CAPTIVA "PHOTO-VERSE" SHOW




THE FORT MYERS SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA

Presently he is the trumpet instructor at the University of Maryland and artist faculty member of the Northern Virginia Summer Symphony Music Camp in Reston, Va.

Works by Purcell, Handel, Hummel and Tschaikovsky will be performed by the Symphony and Mr. Head. The concert begins at 8 p.m. and tickets will be available at the door at \$2.00 for adults and \$1.00 for students.




SANIBEL-CAPTIVA SHARKS SOFTBALL TEAM

there a nurse with the ambulance crew? Or anyone trained in the Red Cross program to care for you or the drive to the hospital?


