



At the critique following the pickup session, it was recommended that the job be done more frequently, that it be a community effort and that private citizens and members of civic organizations be urged to participate in all beautification projects; that visitors, business people and residents would all stand to benefit. At the Lions' regular bi-monthly dinner this past Wednesday, it was decided to contact all organizations in order to sound them out as to their ideas for future beautification projects. The Lions and Scouts hope to finish what they have already started.



CONSERVATIONISTS HIT AIRPORT THREAT TO EVERGLADES

Many of the nation's foremost conservation organizations have joined in asking Secretary of Transportation John A. Volpe to halt construction of a planned supersonic jetport near the Everglades National Park, the Wildlife Management Institute reports.

The Department of Transportation has a major role in selecting the site for the airport because of the large federal subsidies that are needed. For this reason, conservationists a re asking Volpe to recognize that the jetport would create heavy air pollution, interfere with the movement of surface water into the Everglades Park, and create problems of waste disposal and run off of pesticides and fertilizers.

The shower was attended by twenty five friends and fellow staff and faculty members of the University of Miami School of Medicine, with which Miss Hunter is professionally associated.



> From this point on, communication is primarily through hand signals. A palm down, with a downward motion of the hand, requests a slower speed. The opposite -- palm up and upper hand motion -- asks for more power and speed. For an immediate stop the skier imitates the traffic officer: flat palm with hand and arm stretched overhead. The signal for the driver to cut the motor is drawing the fingers across the throat.

> To signal for a change of direction, the skier motions with outstretched palm. When he points with a finger, he is asking the driver to wing in the indicated direction so that he can "whip off." Palm extended in a slant indicates the skier wants to try the ramp.

> These are standard and generally accepted signals recommended by the American Water Ski Association. There may be occasional variations, but in the main these signals are widely known and relied upon and have been a definite factor in the sport's fine safety record.
