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

ONE VERY PRETTY EXAMPLE OF FLORIDA **FAUNA** NOT ON DISPLAY AT PREIWINKLE TRAILER



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

by ray sorel If you want to get an argument going some time, tell an experienced sailor that it's possible to sail faster than the wind. It's surprising the number of small craft sailors who don't really understand how the wind propels a sailboat.

We don't get much ice and snow here in Florida but the approaching winter got me to thinking about the ice boating that's done in the frozen north at this time of year and the fact that back in the late 1800's and early 1900's, the fastest vehicle on earth was an ice boat. The speed record for an ice-boat in those days was about 120 miles an hour. There was a train that traveled over a special line of track that almost reached this speed and was the fastest powered vehicle on earth. What I mean is, that the train was the fastest vehicle powered with fuel that it carried. The sailboat needs power like anything else, but its power comes from the wind.

If a sailboat couldn't travel any faster than the wind, these ice-boat records would have had to be set during a hurricane. Even if anybody was foolhardy enough to try sailing a boat during a hurricane, there just aren't many hurricanes in the north in the middle of winter. The fact of the matter is that these records. were set in winds that blew little more than 50 or 60 miles

an hour.

Just to give you some idea of relatively common speeds these ice yachts could attain, hre are some typical distance/ time figures I got from "Sailing Craft" by Edwin J. Schoettle (The Macmillan Company, 1945). "In 1879 the Zephyr of the New Hamburg I.B.C. ran from Poughkeepsie to New Hamburg, a distance of nine and three-quarter miles, in ten minutes. On February 12, 1879, the Lucille, owned by Captain Winslow, sailed this distance of nine miles in seven minutes ten seconds; the Snow Flake, 44 feet, 10 inches long, ran the distance in seven minutes; and in 1882 the Haze made the same speed, at one point in the flight sailing two miles in one minute (120 miles an hour!). In 1879, the Comet, Phantom, Zephyr, and Magic sailed, in company, ten miles in ten minutes, and for most of the time ... they carried their windward runners at an angle of forty-five degrees.

There's a story about a business man who lived up the Hudson River and commuted to his office in New York City by train. He was an ice boating enthusiast and had often raced the trains that ran along the river in his ice boat. One day he missed his train and he was afraid that he would miss an important appointment. Although the train was several miles down the track, he got out his ice boat and set out to catch the train. The train traveled at 60 miles an hour or more but it had to stop at various stations and the businessman was able to catch up to it and ride the rest of the way in to the city on the train. He got off at the same station where he had caught the train on his way home and sailed the ice boat back to its moorings.

The ice boat reaches such high speeds because of the low friction of the runners and the wind blowing at right angles to the direction of travel. It's like squirting a slippery watermelon seed at high speed from between your lips . . . or maybe like step-ping on a bar of wet soap. If you're careful, you can make the bar of soap skid across the floor at high speed (without falling down) even though your foot traveled downward at no special high velocity.
