ART AUCTION

A Chinese auction of works by island artists will be sponsored by the Sanibel-Captiva Art League on March 8 at 8 p.m. at the Casa Ybel auditorium on Sanibel. The affair will benefit the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation.

The newly-formed Foundation is seeking funds to purchase land in fresh-water slough or marsh areas near the well-known Ding Darling Sanctuary on Sanibel to preserve these areas and the wildlife dependent on them.

Brad Lacy, program director of WBBH, Channel 20, Fort Myers will wield the gavel for the auction, to which the public is invited.

Highlighting the evening will be an outdoor adventure movie in natural color produced and narrated in person by Hal H. Harrison, nationally known lecturer, photographer, and writer. This is a movie never before shown on the Islands.

TO PRESERVE A TURTLE

Caretta Research, a group of Southwest Florida's leading biologists and conservationists, was formed recently to spearhead a community project on Sanibel and Captiva to preserve the island population of the Atlantic Loggerhead sea turtle. A monograph on island marine turtles written by Charles LeBuff of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Sanibel, and printed by the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation, Inc. includes information on the dwindling island loggerhead population. Le Buff said "the island's colony of loggerheads is definitely heading down hill and three to five years may well see these marvelous creatures a rarity in our waters and on the beaches...unless something is done!"

The organization contains two divisions to deal with the problem and to carry out the objectives of the group. The Research and Education Division consists of LeBuff, Sarita Van Vleck of Captiva, and Bill Hammond of Fort Myers. The Propagation Division is staffed by Clifford Grimard of Sanibel, Gloria Gram of Fort Myers Beach, and Richard Beatty of Naples.

Plans call for a "Turtle farm" to be located on Tarpon Bay, Sanibel. The site and electric power for pumps, freezers, grinders. etc. has


ART EXHIBIT CHAIRMAN





A talk on native edible plants

ESPERANZA WOODRING TELLS OF GRANDFATHER'S FISH RANCH by Vera M. Cantor

One of the earliest beginnings of fishing in Sanibel was Tereva Padilla's fish ranch, back in 1889, as related by his granddaughter, Esperanza Woodring, well-known fishing guide.

Mr. Padilla's crew of 35 men lived in a large palmetto-thatched house on the Bay, near the area where the Sea Horse is now. To thatch the house, the men ingeni ously utilized a native Sanibel plant, the palmetto, by tying p? metto fans on to the crosspiece of the house with strands f the palmetto. A smaller house was constructed in same way.

For cooking and heat on fish ranch, the fishermen b charcoal in large coal pots out of clay. Said Mrs. Wood "To make their own cha they would dig a hole, J wood in the middle, stack t pieces of the green wood grove and buttonwood tr peaks, and cover it with s clay so it would smolder. In about three days, it would have burned down to charcoal.'

Woodring then Esperanza went on to describe how the crew provided fresh water for their needs by digging until they reached water, putting down a barrel with no top or bottom, then another similar barrel on top of Florida Audubon, and many State the first. A bucket on a rope was leaders in the field of conserlet down to bring up the fresh water.

For food, the fisherman ate fish, birds, gophers and small animals.

Mr. Padilla's crew lived on Sanibel at the fish ranch from October to the middle of March each year. "Their fleet of fishing skiffs would catch the mullet when it was spawning, salt the mullet and roe, pack them down in large recalled Mrs. Woodring.

It's easy to see why Esperanza Woodring has a great love for the sea.

There seems to be a space race on, I'm not talking about our trying to see who can land on the moon first, it has to do with the space right here on earth. The problem now seems to be to try and locate as many people in a limited space as possible.

The Resident's Club, instead of being a jumbled, crowded section on the main floor of the residential units, is housed in a separate building, designed by decorator-designer Sandy Paula. It is individually styled and decorated and includes a pool and billard room--called the Place-a grand ballroom, arts and crafts room, lounge and his or hers exercise and sauna rooms. 


