



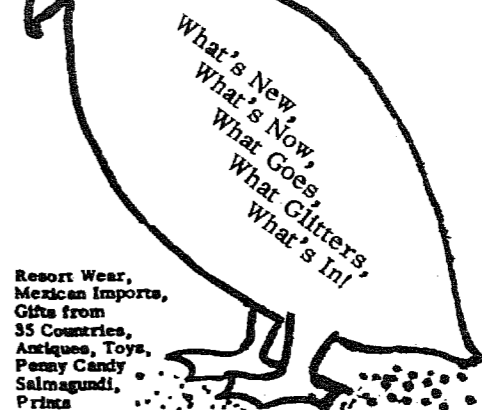
You can depend on a number of volcanoes erupting during the year. It has been happening for centuries and will continue to happen. But it does not mean the end of the world.

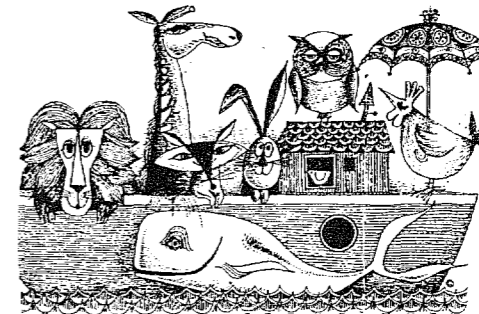

To The Islander:

The ad for the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation, Inc. that has appeared in the last few issues is a revelation. It signifies how important preserving the Islands is to so many, many people, both residents and those who visit.

It was very gratifying to read all the names of those who are four-square behind the happy (and important) effort to keep these beautiful creations as natural and as enjoyable as it is possible to do so.

Those who realize the aims of conservation and how it relates to the interests and pleasure of those now living as well as those yet to come, generation after generation, need no reminder of the benefits. But to those who do not know, or who do not want to know, any mention of all the benefits of conservation would simply sound like platitudes. They are the ones whose names are missing, much to my surprise and sincere regret. I, for one, hope that the names I noticed missing will be listed next time. It is so extremely important that the list be extended -- even to cover the entire page following the Foundation ad. Important in too many ways to mention here.

Someone once said that many people are so busy scraping and clawing to get the good things out of life that all along they are passing up the best things. What are the best things? They, too, are much too numerous to mention. But, for starters, how about the wonderful sight of a flock of spoonbills feeding at dusk. Or simply a snowy egret striding along the shoreline. An anhinga suddenly submerging and just as suddenly appearing again a few yards distant.

Conservation -- conservation of beauty, life, tranquility. That's what it's all about. Let's not let it slip through our fingers this time.

BEWARE!!

Before buying nursery stock through the mail, check whether stock advertised is suited for Florida's climate and soil conditions, Commissioner of Agriculture Doyle Conner said today.

"Beware of outlandish claims relating to growth, flowering or fruiting of trees or shrubs," Conner said. Floridians should question claims of tremendous bargains and they should compare priced of the advertiser with those charged by established nurserymen, he added.

"Floridians should remember, too, that plants and trees which might thrive in some parts of the country might not be able to withstand our climate. We have received numerous complaints from Florida homeowners who have written saying that a tree, bush, or plant which they purchased from out of state lived exceedingly well for a year or two, then suddenly died. We must point out to the writer that the out-of-state purchase just couldn't adapt to our climate," Conner said.

He said the Florida Department of Agriculture has printed booklets that deal with plants, shrubs and trees that will thrive in the various sections of Florida.

Before ordering mail-order nursery stock, Conner said Florida homeowners should check with their respective county agricultural extension agent or with local nurseries to determine if the desired plant would be able to survive in their respective soil and climate -- whether it is in South Florida's sub-tropical climate and sandy soils or in North Florida's rolling clay and limestone hills, which have cool to cold winters.

"There are some excellent mail-order nursery stock companies, whose trees and shrubs are top quality and their prices are reasonable, but there also are some unscrupulous nursery stock promoters who use deceptive advertising to foist low-quality seedlings on unsuspecting buyers," Conner said.

"The ads are hard to resist. They contain spectacular promises and glowing descriptions -- and the prices sound reasonable. Yet, Florida consumers should view these ads with some suspicion because many of the claims are simply untrue," he pointed out.

NEWS ON YOUR SUNGLASSES

As Floridians don more sunglasses to protect themselves from the sun's glorious radiance, Commissioner of Agriculture Doyle Conner said today consumers should consider "what constitutes a 'good' purchase in sunglasses."

He pointed out Floridians will be receiving more of the sun's rays as our days grow longer next week when Daylight Savings Time becomes effective.

"Last year, Americans spent over \$100 million on sunglasses and it is possible to find them in the market today ranging in price from 59 cents to \$25," Conner pointed out.

The purpose of sunglasses is

to reduce the amount of visible sun rays as well as the amount of invisible infrared and ultraviolet rays which strike the eye. The need for sunglasses varies with the individual, depending on the activity, personal sensitivity to light and geographical location, Conner said.

