### ANNOUNCEMENT

Charles LeBuff of the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife announced today that the Bureau is making arrangements to allow contractors or individuals to remove fill dirt from an area within the Bailey Tract on Tarpon Bay Road.

The Bailey Tract, part of the J. N. "Ding" Darling National WILDLIFE Refuge, is to be improved for wildlife use and to further public enjoyment of the area. This improvement requires the opening of overgrown water areas for better utilization of habitat and to allow the Bureau to begin better management of the 80 acre tract.



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"HEART OF PALM" AND TURTLEBURGERS WERE OLD-TIME FAVORITES by Vera M. Cantor

Cabbage paim trees and log-gerhead turtles, unique to semitropical islands, were used by the early Sanibel and Captiva residents for food, according to Clarence Rutland who has been a Sanibel resident since 1895.

Mr. Rutland, who was a farmer for many years and now raises coconut trees on the island told us about "heart of palm" or "swamp cabbage," derived from the cabbage palm tree. At the turn of the century, cabbage palm trees were numerous on Sanibel and Captiva since most of the land had not been cleared.

When we asked Mr. Rutland how he obtained the "heart of palm," he described how he used to chop the trunk of the cabbage palm in two below the frond and remove the long, tender white center, about 2 ft. long and 8"

"Mrs. Rutland used to cut it up in ice-water so it wouldn't turn dark. Then she would mix it with mayonnaise and cut an apple up in it for a salad. Sometimes she would steam the heart of palm with bacon fat and a little

water," said Mr. Rutland.
"Heart of palm" was an important part of fish fries and was served with mullet, baked beans and coleslaw.

Loggerhead turtles, which were prevalent on the Sanibel-Captiva beaches in April, May and June in the early 1911's were also used for food, according to Clarence Rutland. The turtles, together with deer quail and rabbits, provided a source of fresh meat on the island. The 250-lb. turtles would crawl on the beaches at night, from April to June to lay eggs.

"You could spot them in the moonlight by their 'blowing,' said Mr. Rutland, "They can't stay under water more than five minutes, then they surface.'


The early settlers would turn the turtle over on its back, chop off its head, take the shell off and remove the quarters, and hang them in the shade to drip. The meat was then sliced off and put in salt rind.

When ready to cook, the turtle meat was soaked in fresh water. The large boneless turtle steaks were either broiled, fried, roasted or made into "turtleburgers." and tasted much like beef.

Today, loggerhead turtles, deer and quail are protected by law, Mr. Rutland revealed, due to the increased population of the islands. Although he misses these old-time delicacies, Mr. Rutland believes whole-heartedly in the necessity for conservation, in order to retain the area as a true

WHAT COULDHAPPEN TO SANIBEL-CAPTIVA (Reprinted from the Fort Myers News Press, Monday, Jan. 27,

Dear Ted:

I just wanted to let you and the family know why I won't be seeing you this winter, I can't tell you how glad I was for your people down in Southwest Florida when I read in the Times about the new improvements taking place down there, especially on Sanibel and Captiva Islands where we used to do a lot of fishing vacationing. I guess that scenic eight-lane interstate-freeway they built along the beach and gulf islands connecting Naples to Tampa on the water was rewlly quite an improvement and I know it did a lot for employment in the area because I read where they have more than 100 gas stations on Sanibel now, with the ones on the beach freeway staying open all night and hiring double crews.

The article was telling how difficult it is to find room for a new gas station because the highrises were using most of the beachfront land. That success story on Joe Smith, when he bought that old lighthouse and turned it into a ferris wheel and parachute drop with a boardwalk and pinball machine stand attached, was really something. He is quite a businessman. I heard he was starting a plastic shell factory down there this year because the real ones are kinda running short in supply, now that they've bulkheaded 97 per cent of the island. I think they ought to sell pretty good, and I saw a picture of some of those sample plastic shells and they look almost like

the real ones used to look.

But I guess the biggest improvement down there was when they built that super shopping and fun center on that vacant land that used to be called the Ding, or Darling something or other. You know what one I mean - that shopping center called the Hickel Plaza, the biggest store in the state. Course you'd need something big like that to supply that population of 28,000 people just living in the Sanibel high-rises.

Remember that time back in the 1960s vacation down there? Boy was that fun. The kids and Mary talked about it all spring, and then summer. Doing my income tax. I ran across the figures on that long weekend. I remember figuring out how much tax money I paid to the State of Florida back then, and how I thought it was considerable. After bridge tolls, almost \$100 for three nights in the motel with the kids, the fare for four people eating three meals a day, the golf course rates including the cart fare for an out-of-shape weekender like me and the other stuff, like fishing trips and boat rentals, shelling trips and even some nice and relaxing nightlife, I figured I paid the state some \$50 in taxes. That was just for three days.

Well, I guess you guys are really rolling in the tax money down there now. I suppose those gas stations really pay the taxes. But then again, I guess it keeps your state representatives pretty busy, setting up that \$5 billion pollution control program I read about. I heard some of the people down there wanted a law limiting those hotel signs to less than 100 feet of neon per sign, with a limit of only three neon signs per

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Then again, I guess the state spent some of the high-rise tax money on paying for the highway running through there, and also they had to make up for the loss of tax money when the shrimping, fishing and shelling businesses collapsed down there. I know those training schools for unemployed fishermen cost the state a pretty penny. Hope some of those fellows can find work in Smith's plastic shell factory, But I know that if they can't be trained for that they can get jobs as lifeguards at the high-rises's swimming pools. I know the local law requires them at all times just in case somebody falls over a bulkhead into the deep ocean.

Well, we won't be seeing you this winter, as we used to. Mary and I decided to change our plans and we're going to get a little apartment out near Coney Island this year. We figured for about the same price of going to Florida this year we could rent this apartment near the beach and live in it on weekends. This way it would be all summer long, and we'd be near the ferris wheel and the parachute machine, the shopping plaza and lots of tall buildings just like they have down there.

I guess the only difference would be that Coney still hasn't been seawalled in but I guess that would be nit-picking. They really are trying to make progress up here too. And during the winter, with the money we'd save by vacationing on nearby Coney Island, we figured we'd go to Cuba for a warm rest. Ever since Castro died in that smashup when the hijacked TWA plane hit his welcoming delegation on the runway,

the island has really opened up. They say the Isle of Pines has beaches all around it, with little cabins for visitors tucked away along the surf just like they used to have down on Captiva. Well, I suppose you can't expect them to progress as fast in Cuba. Being an island country, they don't even have any interstates. Have a good year, and I'll send you a Christmas card from the beaches.


Flowers With Glass - Like
