The Islands' artists kept up their winning streak in the latest art show, the Fifth Annual Exhibit of the Art Council of Southwest Florida.

Hugo Asbach of Captiva, who also took "Best of Show" in the recent Sears exhibit as well as in the Cape Coral show, again walked off with top honors when he was awarded "Best of Show" for his oil entitled "Macoa."

Jane Bancroft, also of Captiva, won the First Award in mixed media for her collage, "School Is Out."

Leon Levy of Sanibel Island took Second Award in the same division for his "Kaleidescope."

Other Islanders whose works were picked to hang in the show (and the competition was rough---only 74 pictures were picked from over 300 submitted) were Bob Haynie of Sanibel and Will Snyder, also of Sanibel.

Gale D. Bennett's "Asia Minor" won the Judge's Choice Award given by the Sanibel Captiva Art League. Miss Bennett is from Fort Myers. Lriscilla Murphy of Sanibel awarded the oil Still Life prize of \$100 to Jean Dean of Cape Coral.

Pat Dosher of Fort Myers won the Sea Horse Shop's prize for Best Watercolor of Florida Scene.







There will be a Club picnic on Sunday, April 21. All members of the Sanibel-Captiva Democratic Club are invited, together with their families and guests.







SANIBEL-CAPTIVA CONSERVATION FOUNDATION

The Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation has unanimously adopted the following Statement of Purposes:

The Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation is dedicated to the belief that people, if they have the will to preserve it, can enjoy rather than destroy the world around them. We here have a unique opportunity to demonstrate this by conserving the natural qualities of our Islands which set them aside as a distinctive way of life for residents and visitors alike.

Sanibel, Captiva and the chain of islands of which they form a part are still relatively undeveloped. They offer one of the last opportunities to preserve the rich treasury of wildlife and vegetation which flourish in a semi-tropical wilder-

ness.

Time is short, as bitter lessons learned too late in other parts of the country have shown. But the Foundation believes these assets can be preserved by orderly development rather than exploitation. To this end the Foundation, working closely with other conservation groups and continually soliciting the opinions of others, sets forth the following goals. Their achievement will require the support of all interested people.

1. Land Acquisition. The Foundation, as successor to the Ding Darling Memorial Committee, is proud to have taken the lead in the creation of the Ding Darling sanctuary. We believe other areas can similiarly be set aside. And we feel land developers can be shown the financial rewards for preserving portions of their holding.

in a natural state.

2. Wildlife Protection. Wildlife cannot flourish isolated even in a sanctuary. Surrounding estuarine areas with the basic nourishment for birds, fish, shellfish and other life must be preserved, unpolluted. And there must be areas for unmolested feeding and breeding. This requires eternal vigilance against the march of industrialization and of campers, picnickers and other invaders. Our islands are as rich in plant as in animal life and this, too, can be preserved. Much can be accomplished by encouraging the retention and planting of native vegetation.

3. Orderly Development. In all cases we will seek to cooperate with developers and to provide technical and scientific studies which may point the way to the types of development that can benefit both the developer and the conservationist. As one point, there should be access roads to Upper Captiva and Lecosta Islands but this should not include a highway running directly through the Island chain.

4. Education. Children and adults, laymen and experts all have much to learn about the other forms of life which share this planet with us. The Foundation will sponsor general educational programs as well as special ecological research. From this we expect to gain knowledge to provide the basis for further steps to conserve the environment cherished by us all.




PIRATE PLAYHOUSE NOTES



SEA CHEST By RAY SOREL

When a boat owner pays \$20 in labor charges for an oil change, you're likely to get the idea that boatyards are in the habit of gouging the owners of boats. This is an almost universal notion, but not necessar-

The man who paid \$20 for an oil change had two engines in his boat. They were V-8's. They had been adapted to marine use from a popular automobile engine.

As you know, you drain the oil out of an automobile engine through a drain plug in the bot -tom of the crankcase. But you can't drain the oilthis way when the engine is put into a boat because there's no way to get at the underside of the engine to remove the plug.

Even if you could get at the plug, you could only let the oil drain into the bilge (messy, messy) because there isn't room to get a pan under the engine to catch the drainings. Usually, you suck the oil out through the dip-stick hole with a thin tube...or through the filler pipe if it doesn't have baffles

But these V-8 engines had baffles in the filler pipes and the dip stick was a long flexible flat spring that had to wend its way through a tube that curved around the block before entering the crankcase. You could t suck the oil out through tas dipstick deal.

The instruction bookforthis engine suggested that when it was time to change the oil, you disconnect one of the oil lines, start the engine, and let it pump itself dry of oil. Not many people with any sense relish the thought of running an engine without oil, even for a minute or so.

It cost the boat owner \$20 because a machanic had to dismantle part of the engine so that he could stick a tube into the crankcase and pump out the oil.

Another characteristic of automobile "marine" engines that cost a boat owner money is the placement of accessories. It's a convenience in an automobile to mount the oil filter under the engine so that it can be changed while the car is up on the rack draining the crankcase. But this location for the filter on a boat is almost inaccessible. The boat owner will pay for the time it takes a mechanic to worm his way into a space that would be crowded for an undernourished child and try to find some way to reach the filter. He will also pay for the time the mechanic uses trying to seat a new gasket and holding the filter cover in place while screwing in the mounting bolt ... all with one hand.

Some manufacturers mount the distributor on the forward part of the engine. If the builder of the boat hasn't provided an access door in the forward engine room bulkhead, it will cost the boat owner as much to change the distributor contacts as it did to change the oil.

The belts that drive the water pump and generator on some engines are located behind a cast iron shroud which is part of the engine mount. You can't remove this shroud to get at the belts without removing the engine. So you have to do the best you can to get

the belts off and on with the shroud in place...which the boat owner pays for of course.

Boat builders share some of the responsibility for the high labor costs in boat maintenance. This is because they will stuff a couple of big engines in the smallest possible space in order to leave more living room. They don't leave enough room to get at the engines for maintenance.

I saw an air conditioning system installation in a large yacht which was obviously not planned for proper maintenance. Some of the components had built into a locker space with wood trim around it which had been nailed and glued in place. It would have been just as easy to use screws on the wood trim so that it could have been removed without damaging the woodwork.

These are the real reasons why it costs so much to maintain a boat these days. It's unlikely that the craftsmen who work on your boat are paid any more money than the ones who work on your car or home.






