
This meeting is for the purpose of electing three directors of the Association to hold office for a period of two years, or until their successors shall have been elected and qualified.



#### CHAMBER OF COMMERCE QUESTIONNAIRE

Rumors were flying concerning the desirability of reducing, maintaining or lowering the toll for crossing the Sanibel Causeway. Some said that 90% of the island residents would favor a reduction in the toll; that there certainly should be an increase.

The Chamber of Commerce was being plagued by questions about the toll and what was being done about it. As a result, officers of the Chamber decided to take a poll that would sense the true feelings of residents. A postcard was mailed to boxholders on each island with the following questions:

l. Are you in favor of a reduced toll rate?

2. Do you wish the toll rate continued as is?

3. Are you in favor of a special rate for heavy users with trip tickets?

4. Are you in favor of special rates for students?

5. Are you in favor of raising the rates?

A space was left at the bottom of the card for comments.

Five hundred and fifty cards were sent out and 412 boxholders responded.

Following are samples of the comments that were written in: Special rate for heavy users and students. Burn the bridge, baby. Monthly trip tickets for residents. Lower for residents and higher for tourists. Islands would become congested if rates were lowered. Discourage aimless sightseers. Encourage home-Special rates for ownership。 student residents only. High toll for visitors - commuters rates for residents and heavy users. Raise rates for infrequent users. Keep the undesirables from invading the Islands. Season or yearly tickets for residents only at a reduced rate. Rate as is will keep island a special place. If rates lowered Sanibel will be-come a "Coney Island" type resort. Scrap causeway - get ferry back. Thanks to Albert Evans for bringing this toll to your attention. As little as we use it, it doesn't make much diff. High toll is retarding progress. Don't students use school bus paid for by county? Books of 10 tickets for reduced rates, residents only. Tolls protect property owners from being overrun. Have

special plates and rates like they do on Rickenbacker Causeway. Prevent Islands from becoming "Honky Tonk" by maintaining rates. Reduce rate to \$2.00. Everyone on the islands has come here with the full knowledge of toll rates. Do not have special privileged groups. Raise rates for large trailers. Tourists will pay more for privacy by keeping present rate.

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#### SANIBEL LIGHTHOUSE HURRICANE HAVEN AND ARTIST'S DELIGHT by Vera M. Cantor

"The Sanibel Lighthouse was brought from Key West by boat in 1875," recounted Katherine (Snooky) Williams. "A storm came up when the boat was in shallow water, in the pass that goes into the bay from the Gulf. The boat was wrecked on a sandbar, but they salvaged all but a few pieces of the lighthouse."

Mrs. Williams, a Sanibel resident, is well acquainted with the history of the Sanibel lighthouse, as her grandfather, Henry Shanahan, was the first keeper of that beacon.

Transferred from his job as keeper of another Key West lighthouse, Henry Shanahan brought his family over from Key West to Sanibel in a sailboat. They, and an assistant-keeper and his family, took up residence in the two white houses that were part of the lighthouse unit.

"They had to go up the spiral stairs every night to refill the kerosene light," explained Mrs. Williams. "I used to run up and down those spiral stairs when I was a child.

"Back in those days, the light in the lighthouse wasn't a blinker like it is now," said Mrs. Williams. "It would throw a beam all the way to the 'Colony.'

"When hurricanes used to come, we'd all go up there, as it was safe," said Mrs. Williams. "Cuban fishing smacks would come in and take refuge on the porches of the two lighthouse cottages."

From Mrs. Pearl Stokes, a Sanibel resident, we were told how the lighthouse sheltered her family in the fierce hurricane of

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#### 1944.

During the war, the Coast Guard took over the Sanibel Lighthouse. Mrs. Stokes' stepfather, Broward Keene, was in the Coast Guard and was stationed at the lighthouse with his wife.

When the winds reached gale proportions, Pearl and Jake Stokes and their 5 children sought shelter with her parents, as the lighthouse houses were built high off the ground. Cubans, from fishing smacks which had been in local waters, also took refuge from the heavy seas at the Sanibel Light.

"The water came up to the floor-boards of the lighthouse cottage -- about 15 ft, high!" said Mrs. Stokes. "When we heard the water lapping under the bottom of the house, we decided to take the children and go up to the tower of the lighthouse. By this time, it was night, and we all went up, 13 Cubans, mother and dad, Jake and I and the five children.

"We stayed there six hours until the tide turned. One Cuban had a guitar, and Broward, my stepfather, had a guitar, so we sang American songs, and the Cubans sang Spanish songs. We sat on the spiral staircase all night, singing and talking," reminisced Mrs. Stokes.

Tom Wood, Refuge Manager, of the U. S. Bureau of Wildlife and Sport Fisheries, who lives in one of the houses of the lighthouse unit, informed us that the lighthouse blinking light is is powered by REA commercial power, with a standby generator that goes on automatically when REA fails.

"The lighthouse is a point of identification," Mr. Wood states. "A sailor can get a range on the light, and from the code in the blinking system, he can identify it as Sanibel Light."

Sanibel Lighthouse is the first lighthouse north of Key West.

A landmark for Sanibel artists to paint, a guide to sailors, and a hurricane shelter -- the Sanibel Lighthouse serves many purposes.





