



Leave some brushy areas for the ground living birds. If you had no choice on saving and your shrubs and must start from scratch, do use some native plantings.

Respect our wild neighbors. It's their island too.

Islander Returns For A Visit

The other day I had a most pleasant conversation via telephone with a former Island resident, who now lives in Miami. It was none other than Robert Knowles, who in the years of 1919-20-21 was the first school teacher on Captiva. I found him so interesting to talk with, that I thought that you might enjoy hearing about the early life and experiences of Mr. Knowles.

He was born in Inverness, Fla., seventy-two years ago. His father came from the state of Arkansas and met his mother in Sumter County near Oxford, Fla. After marriage they moved to Inverness where Robert was born. He is not sure of this but thinks that he must have been between the age of six weeks, and six months when his parents moved to Punta Gorda and their method of transportation was a covered wagon.


He remembers his mother telling him of placing him on a pillow in the wagon as they traveled where he would watch the canvas cover and chuckle gleefully.

He assumes that his parents must have sold the covered wagon and animals to use as payment for their boat transportation to Captiva Island. Upon reaching the Island, the father, with his last fifty cents bought a hoe and went to work for W.L. (Tobe) Bryant, with whom they also lived until such time as the father could build his family a house of their own; the material used was palmetto.

One of his earliest recollections is about being handed a paper to read and it was all about the starving children of India. Not realizing that India was another separate country, and associating this with the Island grocery store, he innocently asked his mother, "Won't old Whitesides give the children anything to eat? "Whitesides, of course, being the owner of the grocery store.

He remembers going out with other children to pick sea grapes, which was a big event, because several families would get together for this excursion and he says they would pick a lot of the grapes.

One of the recollections concerns a family comprised of three girls and one boy, that boy being none other than our own Arthur Gibson, who recently

SEA CHEST by ray sorel

Should you buy a boat that's put together with brass screws? Brass certainly costs more than steel or galvanized iron and it shouldn't make those unsightly brown stains you get with iron or steel.

Sure brass costs more, but if those brass screws are exposed to sea water you could be in just as much trouble as you would with galvanized iron. You might get into this trouble sooner, as a matter of fact, and because the brown stains were absent you might not even realize that you had any trouble.

Brass and bronze are not the same thing. Brass is made of copper, tin, and zinc. Bronze is made of copper and tin with maybe just a smidgeon of zinc. That zinc is what gives the trouble. You put brass in sea water and pretty soon all the zinc is gone leaving a spongy, brittle skeleton of bronze that lets go at the wrong time. If you have plywood boat fastened with brass and covered with fiberglass, you're OK. But you'd be OK with the same boat fastened with galvanized iron screws which are stronger and cheaper. Brass is fine in Florida's many fresh water lakes, though.

Most of the sharpies building boats were eliminated in the fierce competition of a few years ago and the "truth in advertising" laws are making newcomers to the game cautious. But there are still some around who are willing to capitalize on the ignorance of their customers. When a builder advertises that his boats are fastened with brass screws, he is either ignorant himself or trying to capitalize on the ignorance of the public. If HE is ignorant, you don't want to buy one of his boats.

Wood as a construction material for boats has some deficiencies. Some woods under some conditions will rot---especially here in Florida. All woods are subject to attack by marine borers unless protected by antifouling paint. But practically ALL the advantages and disadvantages of wood

are well known. We are not going to get into trouble with wood because of some advantage which doesn't exist.

We can't say the same thing for some new materials---plastics for instance. Fiberglass reinforced plastic has been used for making everything from dishes to automobile bodies. Most dishes today are made of thermo-setting plastics which are not usually reinforced with fiberglass, but the fiberglass plastics are the glamour materials in today's industry. We have a set of Melmac plastic dishes which we've owned for about 20 years and we haven't lost a single piece through breakage. The only complaint we have is that it stains. We would say that this material for its purpose has been well tested.

