


WILDLIFE PROGRAM

This evening (Thursday) a special wildlife program will be held at the Sanibel Community House at 8 p.m. All persons, residents and visitors, are invited to attend.

The program will be two-part, Mario Hutton, president of the Sanibel-Captiva Audubon Society, will emcee and present a portion of his "My Lilliputian Cosmos," one of his very popular photo-verse presentations. Following Mr. Hutton, Charles LeBuff, of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, will speak and show slides on the sea turtles of Sanibel and Captiva Islands. These turtles, the loggerhead, have become much reduced and are fast approaching the status of an endangered species.

To bring the island's colony of sea turtles back from the brink of extinction a group of conservationists, sponsored by the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation, have grouped together to form Caretta Research. It is the goal of this group to restore the loggerhead turtles through a broad research and cultivation project.

LeBuff will explain this interesting project and cover other aspects of the life history of sea turtles. Marine turtles include the most valuable of reptiles and are one of Nature's most mysterious creatures. This dual program should prove one of the seasons most interesting and educational. Don't miss it.



SIGN CONTROL APPROVED

At 8 p.m., Wednesday evening, March 26, a special meeting was held at the Sanibel Community House to discuss a proposed ordinance to control signs on Sanibel and Captiva Islands. Present were all of the Lee County Commissioners, the County Attorney and the Director of

the Building and Zoning Department. The attorney retained by the Chamber of Commerce, Mr. Mike Jack-son of the legal firm of Stewart & Stewart of Fort Myers, explained the proposed ordinance, paragraph by paragraph. Mr. Floyd Snook, Chamber of Commerce president, was moderator for the meeting. Approximately 250 people attended. After a few minor changes, it was unanimously resolved that the Lee County Commissioners adopt this ordinance.

The Commissioners had been invited so that they would have a firsthand idea of the thinking of the people of our Island community on this subject.

Great enthusiasm was displayed by all attendees with the presence of the entire Board of Commissioners and the other County officials.

Following the meeting, it was pointed out by Mr. Snook that because there was so much research and effort by the attorney in drafting the proposal, with further work required, an expense of approximately \$1,000 could be expected. Mr. Snook, therefore, suggested that a voluntary offering be taken. An amount of \$255,55 was collected or pledged at the meeting.


SHELL TABLE JINX IS BROKEN



My wife and I have been vacationing for the past consecutive nine years on lovely Sanibel Island, which we have grown to love so much that for the past several years we take the Islander regularly to see what is occuring here during the rest of the year, when we cannot be here. We do hope that the conservation movement will be able to preserve the natural beauty of Sanibel and Captiva Islands and that the inevitable new construction will be so regulated that the charm of the area will be preserved.

I had the misfortune to fall this week, sustaining severe sprains and contusions of the lower cervical and upper cerastic spine. Miss Jackie Purdie at the lovely Segunda Apartments, where we stay each year, summoned the rescue squad of the volunteer fire department and Marty Holtz, Allen Nave and Preston Woodring responded immediately for first aid measures, Mr. Herb Purdy of the Squad being in Fort Myers at the time. They had also summoned a comfortable Cadillac ambulance, which was at our apartment in a few moments, from the Harvey Funeral Home, in Ft. Myers. They understood that the slightest jar caused excruciating pain so they gave me a very smooth and comfortable ride to the Lee Memorial Hospital where xrays demonstrated no fractures. Although the injury is completely incompacitating for the time, fortunately it is only temporary so Mr. Purdy very kindly stopped by the hospital to be with my wife while I was being examined.

I wish to thank Marty Holtz, Allen Nave and Preston Woodring, as well as the entire rescue squad and the Harvey Funeral Home for their very prompt, knowledgeable and efficient ser-

vice. Sanibel Island and Captiva Island can well be proud of these men and the visitors can be well assured that the emergency needs will be well cared for.



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



AN OPEN LETTER

To the writer of the letter printed March 27, signed "An Islander," Your thoughts and consternations regarding the police, fire protection and ambulance service provided residents and visitors of Sanibel have been read and considered, with thanks for your civic-mindedness. It is always heartwarming to realize that there are interested citizens who reflect on the growth of our Islands and the impending problems of preserving life, limb and property. You expressed thanks to the "men who are our police. firemen and ambulance crew' which is gratefully received.

