AUDUBON MEETING AND ELECTIONS






The Annual Meeting of the Sanibel Community Association followed



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

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WET WINTER BENEFITING EVERGLADES

Congressman Paul Rogers today commended the Central and Southern Florida Flood Control District for increasing the flow of excess Lake Okeechobee water into the Everglades region.

"Improvements in the Miami and North New River Canals have permitted the FCD to release water from Lake Okeechobee into the Everglades region at the rate of over 5,000 cubic feet per second," Rogers said, "Prior to the improvements in these two important canal systems, all excess water had to be released through the St. Lucie Canal and the Caloosahatchee River. This has been particularly harmful in the Stuart area, where excess water flow has increased silting and seriously upset the normal ecology of the St. Lucie and Indian

"Unfortunately, much water still must be released through

the St. Lucie Canal in times of high lake levels, even with the improvements made," Rogers said. "Additional help will come with the completion of the Caloosahatchee River deepening project, now stalled because of Federal spending limitations in effect. As soon as this important work can be completed, additional pressure can be removed from the St. Lucie Canal side of the lake.

''Of Florida's many vital natural resources, few, if any, would equal the importance of the Everglades region. The increased capacity of the FCD to release water southward from the lake in its historical pattern is a major step to return the proper balance of nature to the Everglades," Rogers said. "This, of course, will mean high water in times of high rainfall, but it will also mean a more adequate water supply at all times.

around the clock. Yes, we should also have a doctor full time on the Island. Yes, I know our tax dollar supports and pays for the equipment. The tax dollar could still pay with the people of Sanibel and Captiva also contributing the rest of the necessary money. They pay for hospital and fire insurance. This would be another tax deductible insurance policy for them. No, I did not mean a registered nurse, the women mostly are trained by Red Cross and some are practical nurses that ride the ambulance. They also give their time free. The forthcoming abandonment of ambulance service by funeral directors is what caused me to write the first letter because I think we owe it to ourselves, the people of the Island and to the visitors to be prepared and to give the

best service possible to get any-

where in the U.S.A.

Total elapsed time, 67 minutes to get a heart patient to Lee Memorial I don't think is anything to be proud of. When you can say 25 minutes then hold your heads up high. Also the people of Florida should be made more aware that when they hear a siren they should pull off to the side of the road and give the emergency vehicle the right of way. Perhaps I can be of aid, I don't know. I know I have a lot of ideas I'd love to see go into use here, not only as a civic minded member of the community, but as a human being who may be in need of a fast ride to the hospital some day. To me life is very precious and I don't want to lose it because some one may be too slow at getting me to a hospital and care some day. Bill MacIntosh reports that of this moment sixteen persons have signed up and made deposits on the tour to Yugoslavia next September.


More than half of this number are repeaters from the previous tours to Portugal and Spain two years ago and to Greece last year.

In addition several others have indicated that they probably will go. It would seem likely that a minimum of twenty will make this exciting trip with Bill. We wish we were going.



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
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
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INATTENTION BLAMED IN ONE-CAR ACCIDENTS

Lack of driver attention may contribute to many of the State's single-car accidents the Florida Highway Patrol said today.

"In many cases the reason for a puzzling single-car accident is that the driver failed to make a conscious effort to stay alert. Motorists traveling alone are subject to become lax in their attentiveness to driving hazards until it is too late," said Colonel H. N. Kirkman, Director of the Department of Public Safety.

Kirkman warned drivers against becoming lulled into an accident by their solitude. The "highway hypnosis" of long trips and the "routine" of short trips are equally dangerous said Kirkman.

Patrol records show there were 34,738 one-car accidents in Florida during 1968.

"A conscious effort to stay alert," Kirkman concluded, "will be a conscious effort to stay alive."

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
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

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

Community Center at 8 p.m. Be sure to arrive early and assure yourself a front row seat.

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
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