Fiberglass reinforced plastics on the other hand did not meet with immediate success in the applications which were chosen. The two main plastics that were chosen were polyesters and epoxies. The automobile industry was sold on fiberglass reinforced plastics to the extent that one American manufacturer produced a "sport" car body of this material. Several boat-builders also began turning out fiberglass hulls. These manufacturers used the polyester plastic almost exclusively because of its low cost compared to the epoxies in spite of the demonstrated superiority of physical characteristics in the epoxies.

The manufacturer of the "sport" car found that the plastic body failed at the mounting points to the chassis. The early manufacturers of boats found their boats were coming apart at embarrassing moments. The makers of fiberglass boats who survived are more cautious now. They use quality materials where they are needed and test their products to protect their name.

But they still have a fit every time an article like this gets in print.


Considered a luxury only a few years ago, good landscaping is now considered a necessity, as well as an important investment. Since a planting increases both in beauty and in value after its installation, it certainly, with proper care, should be considered a growing investment!

After a bit the investor wondered why it did not sell and decided that it could be that the lack of landscape planting might be the answer. He called a landscape

firm and asked that they design and plant the grounds, which they did. The house immediately sold, with a profit on the cost of the landscape contract.

Recently Dr. J.H. Tinga, Associate professor of Horticulture at Virginia Polytechnic Institute, made a rather startling statement. He feels that renting a landscape may become as common in future years as renting a car today. He indicates that there are economic advantages for both the customer and the landscaper to lease the landscape plantings on a five year basis rather than handling the transaction as an outright sale. With a leased landscape, the contractor would supply maintenance for the period of a lease. If the customer is a corporation or business expense rather than a capital outlay.



ORATORY UNLIMITED

It is impossible to overestimate the influence of oratory on the growth and development of America. Patrick Henry's immortal "Give me liberty or give me death" speech in 1775 was a sort of "midwife" to the birth of this nation. Fiery speeches by Samuel Adams, James Otis and other masterful orators incited the American Revolution and strengthened the determination of the colonists to resist the cruel oppression of that mad monarch, King George III of England.

Lincoln's incomparable oratory rescued "the last best hope of earth"---this nation---and gave a "new birth" to freedom.

Nearly all sections of this great nation have produced some powerful orators. But it is probably accurate to say the South has been the home of the greatest avatars of eloquence. Perhaps the most eloquent of all Southerners was a young Georgian (he died at 39, in 1889) named Henry W. Grady, editor of an Atlanta newspaper. He possessed that "peculiar power of persuasive speech that stirs men's blood and thrills their souls."

He took as his great task the re-uniting of the dis severed sections of our country after the Civil War. At Grady's funeral, another great Georgian said of him, "... when he died he was literally loving the nation into peace." Another sorrowing friend said of Grady, "He helped to heal the wounds of war in every heart, as on every hill."

Florida has produced no orator of the first rank, and only a very few of the second rank. At the moment, only two such spellbinders come to mind.

The greatest of all American orators probably was Daniel Webster. For some thirty years he was universally acknowledged to be the preeminent speaker in America. His great speeches in the U.S. Senate were the most powerful influence, next to Chief Justice John Marshall's judicial opinions, in erecting this nation's enduring temple of constitutional liberty.

Webster was a great lawyer and earned many big fees, but he was nearly always hard up for money. His chief rival in the Senate, Henry Clay, also suffered from the "shorts," money-

wise. One day, Clay went down to the Riggs National Bank in Washington and asked for a loan of \$250. He was handed a blank form of promissory note and told to get an endorser. Clay took the blank note to Webster and asked him to endorse it. Webster asked Clay how much he was borrowing. When Clay told him \$25 Webster said, "If you'll make it \$500 and let me have \$250, I'll endorse the note for you." This was done and the two great, but impecunious, orators shared,

fifty-fifty, the \$500 loan. Webster's and Clay's UNPAID note for \$500 was proudly exhibited for years in the lobby of the Riggs National Bank.