If a consumer purchases in the market place such as a department store, he points out some consideration to make in selection: lenses which are neutral color, shape which does not block vision, size which adequately covers the eye and a quality which is flawless; construction; and fit and cost.

Neutral gray is the preferred lense color, followed by green because it has little effect on color

perception," he said. Colors such as red, red-orange, yellow and blue result in loss of color subtleties, shades and tints. Darker lenses also are preferred, he said.

For Floridians who might not be able to make proper judgments if they have prescription glasses, a visit to their eye specialist for assistance would be important, Conner warned.

The cost is not always a good judge of quality and the label should be read. The more expensive glasses are, the more often they are for glamor than for protection. Cheap glasses at the same time often have many imperfections, Conner said.

"The imperfections will not ruin the eye, but they may result in such consequences as eye strain, eye irritation or headache.

Conner said additional information may be obtained by writing his Office of Consumer Services in the Capitol, Tallahassee, or by writing various state and voluntary health groups which deal with blindness.

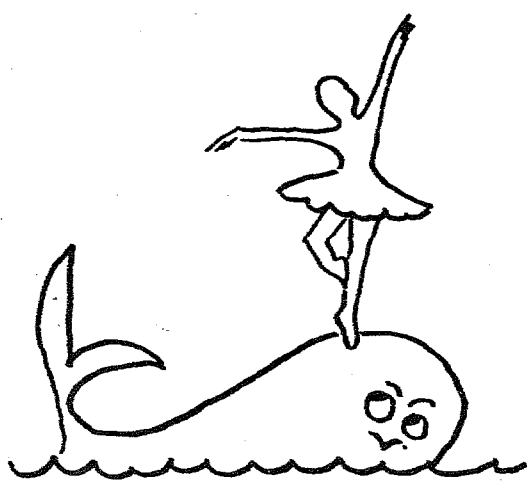

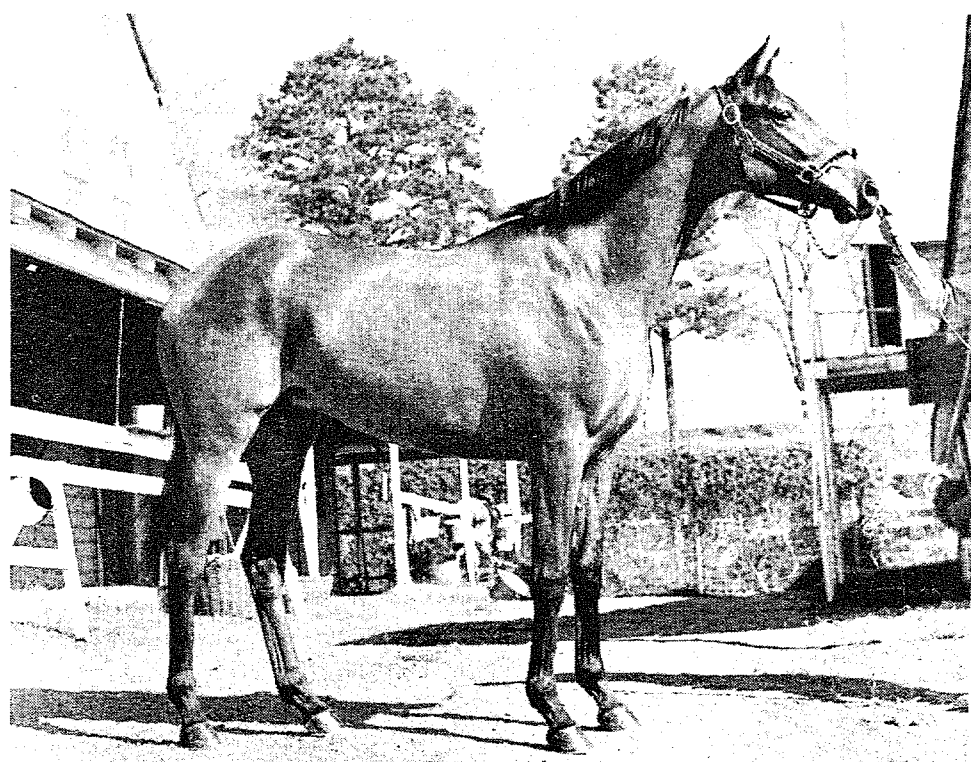

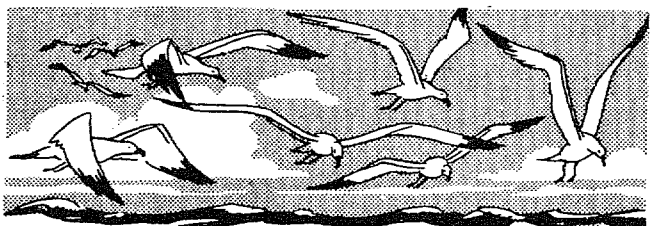


SANIBEL SONG

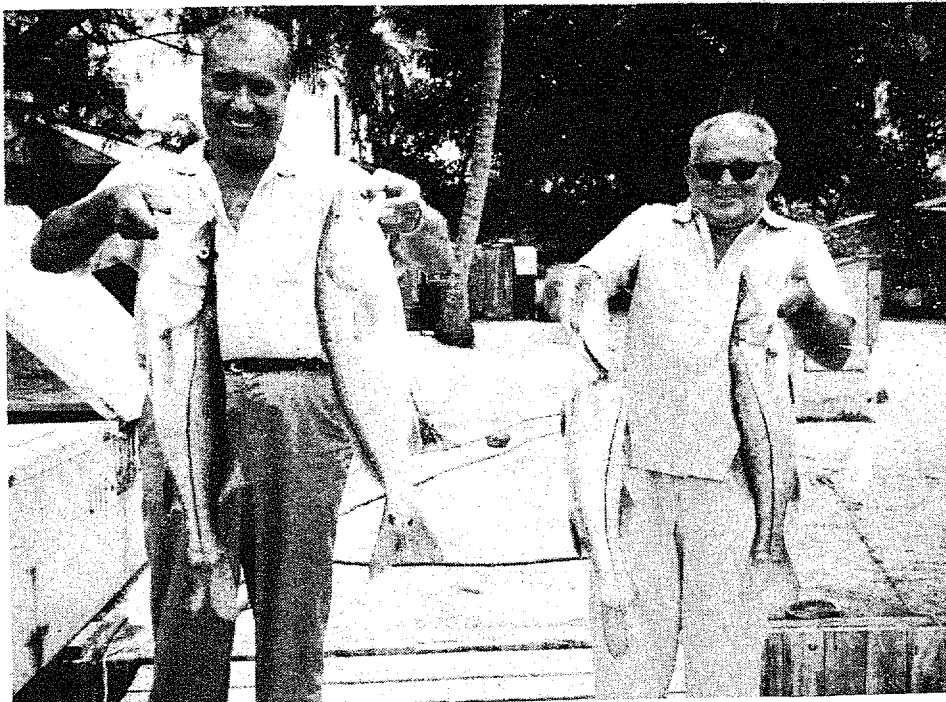

TRIBUTE TO MARIO HUTTON

The following is a tribute by Jordan Davidson, owner of Sanibel Estates property on Sanibel to Mario Hutton, Jordan is president of Florida Poet's Association.

Mario F. Hutton was born of British and Italian parents in Rome, Italy, where he graduated from law school. Early in life he owned and operated an Art Theater located in his Villa. Still later he was program manager of Radio Station W.O.V. in New York.

He served overseas in the Criminal Investigation Division of the U.S. Army in Europe. He was executive secretary of the Italy-America Chamber of Commerce in New York. Among his awards is the Star of Solidarity and the appointment as Knight Commander of the Order of Merit.

During most of his life, Mr. Hutton has received prizes for his photography. He took up wildlife photography during recent years when he moved to Sanibel Island on the lower west coast of Florida in the Gulf of Mexico.