Certain facts should be stated in order to relieve you of your anxieties and to clear the record. These will be made relative to the Sanibel Volunteer Fire Dept. only and in the approximate order in which your doubts were stated in the March 27 letter. First, our two fire engines and one Rescue Unit are paid for and maintained out of YOUR tax money as these are owned by the Sanibel Volunteer Fire Control District. Those who man this equipment are members of the Sanibel Volunteer Fire Department and, as the name implies, are unpaid. Sanibel Fire assists Captiva Fire and, vice versa, when need-ed. Actually, Sanibel assisted the Fort Myers Beach Dept. only last year in a serious fire, Likewise, the mainland departments have and will continue to aid us if needed. The Sanibel Rescue Unit is NOT and never has been an "ambulance," It provides emergency and rescue service, from

Redfish Pass at Captiva when needed on a volunteer basis. The members of the Sanibel Fire Department receive training including that by the Florida Forestry Service. The Rescue Unit is trained by the American Red Cross. You are welcome to join and train with us on the second

and last Mondays of each month. As mentioned, we do not operate an ambulance but, rather, an Emergency Unit which is better equipped (including oxygen and resuscitator) than the "city" ambulances of the hearse type (cost approximately \$14,000.) No member of the Rescue Unit is permitted, under Florida Law, to administer first aid who does not hold an active certificate of the American Red Cross Advanced First Aid Course and the Florida State Board of Health. The Rescue vehicle is, also, inspected and licensed by the Florida State Board of Health.

To relieve your doubts about time lapse, the following transcripts from the Rescue Unit Log should confirm that emergency transportation to the Lee Memorial Hospital, from any point on our Islands, takes less time than driving crosstown in New York City at 4:30 p.m. on a business day: Date: July 24, 1968, Time of Phone Call: 12:25 p.m., Type of Emergency: Heat attack, Location: South Seas Plantation, Time of Admittance to Lee Memorial Hospital: 1:32 p.m., Total Elapsed Time: 67 minutes.

Date: October 2, 1968, Time of Phone Call: 1:15 p.m., Type of Emergency: Heart Attack, Locaof Admittance to Lee Memorial Hospital: 1:48 p.m., Total Elapsed time: 33 minutes.

There is no nurse on the Rescue Unit nor, to the best of our knowledge, is there one assigned in the normal course of activities on ANY civilian ambulance in the United States. A nurse (we believe you refer to a Registered Nurse) must be licensed by the Florida State Board of Nursing. A Registered Nurse, like a medical doctor, is a professional person.

Your reference to the pride shown in the "small towns up North" can be found here on Sanibel also; by the members of the Department and those who have called for its assistance.

The forthcoming abandonment of ambulance service by funeral directors has caused the Lee County Board of Commissioners to study the pertinent facts related to the cost of maintaining a two-man crew, available 24 hours daily at the Federal Minimum Wage. The annual cost to man one (1) such ambulance accrues to \$33,000.00, EXCLUD-ING cost of vehicle, equipment, servicing. etc.

For the record, Sanibel Rescue responded to 30 calls in 1967 of which 27 were to Lee Memorial Hospital. In 1968, there were 37 calls with 31 taken to the hospital. The total man-hours logged were 107 hours and 54 minutes in 1967 and 111 hours and 26 minutes in 1968; ALL of which were volunteer. It is self evident that personal loss of income was experienced by those participating as in all of these volunteer calls. Department can use additional volunteers on its Fire and Emergency-Rescue work. Perhaps you "An Islander" will help us. Remember - training meeting is on the second and last Mondays of each month at 8:00 p.m.



The Sanibel Community Association is attempting to obtain one. We, who serve on the Rescue Unit, recognize the necessity of having a medical practitioner here more than anyone else.

A third method of assistance is to encourage Island residents and visitors to phone GR 2-4141 when fire, emergency or rescue service is needed and to discourage those from phoning who wish an ambulance for non-emergency transportation such as in chronic cases. 
