MEMORIAL FUND STARTED




FUN DANCE

MRS. SPENCER EWING

The Sanibel-Captiva Islands community and the cause of island conservation lost a sturdy friend in Mrs. Spencer Ewing, who died at Beacon Manor, Fort Myers, Saturday, June 29.

A staunch supporter of many island activities, Mrs. Ewing had helped to organize the Chapel-by-the-Sea on Captiva and continued to participate in its support throughout her life. An ardent shell collector, she was dedicated to all causes of conservation. She served for a number of years as President and Vice-President of the Sanibel-Captiva Audubon Society. Even during her final illness at Beacon Manor, she continued to seek news of what was doing in the island community, and reports on conservation work gave her great satisfaction.

At her family home in Bloomington, Indiana, Mrs. Ewing had engaged in broad and diverse community work. Her activities included Woman's Club, Musical Club, Philharmonic Society, Community Players, League of Women Voters, YWCA, Illinois Historical Society, American Association of University Women and Smith College Alumnae Assn., among others, she organized the Illinois Home Bureau Federation, and was its first President. She acted as delegate from the Federation to the International Triennial Conferences of the Associated Country Women of the world in London, Washington, Amsterdam and Toronto.

Mrs. Ewing was 94 at her death. For the last 20 years she had spent winters on the islands, and summers in Connecticut, her husband having died in 1952. She is survived by a niece, Mrs. William E. Stevenson of Captiva.



NOTICE TO ALL CHAMBER OF COMMERCE MEMBERS

At the last Chamber of Commerce meeting the new Sanibel-Captiva brochure booklet was approved to replace the mailing list now in use. It was agreed that the new booklet would save a tremendous amount of dupli-cation and that the cost of an ad would be less than the brochure's stamps, stationary now being used by each motel. In addition the Lee County and Florida Developing Commission lists will be answered which should offset the possible vacancies created by the 250 new units planned to be built on Sanibel in the next year.

The revenue raised would enable us to quadruple our advertising budget, pay for a much needed full time assistant for Bill Neuman and enable the Chamber of Commerce to stay open for longer hours.

Any member of the Chamber of Commerce can place an ad although no one is required to do so. There will be a free listing of all members of the Chamber of Commerce printed in the booklet with address and telephone number. The cost of an ad will be \$1,000,00 for a full page ad in color and \$700.00 for a full page in black and white, 1/2, 1/4, and 1/8 page ads would be divided into a full page cost plus 10%. Businesses will supply their own color or black and white prints. The printing company will provide free layout assistance to any subscriber. Deadline for photos is August 15th and August 30th for ads.

FLORIDA DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS AFFAIRS

M. T. Dixon, director of the Fla. Dept. of Veterans Affairs, said today that recent changes in the GI Home Loan Program should make it easier for thousands of unremarried widows to get GI home loans. Basic eligibility requirements are that the widow's husband either die on active duty or from a service connected disability, and the Veteran's service was during World War II, Korean Conflict or the Vietnam era.

A new law permits the VA to guarantee home loans up to \$12, 500 of the loan amount, but not more than 60% of the loan. The higher ceiling on GI loan interest rates which went into effect recently, should help these widows get a GI loan from a commercial lending institution. Many eligible widows had husbands who served in World War II, and under current legislation they still have more than two years to obtain a GI loan - until July 25, 1970. Entitlement for qualified widows of men who served in the Korean Conflict is not scheduled to expire until January 1975.

Widows whose spouses served during the Vietnam era, or any time after January 31, 1955, will have their eligibility expire (a) 20 years from the date of the veteran's death in service, (b) 20 years from the date of the veteran's discharge, or (c) March 3, 1976, whichever is later.

Widows who think they might qualify for GI loans should obtain further information from the Veterans Administration or from their local Veteran County Service Officer.



THE HOME OF OUR LADY OF SOLITUDE

This year was 1597 and the little Spanish garrison on the northeast Florida coast was in danger of annihilation by disease, pirates, fire and poverty. It had been established for the purpose of protecting the shipping lanes of the gold-laden Spanish fleets as they traveled from the Americas to Spain. Then, too, they were there to rescue sailors and other persons who were continually be-ing wrecked by storms in the Bahama Channel.

When Gonzalo Mendez de Canzo arrived in the garrison of St. Augustine in June, 1597, to take over the governorship, he brought with him a priest to serve as Chaplain for the garrison, 24 soldiers and 10 or 12 women "of good reputation" who were expected to become wives of the soldiers. They found that there were at least two "barber sur-geons" and a hospital being built at the Hermita Nuestra Senora de la Soledad (Home of our Lady of Solitude.)

Governor Mendez gave the hospital his support because he felt it was of great benefit to the arrison. In fact, if there had been no hospital during the sum-

mer of 1597, many soldiers, Indians and royal slaves would have died because of the "extensive fever."

But like hospitals today, the cost of founding the hospital in St. Augustine exceeded the contributions collected by more than 500 ducates. Governor Mendez asked the Spanish monarch, Phillip II, for financial support and for the assignment of an old female royal slave to serve in the hospital, make beds, cook for the patients and keep the place clean - all of which was lacking. The Crown eventually authorized the release of 500 ducates from the treasury in Mexico and allowed the Governor to select the slave to serve exclusively in the hospital.

But despite the surface appearance of success, the first hospital on the North American Continent was not to flourish long. On March 14, 1599, less than two years after the hospital was completed, the nearby Franciscan convent and much of the town was destroyed by fire. The missionary priests then moved into the Hermita and the hospital.

The latter ceased to exist. Further privations resulted from a tidal wave which swept over the garrison in September 1599. The following year the lack of food forced many residents to abandon

In 1600. Governor Mendez, moved by charity, organized another hospital in honor of Santa make a gift to the hospital, which

was an "institution of decent appointments" with six beds, constructed of palm and well built. The staff consisted of a majordomo, who was to visit the sick and see to the operating of the hospital, and a female slave who would care for the patients. Surgeons from the presidio were to attend to the patients.

The Hospital Santa Barbara flourished for eight years. When the Convent of San Francisco was rebuilt, a hospital was reestablished in the Hermita of Nuestra Senora de la Soledad. Other royal hospitals were to follow through the centuries. These were frequently staffed by soldiers who were too old to do other types of military service. Eventually Brothers of the Order of San Juan

de Dios came from Havana to minister to the sick.

Like hospitals today, early St. Augustine healing institutions were plagued by a shortage of funds. A form of "medicare" was instituted by royal decree in 1597 to partially support the Spanish hospital at St. Augustine. A soldier was to contribute six reales a year and officers were to give a proportionate amount. Later a similar royal decree was issued that said each soldier would give 12 reales toward the hospital maintenance. This amounted to approximately 60 cents a year. Unlike the hospitals of today, the clothing and belongings of patients who died in the institution were kept by the hospital as alms.

Next column: Born in time of terror. In the summer heat of 1888, people were fleeing Jacksonville by the thousands. The rumors of a yellow fever epidemic became fact as death carts clattered down the streets. No State Board of Health existed. Should the Governor call the legislature into special session to create one?
