to implement it.

The four art books, all new and revised, are by Arthur L. Guptill, artist, writer and teacher, and former editor of "American Artist."

"Color Manual for Artists" contains fifteen full color plates of original charts, diagrams and color swatches. All phases of color in painting are explored, including color facts and theories, the qualities of color, pigments, equipment and basic techniques.

"Watercolor Painting Stepby-Step" provides instructive exercises and demonstrations for each step of the watercolorist's craft. The volume contains twenty-five chapters covering every basic problem of the medium.

"Oil Painting Step-by-Step" covers the fundamentals about painting materials and tools and how to use them. Illustrated by 170 plates in color and blackand-white, the author takes the reader through the technical aspects of painting landscapes, portraits, still lifes, nudes and clothed figures.

"Drawing with Pen and Ink" guides the student or beginner on the kinds of pens, paper and ink to use, through pen handling, value study and sketching. Works by other artists are shown to illustrate techniques.

"Elements of Weaving" by Azalea Stuart Thorpe and Jack Lenor Larsen, is a generously illustrated work on all aspects of the craft from the fundamental principles of simple looms and elementary weaves to more advanced textile designs. Detailed instructions are given for three weaving projects, and an analysis is given of the steps involved in producing plain weave, basket weave, rib weave, the twills, brocades, and lacy weaves.

PUNISHMENT IS PART OF PURSUIT FOR PRESIDENCY by fuller warren

Mr. Historian: Why do politicians hunger and thirst for the presidency? They campaign 12 to 15 hours a day six days

to 15 hours a day, six days a week, month-after-month, wearing their voices down to a hoarse whisper. Their tired eyes take on a glassy stare. Their fatigued bodies ache from exhaustion. Their punishing campaign schedule permits eating only at irregular intervals, and then they must gulp food down so fast that gastric disturbances often are induced.

Mrs. Historian: What makes presumably sane men punish themselves in pursuit of the



presidency? Nobody knows, perhaps not even the candidates themselves. The burning yearning to be president seems to be a sort of obsession, unexplainable on rational grounds.

Mr. Historian: How far back has this obsession obsessed politicians pursuing the presidency?

Mrs. Historian: Almost from the beginning of the republic. Washington was about the only president who did not seethe with a gnawing ambition for the job; and even he may not have been so reluctant to serve as some historians claim.

One of America's most gifted statesmen, Henry Clay of Kentucky, spent most of his adult life trying to be president. As the presidential nominee of the Whig Party (putative parent of the Republican Party), Clay was defeated in 1824 by John Quincy Adams.

Eight years later, in 1832, as the Whig nominee for president, Clay was defeated by Andrew Jackson, Florida's first governor (territorial, 1821).

Twelve years later, in 1844, still carrying the Whig banner, Clay was cut down at the polls by James K. Polk of Tennessee.

In 1840, Clay tried in vain to get the Whig nomination for president.

In the twilight of a great and useful career, Clay, at 71, still sought that elusive phantom, the presidency.


He made his fifth attempt for the Whig Party nomination in 1848 but lost to Zachary Taylor of Louisiana, who was elected the 12th president of the U.S.

Florida's most famous adopted son, William Jennings Bryan, pursued the presidency almost as long---and as futilely---as Henry Clay. With the most sensational speech ever delivered at a national political convention, Bryan seized the Democratic nomination for president at Chicago in 1896. Bryan was only 36 when he thundered, "You shall not press down upon the brow of labor this crown of thorns, you shall not crucify mankind upon a cross of gold."

Making campaign speeches in nearly every state, Bryan lost to William McKinley, who campaigned mostly from his front porch in Canton, Ohio. In 1900, Bryan again snared

the Democratic nomination for president and again was defeated by McKinley.

In 1908, the relentless Bryan, in his quenchless quest of the White House, once more got the nod for the nomination and was trampled at the polls by Theodore "Rough Rider" Roosevelt.



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ALLIGATORS PROTECTED

Congressman Paul Rogers termed the endangered species passed out of the House Merchant Marine and Fisheries Committee as the most effective legislation yet designed to protect Florida's alligators.

The bill sets up federal machinery to prosecute dealers in poached alligator hides. The full committee passed the bill this morning. Hearings were held earlier in the subcommittee on fisheries and wildlife conservation, of which Rogers is also a member. Rogers supported the legislation and backed the amendment which included alligators among the species which the legislation covers.

Rogers explained that present law covers the transport in interstate or foreign commerce of many species, but the reptile family that includes the alligator, was not given protection under this law.

"We have included reptiles and amphibians and other such wildlife in the bill," Rogers said. "This means that the person who buys alligator hides and then sells them, or the person who buys them in another state now are violating a federal

law, "If a poacher is not caught in the act of slaughtering and can get the carcass of hide to a shipper, there is little state or federal officials can do under the present law," Rogers said. "But I anticipate the House will act soon on this legislation so that anyone dealing in the un-lawful handling of alligator hides will be subject to federal penalties and fines.

The bill carries penalties up to a \$1,000 fine and/or six months in prison. "Our alli-gators are fast vanishing," Rogers said. "I think this legislation is the most effective piece of machinery yet devised to halt this slaughter."

AUDUBON SOCIETY

A talk on birding and bird banding in Taiwan and Africa will be given to the Sanibel-Captiva Audubon Society by Leslie Severinghaus of Coconut Grove, Florida, at the Sanibel Community Center tonight (March 28). The meeting, to which the public is welcome, will start at 8 o'clock.

Severinghaus, recently retired headmaster of the Haver-

ford School, Haverford, Pennsylvania, and a Trustee of Cornell University, has been interested in ornithology since boyhood. He has had extensive ornithological experience in southeastern Asia and Taiwan, where his son, Dr. Sheldon Severinghaus, is at present teaching biology at the Univer-sity of Taipei, Together father and son have been studying the transmission of virus diseases by birds in that part of the world. They have banded birds up to levels of 10,000 feet in the Taiwan mountains.

Severinghaus and Mrs. Severinghaus have recently returned from a trip of more than 3,000 miles in eastern and southern Africa. Some of the pictures he will show were taken on that trip. During his last stay in Taiwan, Severinghaus and his son attended the meeting of the World Conservation Union in Thailand, Incidentally, first Audubon-sponsored trip was in Florida more than two decades ago. It was followed by trips in several other parts of the United States.

REMINDER TO REGISTER

Secretary of State Tom Adams today reminded Floridians that there are only 10 days left in which to register to vote in the May primaries.

By law, the voter registration books will close in all counties on April 6, Adams said, and they will not reopen until after the May 7 and May 28 primaries are over. "I urge all Floridians who

"I urge all Floridians who are eligible but not yet registered to vote to make every effort to do so during the coming week," Adams said. "It's your last chance if you want to help select your party's nominees in the November 5 General Election.

"If you don't bother to register and vote, you certainly won't have any grounds for complaining about the direction which our government takes during the next few years."

Adams pointed out that the voter rolls have been completely purged in all 67 coun-ties, and "many voters will find that they are no longer registered if they failed to return their reregistration cards." The Secretary of State, who is Florida's chief elections of-ficer, explained, "The registration purge is required by law, and reregistration cards were mailed to the last known address of every voter in Florida. The new registration books in each county were made up from those cards which were returned. "If you are in doubt about your voting status," Adams said, I suggest you immediately contact your County Supervisor of Elections." Adams estimated that nearly 2,500,000 voters will be registered for the 1968 elections.

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
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
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