His new photographic technique consists of the synchronization of word and image in presenting color slides simultaneously described in poetic form. This new approach involves the artistry of nature combined with pictorial wizardry and a pleasant sense of humor.

Mr. Hutton gives a picturesque birds-eye view of one of our country's most unusual scenic showcases, the unspoiled and semi-tropical beauty of Sanibel and Captiva Islands. The enchanting island Eden comes alive in episodes covering all facets of its native scenery and unusual way of life. It is a classic example of "Nature hauntingly retold in image and rhyme -- and with a reason."

It had been said of the program at a Wilderness Society at Sanibel: The program by Mario Hutton depicts the bird life and natural beauty of the islands, hauntingly beautiful scenes of a Florida which is rapidly disappearing. Not only did his photographs show rare artistry and perception, but they were even more meaningful in the way they were presented.

He has created an art form of blending poetry with each picture in such a way that the audience shares his high sensitivity and feeling. Mr. Davidson wrote the following poem:

IT TAKES A LOT OF HELP TO GROW A FOREST

What witchcraft wakes the potent, sleeping seed?
The jargon of the teasing, satin breeze?
The shouting of the winds that lash and plead?
Or does it hear the far off yodeling seas?
To walk on mulch of leaves where mosses cling
is magic in itself that few discover;
And where a bragging brook has songs to sing,
The earth becomes the loved and man the lover.
To breathe the pungent odor of the pines
And follow wheeling birds from tree to tree
Reveals a thousand years of lost designs
Unveiled for those who have the eyes to see.
It takes a lot to make a forest grow;
A caravan of arts, a chattering squirrel,
A waterfall that knows what Aprils know,
A hidden spring that gives the stars a twirl.
A slant of sun between two reaching trees
That will embrace before the century turns,
An artist painting ancient cypress knees,
A blur of butterflies among the ferns.
But most of all it takes the miracle
of wind and rain and sun and willing bees
To help a forest grow more lyrical
Than seven birds in seven summer trees.