#### ART SHOW








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#### MEETING NATURE HALFWAY

Early residents of Sanibel kept a smudge pot burning constantly before their door, during the warm months, to drive away the numerous mosquitoes that made life so miserable.

Pearl Stokes, a Sanibel resident, whose family came to the Island in 1900, related how her mother stacked buttonwood or mangrove wood into a pot, ignited the wood, and then "smudged" it, or smothered out the flames. "It would smolder, and the smoke would have a pungent smell which would keep the mosquitoes away from the door," she recalled.

"Another way of making a smudge pot was from fishermen's nets," Mrs. Stokes went on. "When the commercial fishermen's nets got rotten, they would give away the old net, called a "bunt," which was several hundred feet long. This could be set afire, and it was so permeated with salt from the sea that it would smolder."

Horses, mules and pigs on the Island were protected against mosquitoes by placing smoldering cabbage palm logs near the animals.

"There was no insect repellent at that time, except citronella, which had a disagreeable smell," stated Mrs. Stokes. In those day, Sanibel residents slept under mosquito nets.

Until about 1950, very primitive methods of mosquito control existed on Sanibel.

Sanibel made a world's record, mosquito-wise, on Sept. 15, 1950, according to Mr. Fred H. Lesser, entomologist with the Lee County Mosquito Control District. Mr. Lesser described how a New Jersey-type light trap, a standard device for sampling mosquitoes, had been placed under a seagrape bush in Scotia Bryant's yard near the ferry landing, by the Florida State Board of Health Mosquito Research. "On that one night," said Mr. Lesser, "the trap caught 365,669 Black Salt Marsh Mosquitoes (Aedes teaniorhynchus) --- more than had ever been caught in one night anyplace in the world!

This index of how numerous Sanibel mosquitoes were at that time, heavier than any place in the state, induced a large group of entomologists to spend considerable time on the Island to determine the extent and source of the problem.

Said Mr. Lesser, "The scientists determined that in the early Spring, the high Spring tides would flood the mangrove swamps on the North side of the Island and produce great hordes of mosquitoes, which would deposit their eggs in the Sanibel

slough, a shallow wetland area in the center of the Island. Then the rains would come, in late May or June and flood the slough. The mosquitoes would hatch in large numbers, because there were no natural predators--fish--to feed on the larvae in the water, The water would continue to get deeper in the slough all summer long, until finally the water would breach the ridge barrier on the Gulf beach and a tremendous amount of water would flow into the Gulf.

"Then the water table in the center of the Island would drop three to four feet. Within two months, the slough, which had held up to four feet of water, would be powder-dry, and any predacious fish that were alive would dry up and die.


"Dr. Maurice Provost of the Florida State Board of Health Mosquito Research, in his report on the situation, suggested a plan,"continued Mr. Lesser. "Dr. Provost's plan was to tie up all the several little deep water channels in the center of the slough. This would provide deep and permanent water, so the fish would not dry up, and would thus be natural predators against the mosquitoes. The mosquitoes breeding places would be eliminated, as they have to lay eggs in moist soil, and they do not lay them in water.

"This concept is a unique impounding concept, and was used in Sanibel before almost any place else in the country," stated Mr. Lesser. "It meant maintaining water instead of draining water, as is frequently done in mosquito control.

In 1958, the Lee County Mosquito Control District was formed. One of its first official functions was to begin to carry out Dr. Provost's plan. This plan was so successful that 90% of the mosquitoes in Sanibel were eliminated.

It is interesting to note that the auto road through the J. N. Ding Darling Sanctuary was constructed primarily to serve as a dyke to control the water level.

In 1962, the plan was further implemented with the purchase of seven DC-3 two-engine planes for the fogging of insecticide, "However," resumed Fred Lesser, "in 1964, we decided that the mosquitoes on the Island were becoming resistant to the aircraft insecticide spray even after several changes in the spray. "We decided to see if an effective larvaciding program to kill the mosquitoes while they're in the larva stagethe first stage after leaving the egg-could be developed. We had





a good insecticide known as Paris Green, to which the mosquitoes could not be resistant. The only problem was getting the larvacide to the larvae in the short three-day period when they're still susceptible. We decided to rent a helicopter on an experimental basis, to use for the larvaciding. After a short trial, it immediately became obvious that this was the only effective way to conquer the mosquito problem.

"Once a week we make a daily round of the entire county in the helicopter, noting any changes in the water level," explained Mr. Lesser. "Any rise in water levels is easily detected. The helicopter then lands nearby and the newlyflooded area is inspected for the presence of mosquito larvae.

The Lee County Mosquito Control District is self-governed, with its own board of six elected commissioners, Francis Bailey, of Sanibel, was chairman last year.

There are 40 full-time employees, under a \$700,000 budget, derived from local taxes plus State aid. Mrs. Barbara Russell, biologist in the laboratory of the Lee County Mosquito Control District, is one of its dedicated employees, She runs resistance tests, and counts mosquitoes by surveying

the truck traps. Mosquito trucks with funnels five or six feet across and two feet deep, scoop up the mosquitoes and funnel them into bags containing killing chambers, Mrs. Russell counts and identifies any new or large concentration of mosquitoes, giving indication of any location the larvacide might possible have missed.


The use of this original method of maintaining water instead of draining water, together with the effective larvaciding program, has demonstrated that Sanibel's mosquito problems can be solved.

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
